PERMANENT RULES OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE 133RD GENERAL ASSEMBLY 1985–1986

HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. S AS AMENDED BY HOUSE AMENDMENT NOS. 1 AND 4 AND BY HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 235

# I. RULES OF ORDER

#### Rule 1 - Convening of House

The House of Representatives shall meet every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday at 1:30 P.M., unless otherwise ordered. The Speaker shall take the chair at the designated hour and shall call the House to order. The Speaker shall cause the names of the members to be called in alphabetical order, followed by the opening prayer and pledge to the flag. If a quorum is present, he shall proceed with the business of the day. The minutes shall be made public and normally posted by the Chief Clerk prior to the next legislative day. With the consent of the House, the reading of the minutes for the previous day may be omitted.

Rule 2 - Order of Business

(a) After the reading of the minutes, the order of business shall be as follows:

- 1. Presentation of petitions, memorials or communications.
- 2. Reports from Standing and Special Committees.
- 3. Introduction and first reading of Bills and Resolutions.
- 4. Consideration of Agenda.
- 5. Consent Calendar, once each week when needed.
- 6. Announcement of Committee meetings.
- 7. Announcement of Agenda for next legislative day.

(b) The order of business may be changed when necessary by the Speaker unless a majority of the members present object.

#### Rule 3 - Messages

Messages from the Senate or from the Governor may be received at any time except when a question is being put or the roll is being called.

### II. DUTIES OF THE SPEAKER

#### Rule 4 - Order and Decorum

(a) The Speaker shall preside and have general direction over the House Chamber and shall preserve order and decorum. In debate he shall confine the members to the question under discussion. No member shall have the floor except when recognized by the Speaker.

(b) Cameras, recording instruments, and similar equipment or electronic devices are permitted in the House Chamber only with the permission of the Speaker.

Rule 5 - Decide Questions of Order; Appeal

The Speaker shall decide all questions of order. An appeal from his decision may be made by any member if properly seconded. The appeal shall be upheld only upon the affirmative vote of a majority of the members. The Speaker shall not vote on appeals from his own decision.

Rule 6 - Temporary Presiding Officer

(a) The Speaker may name a member to perform the duties of Presiding Officer, but such substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment or a recess except when the Speaker obtains leave of absence, in which case he may name a member as Speaker Pro Tempore during such leave, which leave shall not exceed six consecutive legislative days.

(b) When neither the elected nor appointed presiding officer shall be present, the House shall be called to order by the senior member in terms of service for the Majority Party who shall serve in the interim as the Presiding Officer. The Presiding Officer shall serve no longer than five legislative days. Rule 7 - Signing of Bills and Resolutions

The Speaker shall sign all Bills and Resolutions requiring his signature. All warrants, writs and subpoenas issued by the House shall be signed by the Speaker and attested to by the Chief Clerk. In the absence of the Speaker, the Speaker Pro Tempore shall sign when and where necessary.

# Rule 8 - Assignment of Bills and Resolutions to Committee

The Speaker shall determine the principal objective of a Bill or Resolution and, subject to the provisions of Rule 17, assign same to the appropriate committee. All prefiled Bills shall be pre-assigned to committees by the Speaker and each member notified in writing of assignments.

# Rule 9 - Appointment of Committees

(a) The Speaker shall appoint all committees and subcommittees unless otherwise ordered by the House.

(b) Where illness or other sufficient cause shall compel the absence of any committee member, the Speaker, in his discretion, may fill such vacancy from the same political party as the absent member, during said absence.

# Rule 10 - Setting the Agenda

The Speaker shall place items on the Agenda from the list of all measures that have been reported out of committee or have been laid on the table and which have been requested to be placed on the Agenda by the sponsor or floor manager.

# III. RIGHTS AND DUTIES OF MEMBERS

#### Rule 11 - Attendance of Members

(a) No member shall absent himself or herself from any session of the House without notifying the Speaker, that he or she is unable to attend. A member who is absent without notifying the Speaker may be considered in contempt and is subject to the censure of the House.

(b) Members must answer roll call from their respective seats.

#### Rule 12 - Quorum

Twenty-one members of the House shall constitute a quorum. When the lack of a quorum exists, the Sergeant-at-Arms, by signal or otherwise, shall notify the members who are absent from the Chamber, but not from Legislative Hall, that their presence is required therein. Upon receiving the notification, the absentee members shall report to the House Chamber. After a proper interval for the notifications, the Speaker shall order a roll call of the House to ascertain if a quorum is present.

# Rule 13 - Addressing the House

(a) Every member desirous of speaking shall rise from his or her seat but shall not proceed to speak until recognized by the Speaker. Upon acknowledgement by the Speaker the member shall be seated until called upon. If two or more members seek recognition at the same time, the Speaker shall determine who is entitled to the floor.

(b) Remarks shall be confined to the subject before the House or to the purpose for which recognition was obtained.

Rule 14 - Decorum of Members on Floor of House

(a) Every member shall conduct himself or herself in an honorable manner at all times.

(b) He or she shall refer to other members by title unless use of the proper name is necessary to make the reference clear.

(c) No member or other person may walk across the House Chamber or converse privately in a manner as to interrupt the House proceedings.

(d) A member shall not be interrupted when speaking except for the following reasons:

(1) A call to order by the Speaker.

(2) Point of order by a member.

(3) Motion by a member to move the previous question, to adjourn, or to recess.

(e) A member shall not make derogatory personal comments about or to other members.

# IV. BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS

# Rule 15 - Content of Resolutions

The following types of Resolutions may be considered by this body:

(a) <u>Simple Resolutions</u>: A simple Resolution is a motion of the House and deals with the internal affairs of the House only. The effect of its passage does not go beyond the bounds and the authority of the House.

(b) <u>Concurrent Resolutions</u>: A Concurrent Resolution is used to accomplish the same purpose in relation to the entire Legislature that the simple Resolution accomplished for either the House or Senate singly. A Concurrent Resolution adopted by the Legislature does not become a statute, nor does it have the force and effect of law, nor can it be used for any purpose which requires the exercise of legislative power.

(c) Joint Resolutions: A Joint Resolution is the most formal type of Resolution, and is addressed to matters which are not internal affairs of either House individually, or the internal affairs of the General Assembly as a whole. It is of no legal effect unless passed by both Houses and signed by the Governor. Although a Joint Resolution is not a law, it is employed to provide for temporary measures and has the force of law while in effect for a wide variety of limited purposes, including subpoena power. The requirement of the Governor's signature for Joint Resolutions stems from its original use in instances where it was expedient or necessary to express the joint will and action of the Legislature and Governor combined.

# Rule 16 - Preparation and Custody

(a) Every Bill and Resolution shall be introduced with as many backed copies as deemed necessary by the Speaker. The original of the Bill or Resolution shall at all times remain in the custody of the Chief Clerk of the House or the Chairman of the committee to which it was assigned. A 'duplicate' backed copy may go to the following: The Speaker, the Sponsor, and the Legislative Council. Upon introduction a copy of each Bill or Resolution shall be delivered to every member. Copies shall also be delivered to the Legislative Council.

(b) No Bill or Joint Resolution shall be introduced into the House unless it be 'prefaced' by a brief statement of its purpose which shall be known as the title and shall also contain the text of the Bill or Joint Resolution in full. Each Bill or Resolution shall have an appropriate enacting or resolving clause. If a Bill by its terms requires an extraordinary majority for enactment, such vote requirement shall be plainly indicated. At the end of each Bill or Joint Resolution introduced, the author shall include a brief synopsis of the intent of the Bill or Joint Resolution and in the lower left hand corner of page one shall be the initials of the unit preparing the Bill or Resolution number.

Rule 16A. Rules of Legislative Conduct.

(a) A member of the House shall be subject to discipline by the House for violation of any of the following Rules of Legislative Conduct which shall be deemed to constitute "disorderly behavior" within the meaning of Article II, Section 9 of the Delaware Constitution:

(1) Restrictions relating to "personal or private interests" within the meaning of Article II, Section 20 of the Delaware Constitution and Chapter 10, Title 29 of the Delaware Code:

(A) A member who has a personal or private interest in any measure or Bill pending before the House shall disclose the fact and shall not participate in the debate nor vote thereon; provided that, upon the request of any other member of the House, a member who has such a personal or private interest may nevertheless respond to questions concerning any such measure or Bill. A personal or private interest in a measure or Bill is an interest which tends to impair a member's independence of judgment in the performance of his or her duties with respect to that measure or Bill. (B) A member has an interest which tends to impair his or her independence of judgment in the performance of his or her legislative duties with regard to any Bill or measure when, (1) the enactment or defeat of the measure or Bill would result in a financial benefit or detriment to accrue to the member or a close relative to a greater extent than such benefit or detriment would accrue to others who are members of the same class or group of persons, (ii) the member or a close relative has a financial interest in a private enterprise which enterprise or interest would be affected by a measure or Bill to a greater extent than like enterprises or other interests in the same enterprise, or (iii) a person required to register as a legislative agent pursuant to Chapter 16 of Title 29 of the Delaware Code is a close relative of the legislator and that person acts to promote, advocate, influence or oppose the measure or Bill.

(C) Disclosure required under Subsection (A) shall be made in open session, (i) prior to the vote on the measure or the Bill by any Committee of which the member is a member, and (ii) prior to the vote on the measure or Bill in the House. Disclosure may be made by written statement submitted to the Chairman of a Committee or the Speaker of the House and read in open session in the Committee or the House as the case may be.

(D) For the purposes of this Rule:

(I) A "close relative" means a person's parents, spouse, children (natural or adopted) and siblings of the whole and half-blood.

(II) A "private enterprise" means any activity whether conducted for profit or not for profit and includes the ownership of real or personal property; provided that "private enterprise" does not include any activity of the State of Delaware, any political subdivision or any agency, authority or instrumentality thereof.

(III) A person has a "financial interest" in a private enterprise if he or she, (i) has a legal or equitable ownership interest in the enterprise with a fair market value in excess of \$5,000, (ii) is associated with the enterprise and received from the enterprise during the last calendar year or might reasonably be expected to receive from the enterprise during the current or the next calendar year income in excess of \$5,000 for services as an employee, officer, director, trustee or independent contractor, or (iii) is a creditor of an insolvent private enterprise in an amount in excess of \$5,000.

(IV) A "person" means an individual, partnership, corporation, trust, joint venture and any other association of individuals or entities.

(2) Receiving unlawful gratuities in violation of Section 1206, Title 11, Delaware Code.

(3) Receiving a bribe in violation of Section 1203, Title 11, Delaware Code.

(4) Profiteering in violation of Section 1212, Title 11, Delaware Code.

(5) Engaging in conduct constituting official misconduct in violation of Section 1211, Title 11, Delaware Code.

(6) Failure to comply with the financial disclosure requirements of Chapter 58, Title 29, Delaware Code.

(7) Appearing for, representing or assisting another in respect to a matter before the General Assembly or one of its Committees for compensation other than that provided by law.

(8) Releasing without authorization of the Ethics Committee any confidential matter pertaining to proceedings of the Ethics Committee.

(9) Knowingly filing a false statement with the Ethics Committee or the House in connection with any proceeding involving a Rule of Legislative Conduct.

(10) Engaging in conduct which the House determines (i) brings the House into disrepute or, (ii) refects adversely on the member's fitness to hold legislative office.

(b) A member shall be subject to sanction for any prohibited conduct occurring subsequent to being elected to the House. A member shall also be subject to sanction for any prohibited conduct occurring prior to being elected to the House provided that the conduct bears a reasonable relationship to the member's fitness to hold legislative office.

(c) A complaint alleging a violation of a Rule of Legislative Conduct shall be filed in writing by a member with the Ethics Committee for investigation and recommendation to the House as to disposition. A complaint must be accompanied by a written statement signed by any person, sworn under oath, setting forth the facts supporting the complaint. No such complaint shall be considered by the House prior to its consideration and recommendation by the Ethics Committee.

(d) If the Ethics Committee recommends some disciplinary action with respect to a complaint, a Resolution shall be presented to the House that the House conduct a proceeding to consider the matter. If the Ethics Committee votes to dismiss a complaint, and there are no dissenting votes in the Committee, the House shall take no action with respect thereto. If the Ethics Committee votes to dismiss a complaint, but there are dissenting votes in the Committee, the House may consider the matter upon the petition of any member approved by a majority vote of the House. In any proceeding before the House involving an alleged violation of a Rule of Legislative Conduct, the accused member shall be given an opportunity to be heard after notice, to be advised and assisted by legal counsel, to produce witnesses and offer evidence and to cross-examine any witnesses; a transcript of any such proceeding shall be made and retained; and the procedural rules of Rule S5 shall apply.

(e) If the House finds by a majority vote that a member has violated a Rule of Legislative Conduct, it may impose such disciplinary action as it deems appropriate provided that no member may be suspended or expelled without the vote of 2/3 of the House concurring therein.

Rule 17 - Introduction of Bills and Resolutions; Filing with Clerk

(a) Every Bill or Resolution shall be numbered in order as introduced, beginning with HB 1 for House Bills, HR 1 for House Resolutions, HCR 1 for House Concurrent Resolutions and HJR 1 for House Joint Resolutions and the original backer shall contain the signatures of all the sponsors on the original bill. (b) Every Bill or Resolution shall be introduced by:

(1) Prefiling with the Clerk of the House not less than three hours prior to the opening of the session by one of the two following procedures:

a. The sponsor's initials in the 'Prefile-Yes' block on the request form;

b. Verbal approval from the sponsor to the Chief Clerk (original Bill must still be signed before start of session);

(2) Introduction from the floor while the House is in session if deemed necessary by the Speaker.

(c) A Bill or Resolution that is filed with the Clerk of the House while the House stands in recess, in adjournment, or is not otherwise meeting, shall be given a number and entered upon a docket kept for that purpose. At the beginning of the day's session following the filing of a Bill or Resolution with the Clerk, the Clerk shall introduce the Bill or Resolution.

(d) Introduction of the Bill or Resolution shall be considered the first reading. Unless otherwise ordered by the House, it shall be read by title only or by reference to the prefile list and assigned by the Speaker to its appropriate committee.

(e) Resolutions of condolence, congratulation or other non-controversial subject matter may be considered as part of a Consent Calendar without being assigned to a committee. A suspension of the Rules is required in order to consider any other type of Resolution without referring it to a committee.

(f) The prime sponsor(s) of a Bill or Resolution is the House member (or members whose names are joined by "and") listed first to the right of the word "sponsor" in the upper right side on the first page of a Bill or Resolution. A joint sponsor is any member of the House or Senate whose name is printed on the measure after the name of the prime sponsor. A co-sponsor is a member of the House or Senate whose name is not otherwise shown on the measure but who signs the backer of the measure.

(g) The chairman of the House Standing Committee to which a Senate Bill or Resolution has been assigned shall also be the floor manager of that measure unless he or she defers to a House sponsor.

(h) The sponsor of a Bill or Resolution may withdraw his or her sponsorship only by submitting a written request for this purpose to the Speaker. The written request shall then be attached to the original of the Bill or Resolution.

# Rule 18 - Last Thirty Days

No House Bill or Joint Resolution may be introduced in the House during the last thirty calendar days of the second session of the General Assembly.

Rule 19 - Assignment to Sunset Committee.

Every bill or joint resolution, whether emanating from the House or the Senate, amending Title 24 of the Delaware Code (which has been previously referred by the Speaker under the Rules to any committee of the House other than the Sunset Committee) shall, after the same has been reported back to the House, be referred to the Sunset Committee.

#### Rule 20 - Assignment to Appropriations Committee

Every Bill or Joint Resolution, whether emanating from the House or the Senate, carrying an appropriation or which may involve any financial loss or obligation either present or future on the part of the State of \$25,000 or more (which has been previously referred by the Speaker under the Rules to any committee of the House other than the Committee on Appropriations) shall, after the same has been reported back to the House, be referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

#### Rule 21 - Fiscal Notes

No Bill or Resolution either authorizing expenditures or reducing revenues as described in Chapter 19, Title 29 of the Delaware Code shall be placed before the House for consideration unless accompanied by a fiscal note as required by that Chapter.

Rule 22 - Final Readings and Consideration by House

(a) When brought before the House for consideration, each Bill and Joint Resolution shall be given its final reading by title unless the Speaker directs a reading in full. Each House or Senate Bill prior to final reading shall have been checked for errors and initialed as approved by a House attorney whose initials shall be affixed to the original.

(b) Every Bill or Joint Resolution in order to pass the House shall be read on two different days of the session unless a majority of the members elected to the House determine otherwise or unless the Bill or Joint Resolution is on a Consent Calendar and voted on as part of a single group. No Bill or Joint Resolution shall be brought before the House for passage on the same calendar day it is reported out of committee, nor in the absence of the sponsor without his written consent.

#### Rule 23 - Amendments

(a) Amendments to a measure may be introduced by prefiling or when the measure is being discussed on the floor.

(b) When an amendment to a Bill would significantly change the nature and intent of the Bill, such amendment shall contain a brief synopsis outlining the basic changes incurred.

(c) When an amendment to a Bill would significantly change the fiscal impact of that bill a new fiscal note shall accompany the amendment.

(d) If a Bill becomes significantly changed by amendment, the Speaker shall reassign the amended Bill to committee.

(e) No title of a Bill or Resolution, however, may be changed except for typographical errors.

(f) When the amendment sponsor is present, all prefiled amendments shall be acted upon before final action on the main Bill or Resolution.

(g) When a bill that has been previously amended is before the House and it is desired to remove the effects of such previous amendment from the bill, this may be done by another amendment that strikes the numbered lines of the earlier amendment, which shall have the effect of restoring the wording and punctuation of the bill as it existed immediately prior to the adoption of the earlier amendment.

#### Rule 24 - Substitute Bills

(a) A Substitute Bill may be introduced by the sponsor of the Bill and shall be assigned to committee and follow the same procedure as other Bills.

(b) Once assigned to committee the Substitute Bill shall render null and void the Bill for which it is a substitute.

(c) The title of a Substitute Bill must be identical to the title of the Bill for which it is substituted. Rule 25 - Petition of Bill or Resolution out of Committee

Every Bill or Resolution which shall have been in committee for a period of more than twelve legislative days shall, upon written request of the majority of the members elected to the House, be reported to the House for a decision as to its further disposal. Rule 26 - Voting

(a) Except as provided for in Rule 43, each Bill or Joint Resolution which comes before the House for final action shall be acted upon by a separate roll call vote.

(b) The names of the members of the House shall be called alphabetically, except the Speaker who shall vote last, and each shall, without debate or comment, answer 'yes', 'no', or 'not voting', from their respective seats.

(c) No member shall be permitted to change his or her vote after the decision shall have been announced by the Chief Clerk.

(d) A roll call may not be laid on the table.

(e) Whenever any member answers "not voting" because of a "personal or private interest" as defined in Article II, Section 20 of the Delaware Constitution, the record shall so reflect.

Rule 27 - Striking a Bill or Resolution

Only a prime sponsor of a Bill or Resolution or a member authorized by a prime sponsor in writing can strike said Bill or Resolution. A Bill or Resolution may not be stricken once it has been voted upon. Upon the termination of any member from the House, any bill not yet acted upon by the House which has solely that member as a prime sponsor will be stricken.

# V. COMMITTEES

# Rule 28 - Standing Committees

(a) The standing committees and subcommittees of the House shall include members of the two political parties and shall be appointed by the Speaker. The Speaker shall designate a chairman for each committee he appoints. The Chief Clerk shall keep a list of current standing committees and members appointed thereto.

(b) The following standing committees the beginning of each session of the General Assembly. (b) The following standing committees and subcommittees shall be appointed by the Speaker at the

- Rule 29 Appointment of Special Committees

The Speaker, on his own initiative or upon order of the House, may appoint Special Committees.

Rule 29A. <u>Ethics Committee</u>. (a) The Ethics Committee shall be a standing committee consisting of five members, three appointed by the Speaker and two appointed by the Minority Leader at the beginning of each General Assembly.

(b) The powers and duties of the Ethics Committee shall be as follows:

(1) To recommend to the House from time to time such rules of conduct for members of the House as it shall deem appropriate.

(2) To issue written advisory opinions upon the request of any member as to the applicability of any Rule of Legislative Conduct to any particular fact situation.

(3) To investigate any alleged violation by a member of any Rule of Legislative Conduct and, after notice and hearing, to recommend to the House by Resolution such disciplinary action as it may deem appropriate.

(4) To report to the appropriate federal or State authorities any substantial evidence of a violation by any member of any law involving a Rule of Legislative Conduct which may come to its attention in connection with any proceeding whether advisory or investigative.

(5) To maintain a file of its proceedings and advisory opinions with a view toward achieving consistency of opinions and recommendations. Upon the request of a legislator involved in an advisory opinion, to publish that advisory opinion.

(6) To follow the procedural rules specified in Rule 55 and to establish such other procedural rules as shall not be inconsistent with the rules prescribed by the House.

(7) To act only upon a majority vote of its members.

(8) Such other duties and responsibilities as may be assigned by the House from time to time.

(c) All proceedings before the Ethics Committee in connection with an advisory opinion shall be confidential subject to the following, (i) the member involved may waive the privilege of confidentiality, (ii) the proceedings shall no longer be confidential and may be made public in any subsequent disciplinary proceeding if the member acts in disregard of an advisory opinion, and (iii) the Ethics Committee shall maintain records of its proceedings and advisory opinions which shall be available for reference by the Committee, subsequent Committees and their staff.

(d) The Committee may undertake an investigation of an alleged violation by a member of any Rule of Legislative Conduct only upon a written complaint submitted by a member of the House. The complaint must be accompanied by a written statement signed by any person, sworn under oath, setting forth the facts supporting the complaint. In any such investigation or proceeding, a member shall be given an opportunity to be heard after notice, to be advised and assisted by legal counsel, to produce witnesses and offer evidence, and to cross- examine witnesses. A transcript of any such proceeding shall be made and retained. In any such proceeding the procedural rules of Rule 55 shall apply.

(e) A member of the Committee shall be ineligible to participate, as a member of the Committee, in any Committee proceeding relating to his or her legislative conduct. In any such case, the person appointing that member (either the Speaker or the Minority Leader) shall designate a member of the House to act as a member of the Committee in any Committee proceeding relating to the legislative conduct of such ineligible member. A member of the Committee who has been found by the House to have violated a Rule of Legislative Conduct shall be ineligible to serve again as a member of the Committee.

(f) A member of the Committee may disqualify himself from participating in any investigation of the conduct of a member of the House upon submission in writing and under oath of an affidavit of disqualification stating that he cannot render an impartial and unbiased decision in the case in which he seeks to disqualify himself. If the Committee approves and accepts such affidavit of disqualification, the chairman shall so notify the person appointing that member (either the Speaker or the Minority Leader) and request that person to designate a member of the House to act as a member of the Committee in any Committee proceeding relating to such investigation.

(g) Any member who acts in good faith reliance upon any written advisory opinion of the Ethics Committee shall not be subject to any discipline by the House with respect to the matters covered by the advisory opinion provided there was a full disclosure to the Ethics Committee of all facts necessary for the opinion.

(h) The Committee may function without regard to recess periods or adjournment.

Rule 30 - Joint Committees

The House of Representatives and the Senate by mutual agreement may establish a Joint Committee for some particular specified purpose. The House members of any Joint Committee shall be appointed by the Speaker. The Joint Committee shall select its own chairman and vice chairman.

Rule 31 - Quorum on Committees

A majority of the members of any committee, subcommittee or special committee shall constitute a quorum.

# Rule 32 - Committee Meetings

(a) During the legislative sessions, each standing committee of the House shall be assigned a regular meeting time by the Speaker. This shall not preclude the option of a committee chairman to cancel a regular or special meeting or call additional meetings when necessary, provided that such special or additional meetings are not scheduled during regular meeting times of standing committees. No committee meetings shall be held while the House is in session without the consent of the Speaker.

(b) All committee meetings shall be chaired by the chairman or in his or her absence by his or her designee.

(c) So far as may be applicable, the rules of the House shall be observed.

(d) All committee meetings will be open to the public except that the committee chairman may call an executive session at which no official action may be taken, in accordance with the provisions of Section 10004 (b) and (c) of Title 29.

Rule 33 - Deliberative Process and Procedures of Standing Committees

(a) Each Bill, Resolution or other legislative matter assigned to a standing committee shall pass through a prescribed deliberative process before being brought to the floor of the House, unless it is sooner petitioned out of committee. Such deliberative process shall include regularly scheduled, pre-announced meetings whereby the committee or subcommittee, after notice to the sponsor, makes time available for each formal sponsor to explain the legislation and answer possible questions, considers an analysis of the proposed legislation and receives testimony from the general public. (b) Each Thursday each standing committee shall release a Committee Agenda which shall include, among other things, all matters to be considered by the committee at its next meeting; a listing of all Bills or Resolutions in committee; and any other announcements from the committee including the times, places and dates of future meetings.

(c) Minutes shall be recorded for each formal standing committee meeting, and the results of any committee votes shall be included. If a measure is tabled, reasons for such action shall also be included. Committee members who dissent from any committee decision shall be permitted, in the minutes, to state such dissent and the reasons therefor.

(d) Bills and Resolutions shall be reported out of committee by a majority of the full committee signing the backer. (Bills and Resolutions shall be voted out of a subcommittee by a majority vote of the subcommittee.) A Bill or Resolution may be tabled in committee by a majority vote of the committee. In any case where a member is recorded as "not voting" on account of a "personal or private interest" as defined in Article II, Section 20 of the Delaware Constitution, that fact shall be noted in the Committee records and on the backer of the Bill concerned where applicable.

(e) All Bills and Resolutions shall be acted upon by the appropriate standing committee within twelve legislative days of that legislative session after being assigned to that committee.

(f) The Chairman will return the Bill or Resolution to the Chief Clerk within two legislative days after a Bill or Resolution has been voted out of committee.

(g) If a bill is unacceptable to the committee, a substitute bill may be introduced or the committee chairman on behalf of the committee may offer one or more amendments which shall take precedence in floor action over any other amendment(s). If the committee amendment(s) fails, the bill may be reassigned to the committee by the Speaker.

# Rule 34 - Committee Reports

Each Bill and Resolution reported out of committee shall have a printed or typewritten report which includes a summary of arguments for and against the legislation. A copy of this report shall be placed in each member's agenda book when the legislation appears on the agenda.

# Rule 35 - Committee Recommendations to Appropriations Committee

The committee chairman on behalf of the committee shall make budgetary recommendations to the appropriations committee.

#### Rule 36 - Committee of the Whole

The committee of the whole shall mean and include a committee of the entire membership of the House with the Speaker as Chairman. So far as may be applicable, the rules of the House shall be observed in the committee of the whole.

#### VI. MOTIONS

# Rule 37 - Debate and Vote on Motions

(a) After a motion is stated by the Speaker or read by the Clerk, it is in the possession of the House, but with the consent of the House, it may be withdrawn at any time before a decision thereon.

(b) After debate or discussion, the motion shall be repeated by the Speaker before putting the question to the House.

(c) Every motion shall be decided in a fair and impartial manner by the Speaker. The vote of a majority of the members present shall prevail in the case of a motion to recess, incidental motions, subsidiary motions, or other motions presenting questions of a general procedural nature. The vote of a majority of the members elected to the House shall prevail in the case of privileged motions (except a motion to recess), main motions, or other motions presenting questions of a substantive nature. Such voting shall prevail unless contrary to these Rules or unless it is in conflict with the statutes or provisions of the Constitution of the State of Delaware.

(d) The Speaker may cause, or any member may call for, a division in which case the members voting in the affirmative shall be required to rise for the purpose of being counted by the Clerk of the House.

(e) At the request of any member, the vote on any measure shall be by roll call vote.

(f) 'Measure' as used in these Rules means a Bill, Resolution, Amendment, motion, or other question before the House.

#### Rule 38 - Precedence of Motions

(a) If a question is before the House, no motion may be received except one of the following, and they have precedence in the order listed:

(1) To adjourn <u>sine die</u>. If a motion to postpone indefinitely is pending when this motion is made, this motion is not debatable.

(2) To adjourn. This motion is not debatable and can neither be amended nor reconsidered. The motion shall state the hour and day to which it is proposed the House adjourn. A motion to adjourn having been determined in the negative, another motion to adjourn cannot be put to the House until some legislative business has intervened. This motion is out of order on the legislative day for the final calendar day of any session.

(3) To recess. If a motion to postpone indefinitely is pending when this motion is made, this motion is not debatable. This motion is passed by a majority of those members present.

(4) Question of Privilege.

(5) All incidental motions.

(6) To table.

(7) Motion to call the previous question. A motion to call the previous question shall not be entertained except at the request of five members rising for that purpose and so indicating and shall be determined by roll call vote without debate. When the previous question has been called and sustained, it shall not cut off action on amendments to the main measure and the vote shall be taken without debate first on the amendments in order and then on the main measure.

(8) To limit debate.

(9) Postpone to a day certain.

(10) To commit to committee.

(11) To amend. An amendment may be offered to an amendment, but no motion may be accepted which would amend an amendment to an amendment.

(12) To postpone indefinitely. This motion is not debatable, may not be amended, and if carried affirmatively, may not be reconsidered.

(13) To reconsider.

(14) To take from the table.

(b) No motion may be received after a vote upon the question then before the House has been called for by the Speaker.

# Rule 39 - Motion for Reconsideration

(a) No motion for reconsideration shall be in order unless made on the same legislative day or on one of the three next succeeding legislative days. If the original vote was taken by a recorded vote of yeas and nays, this motion can be made only by a member who voted with the prevailing side; i.e, a reconsideration can be moved only by one who voted 'aye' if the motion involved was adopted or 'no' if the motion was lost. If the original vote was not taken by a recorded vote of yeas and nays, it is in order for any member to move for the reconsideration thereof.

(b) When a Bill, Resolution, Report, Amendment, Order or Message, upon which a vote has been taken, shall have gone out of possession of the House and been communicated to the Senate, or the Governor, the motion to reconsider shall be accompanied by a motion in writing, attested to by the Speaker, to request the Senate or the Governor to return the same; which last motion shall be acted upon immediately and without debate, and if determined in the negative shall be a final disposition of the motion to reconsider.

# Rule 40 - Motion to Take From the Table

(a) After a measure has been laid on the table, only the following persons may move to lift such measure from the table:

(1) In the case of a House measure, only the prime sponsor of the measure or a member authorized in writing by the prime sponsor.

(2) In the case of a Senate measure, only the floor manager of a measure or a member authorized in writing by the floor manager.

(b) A motion to take a measure from the table may only be made on the same legislative day the measure is tabled or if this motion is listed on the Agenda. The motion is not subject to debate.

# VII. CALENDAR AND AGENDA

# Rule 41 - House Calendar

The Clerk of the House shall keep a House Calendar on which shall be placed the number and title of all Bills and Resolutions and the name of the prime and joint sponsors thereof; and if reported from committee, the action of the committee thereon. Said Bills and Resolutions shall be kept on the Calendar and final action recorded. Measures which lie over and are not disposed of shall be placed in the order in which they are presented.

# Rule 42 - Agenda

(a) The Speaker shall place items on the agenda pursuant to Rule 10 of these rules.

(b) In lifting bills from the table, the motion to lift is the agenda item.

(c) Any House Bill amended by the Senate shall either be placed on the Agenda or if significantly changed by amendment, then assigned to committee.

(d) Measures brought to the top of the Agenda for the day shall be permitted only to be:

1. Deferred to day certain; or

2. Deferred to the end of agenda one time only; or

- 3. Laid on the table; or
- 4. Otherwise considered.

# Rule 43 - Consent Calendar

(a) Any member of the House may propose any Bill or Resolution for inclusion on a Consent Calendar for final reading. The proposal shall be made in writing in the office of the Chief Clerk on any day. There shall be separate consent calendars for Bills and Resolutions and all Bills on a particular Consent Calendar shall have the same majority vote requirements.

(b) Consent Calendars may be considered on any Wednesday the House is in session.

(c) A Bill or Resolution shall be removed from a Consent Calendar if any member objects to its being included thereon and registers his or her objection in the office of the Chief Clerk, not later than one hour prior to the time the Consent Calendar is scheduled for consideration by the House. In addition, a Bill or Resolution may not be included on a Consent Calendar either if at the time of reading a Consent Calendar an amendment to it is proposed or if a member objects to its inclusion thereon.

(d) All Bills or Resolutions on a Consent Calendar shall be read and voted upon as a single group.

# Rule 44 - Announcement of Agenda; Delivery of Bills and Resolutions

(a) The Chief Clerk shall lay upon the desk of the Speaker at the beginning of each day's session all Bills, Resolutions and motions pending before the House that day, properly arranged and classified.

(b) Prior to the beginning of each legislative day, the Chief Clerk shall provide to each member, a printed copy by number, sponsor and/or committee, the Bills, Resolutions or other measures that are being placed on the Agenda for that legislative day. The Agenda shall not contain more than 30 items.

(c) All Bills and Resolutions originating in the House, or Senate Bills or Resolutions to which the House has added amendments or its concurrence, shall be delivered to the Senate by the Chief Clerk of the House or by the Bill Clerk within the three next succeeding legislative days.

#### VIII. MISCELLANEOUS

#### Rule 45 - Offices, Parking Spaces and Seats

Seats on the floor of the House, offices, and parking spaces shall be allocated to the members by the Speaker.

# Rule 46 - Authorized Manual of Parliamentary Procedure

In all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these Rules, the rules of parliamentary procedure comprised in Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall govern the House.

Rule 47 - <u>Supervision of Legislative Staff</u> The Chief Clerk, or in his or her absence, the Assistant Chief Clerk, shall at all times have jurisdiction over the members of the legislative staff. In this respect, the Chief Clerk, or the Assistant Chief Clerk, shall be directly responsible to the Speaker and House Administration Committee. The Chief Clerk of the House will maintain on file job descriptions for all positions within the legislative staff.

# Rule 48 - Registration and Identification of News Media

(a) Accredited representatives of the daily and weekly press, press associations, and of radio and television stations shall be accorded equal press privileges by the House Administration Committee. Any person wishing to report proceedings of the House may apply to said Committee for assignment of suitable available space.

(b) On approval of the House Administration Committee, radio and television stations shall be permitted to air and record sessions of the House.

(c) Any use or reproduction of House tapes will require permission of the Speaker of the House and the request shall be communicated to the Chief Clerk in writing. A fee may be charged for this service. Rule 49 - Registration and Identification of Legislative Agents

(a) Legislative agents shall be registered by Legislative Council.

# Rule 50 - Privilege of Floor

The privilege of the floor may be granted by the Speaker upon request of any member, unless an objection is sustained by a majority of members present and voting.

# Rule 51 - Persons on the Floor of the House

(a) No person may be admitted to the floor of the House while it is in session unless specifically invited by a member and with the consent of the Speaker except the following: former Governors, former members of the House, former members of the Senate (but none of the foregoing has this privileged admission without consent if he is paid to act as a registered legislative agent as defined in Chapter 16, Title 29 of the Delaware Code), duly designated representatives of the Governor of Delaware, members of the House and the Senate and their staffs, representatives of the Legislative Council, representatives of each Cabinet Department, reporters for each of the daily newspapers published in the State, a reasonable number of other accredited correspondents as determined by the Speaker and a reasonable number of representatives of radio and television broadcasting stations (together with necessary equipment) as determined by the Speaker.

(b) No one other than a member shall sit in a member's seat while the House is in session.

(c) Only members of the House or House staff shall be allowed to smoke in the House Chamber while the House is in session.

#### Rule 52 - Suspension of Rules

The suspension of any Rule requires the concurrence of at least a majority of the Members elected to the House. This motion is debatable but does not permit discussion of the main question. It can neither be reconsidered, laid on the table, nor postponed indefinitely, and while it is pending no motion may be made except to adjourn. A separate suspension of the Rules is necessary for each proposition. Rule 53 - Repeal or Amendment of Rules

No motion, order or Resolution to repeal or amend a Rule of the House may be considered or acted upon unless it has been submitted in writing to the House at least one day prior thereto, together with the written text of any proposed amendment. The repeal or amendment of any Rule of the House requires the concurrence of at least a majority of the Members elected to the House.

#### Rule 54 - Rules to be Printed

These Rules shall be printed by the Legislative Council, upon adoption, in a pocket-sized edition which shall also contain the following materials:

- (a) A list of the Officers of the House;
- (b) The membership of the Standing Committees of the House;
   (c) The Constitutional vote requirements for passage of legislation; and

(d) Requirements set forth elsewhere directly relating to House action - such as the fiscal note requirement.

# Rule 55. Ethics Violations; Rules of Procedure.

#### Rule 55.1. Scope and Authority.

These rules govern the procedures to be followed by the Ethics Committee and the House in proceedings involving allegations of violations of rules of Legislative Conduct. So far as applicable, these rules and the Rules of the House of Representatives shall be the rules of the Ethics Committee which may prescribe additional rules not inconsistent therewith.

# PROCEEDINGS BEFORE THE ETHICS COMMITTEE.

Rule 55.2. Meetings and Quorum.

(a) The Committee shall meet at the call of the Chairman. Notice of a Committee meeting shall be given pursuant to the Rules of the House of Representatives.

(b) A quorum of the Committee consists of a majority of the members of the Committee.

Rule 55.3. Committee Records.

(a) The Chairman of the Committee shall, with the approval of the Committee, establish such procedures as in the Chairman's judgment may be necessary to prevent the unauthorized disclosure of any testimony or other information received by the Committee or its staff.

(b)(1) Unless otherwise authorized by the Committee, no information received by the Committee respecting any alleged violation by a member of the House of Representatives of any Rule of Legislative Conduct shall be disclosed to the public before the transmittal under Rule 55.8 to such member of a statement of alleged violation in connection with such violation. After the service of such a statement on the member:

(2) the statement and any other paper filed pursuant to Rule 55.9 respecting such violation shall be made available for public inspection at reasonable hours, and

(3) any other paper filed with the Committee respecting such violation shall be made available as authorized by the Committee, except that no paper shall be made available if its disclosure would violate any law or regulation.

# Rule 55.4. Special Procedures.

The Committee may adopt by Resolution any special procedures deemed necessary to a particular matter before the Committee. Copies of such special procedures shall be furnished to all parties and witnesses in the matter.

# Rule 55.5. Changes in Committee Rules.

The rules of the Committee other than these rules may be modified, amended or repealed by a vote of a majority of the Committee.

# COMMITTEE INVESTIGATIVE AUTHORITY.

Rule 55.6. Complaints.

(a) A complaint may be submitted to the Committee pursuant to Subsection (c) of this rule and shall be in writing and under oath, setting forth in simple, concise and direct statements the following:

(1) the name and address of the party filing the complaint (hereinafter referred to as the 'complainant');

(2) the name of the member of the House of Representatives alleged to be in violation of a Rule of Legislative Conduct (hereinafter referred to as the 'respondent');

(3) a statement of each violation, identifying the Rule of Legislative Conduct alleged to have been violated, divided into counts with each violation representing a separate count; and

(4) the facts alleged to give rise to the violation. The facts supporting the complaint may be sworn to by any person. When facts are alleged upon the information and belief of the complainant, the complaint shall so state and set forth the basis for such information and belief.

(b) All documents in the possession of the complainant that are relevant to and in support of the allegations shall be appended to the complaint.

(c) A complaint may be filed only by a member of the House of Representatives (including a member of the Committee) and shall be transmitted directly to the Committee.

Rule 55.7. Processing Complaints.

(a)(1) The Staff of the Committee shall examine each complaint submitted to the Committee for compliance with the Rules of the House of Representatives and any other applicable Committee rules.

(2) If the staff determines that a complaint does not comply with House and Committee rules, the complaint shall be returned to the complainant with a general statement that the complaint is not in compliance with such rules and a copy of such rules. A complainant may resubmit a complaint.

(3) If the staff determines that a complaint is in compliance with House and Committee rules, the complaint shall be filed with the Committee and a copy shall be transmitted to each member of the Committee.

(4) The Chairman shall place the complaint on the Committee agenda for consideration and shall schedule a Committee meeting as soon as practical thereafter.

(A) The Committee shall consider the complaint and determine if the complaint should be dismissed because it fails to allege facts which constitute a violation of a Rule of Legislative Conduct or if the complaint merits further inquiry.

(B) The decision under subparagraph (A) of this paragraph shall be transmitted in writing to the complainant and respondent.

(b)(1) If the Committee determines that the complaint fails to allege facts which constitute a violation of a Rule of Legislative Conduct, the Committee shall deliver to the House a report of the action taken and a brief statement of the reasons therefor.

(2) If there are no dissenting votes to the determination in subparagraph (b)(1), the complaint shall be considered dismissed and neither the Committee nor the House shall take any further action with respect thereto.

(3) If there are any dissenting votes to the determination in subparagraph (b)(1), the complaint shall be considered dismissed and neither the Committee nor the House shall take any further action with respect thereto provided that the Committee's determination shall be considered reversed and the investigation shall be pursued by the Committee upon the written petition of any member of the House filed with the Speaker and approved by the majority vote of the members of the House. Rule 53.8. Preliminary Inquiry and Statement of Alleged Violation.

(a)(1) If the Committee determines under Rule 55.7 that the allegation of a violation in a complaint filed with the Committee merits further inquiry, or if the Committee's determination in that regard is reversed by the House, the Committee shall conduct a preliminary inquiry to determine whether such violation occurred.

(2) In the preliminary inquiry:

(A) the respondent shall have an opportunity to present to the Committee, orally or in writing, a statement respecting the allegations with respect to which the inquiry is being held;
 (B) the staff may interview witnesses and examine documents and other evidentiary

matter;

(C) the Committee may order the testimony of witnesses to be taken under oath, in which event the oath may be administered by a member of the Committee or by any person authorized by a member of the Committee or any person authorized by law to administer oaths;

(D) the Committee may require, by subpoena or otherwise, the attendance and testimony of witnesses and the production of such books, records, correspondence, memoranda, papers, documents and other things as it deems necessary to the conduct of the inquiry; and

(E) any probative evidence may be used.

Upon the completion of the preliminary inquiry, the staff of the Committee shall prepare and transmit to the Committee a report containing a comprehensive summary of the information received in the inquiry and may include in the report a recommendation for action by the Committee respecting the alleged violations which was the subject of the inquiry.

(b) If the Committee determines on the basis of the report of the Committee staff on the preliminary inquiry respecting an alleged violation that there is reason to believe that the violation occurred, the Committee shall direct the staff to transmit to the respondent a statement of alleged violation. A statement shall be divided into counts and each count shall relate to a separate violation and shall contain a plain and concise statement of the alleged facts of such violation and include a reference to the provision of the Rule of Legislative Conduct alleged to have been violated.

(c)(1) If the Committee determines on the basis of the report of the Committee staff on the preliminary inquiry that there is no reason to believe that the violation occurred, the Committee shall deliver to the House a report of the action taken together with a statement of the reasons therefor.

(2) If there are no dissenting votes to the determination in subparagraph (c)(1), the complaint shall be considered dismissed and neither the Committee nor the House shall take any further action with respect thereto.

(3) If there are any dissenting votes to the determination in subparagraph (c)(1), the complaint shall be considered dismissed and neither the Committee nor the House shall take any further action with respect to the matter provided that the House shall consider the matter upon the written petition of any member of the House filed with the Speaker and approved by the majority vote of the members of the House.

If any such proceeding is initiated in the House, the matter shall be prosecuted by the members of the Committee who dissented from the vote to dismiss the complaint. In such case, the dissenting members shall direct the Committee staff to transmit to the House and to the respondent, a statement of alleged violation as described in Subsection (b) which shall be the basis of the House's consideration of the matter.

Rule 55.9. Answers and Motions and Committee Action.

(a) If a statement of alleged violation is transmitted under Rule 55.8(b), the respondent shall have 20 calendar days in which to respond. The response shall be by way of answer or motion, shall be in writing and signed by the respondent or his counsel, and shall be limited to the following:

(1) An admission or denial of, under oath, each count set forth in the statement plus any supportive evidence and any other relevant information which the respondent may desire to submit.

(2) An objection to any count in the statement on the grounds that it fails to state a fact which constitutes a violation of a Rule of Legislative Conduct.

(3) An objection to the jurisdiction of the Committee to consider the allegations contained in the statement.

(4) A motion for a bill of particulars.

(5) An objection to the participation of any member of the Committee in the consideration of the allegations contained in the statement on the grounds that the member cannot render an impartial or unbiased decision. The Committee member against whom the objection is made shall be the sole judge of his gualifications. A motion under this paragraph is not in lieu of an answer. Any motion submitted pursuant to this rule shall be accompanied by a memorandum of points and authorities. Except for good cause shown, no pleading or motion not described in paragraphs (1) through (5) will be considered by the Committee and the Committee will not consider any answer or motion in such paragraphs which is submitted under this rule after the expiration of such 20 calendar days.

(b) Within 10 calendar days after the receipt of any motion under Subsection (a) of this rule, the Committee shall consider such motion. Notice of the decision of the Committee respecting such motion shall be furnished the respondent.

When the Committee has acted on all motions submitted under paragraphs (2), (3) and (4) of Subsection (a) of this rule, the respondent shall, in accordance with paragraph (a)(1) of this rule, submit, within 10 calendar days of the date of the last Committee action, an answer to each count in the statement not dismissed by the Committee.

(c) Failure to submit, within the applicable time period, an answer to a count of a statement which has not been dismissed by the Committee, shall constitute an admission to the violation alleged in the count.

(d) The Chairman, in his discretion, may extend or shorten any time limitations imposed by this rule if he determines that the extension would facilitate a fair and complete inquiry or the shorter time is required because of special circumstances.

(e)(1) As soon as practical after the expiration of all applicable time limitations for action under Subsections (a) and (b) of this rule, the Committee shall act, by the vote of a majority of the members of the Committee, to:

(A) hold a disciplinary hearing on the violation charged in the statement;

(B) defer action on the statement, but only if there is a grand jury or judicial proceeding pending; or

(C) dismiss the statement.

(2) The respondent shall be notified in writing of action taken under paragraph (1) of this Subsection.

(f)(1) If the Committee votes to dismiss the statement, the Committee shall deliver to the House a report of the action taken together with a statement of the reasons therefor.

(2) If there are no dissenting votes to the decision in subparagraph (f)(1), the statement shall be considered dismissed and neither the Committee nor the House shall take any further action with respect thereto.

(3) If there are any dissenting votes to the decision in subparagraph (f)(1), the statement shall be considered dismissed and neither the Committee nor the House shall take any further action with respect to the matter provided that the House shall consider the matter upon the written petition of any member of the House filed with the Speaker and approved by a majority vote of the members of the House. If any such proceeding is initiated in the House, the matter shall be prosecuted by the members of the Committee who dissented from the vote to dismiss the statement. The statement shall be the basis of the House's consideration of the matter and the dissenting members shall cause a copy of the statement to be delivered to the House and served upon the respondent.

Rule 55.10. Disciplinary Hearings before the Committee.

(a) A disciplinary hearing respecting a violation charged in a Statement of Alleged Violation shall be held by the Committee to receive evidence upon which to base findings of fact and recommendations, if any, to the House respecting such violation. A disciplinary hearing shall consist of two phases. The first phase shall be for the purpose of determining whether or not the count in the statement have been proved. The second phase shall be for the purpose of determining what action to recommend to the House with respect to any count found to have been proved.

(b) At a disciplinary hearing the Committee may require, by subpoena or otherwise, the attendance and testimony of such witnesses and the production of such books, records, correspondence, memoranda, papers, documents and any other things as it deems necessary. Depositions, interrogatories and sworn statements taken under Committee direction may be accepted into the Committee record.

(c) Prior to setting a date for a disciplinary hearing and issuing subpoenas for witnesses, the Committee shall resolve the scope and purpose of the hearing. A copy of this statement of scope and purpose shall be furnished to all witnesses. During the course of the hearing the Committee may expand or contract the scope in light of evidence received.

(d)(1) The order of phase one of a disciplinary hearing shall be as follows:

(A) The Chairman shall open the hearing by stating the Committee's authority to conduct the hearing, the purpose of the hearing and its scope.

(B) Testimony from witnesses and other evidence pertinent to the subject of the hearing shall be received in the following order whenever possible, (i) witnesses and other evidence offered by the Committee staff, (ii) witnesses and other evidence offered by the respondent, and (iii) rebuttal witnesses.

(C) Witnesses at a hearing shall be examined first by the Committee counsel or authorized staff member. The Committee members may then question the witnesses. The respondent or his counsel may then cross-examine the witnesses. Redirect and recross may be permitted in the Chairman's discretion. With respect to witnesses offered by the respondent, a witness shall be examined first by the respondent or his counsel, and then may be cross examined by Committee counsel or authorized staff member. Committee members may then question the witness.

Redirect and recross may be permitted in the Chairman's discretion.

(2) Testimony of all witnesses shall be taken under oath. The oath shall be administered by the Chairman or Committee member designated by him to administer oaths.

(e) At a disciplinary hearing the burden of proof rests on the staff with respect to each count to establish the facts alleged therein clearly and convincingly by the evidence that it introduces.

(f) Phase two of a disciplinary hearing shall consist of oral and/or written submission by counsel for the Committee and counsel for the respondent as to the sanction the Committee should recommend to the House with respect to any count of the Statement of Alleged Violation which has been proved. Testimony by witnesses will not be heard at phase two except by a vote of a majority of the Committee.

# Rule 55.11. Committee Recommendations.

(a)(1) As soon as practicable after the completion of the first phase of a disciplinary hearing respecting a Statement of Alleged Violation, the Committee shall consider each count contained in the statement and with respect to each count as originally drawn or as amended shall vote either to find that the count has been proved or to dismiss the count. A count shall not be proved unless at least a majority of the Committee vote for a motion that the count has been proved.

(2) If the Committee votes that a count has been proved, the Committee may, upon completion of the second phase of the disciplinary hearing, by a majority vote of the Committee, consider and vote on a motion that a recommendation be made to the House for appropriate action respecting the violation charged in such count.

(b) With respect to any violation with which a member of the House was charged in a count which the Committee has voted as proved, the Committee may include in its recommendations to the House one or more of the following sanctions:

(1) Suspension or expulsion from the House.

- Censure.
- (3) Reprimand.
- (4) Fine.

(5) Any other sanction determined by the Committee to be appropriate.

(c) The Committee report accompanying a recommendation to the House adopted by the Committee under clause (a)(2) respecting a violation charged in a count shall contain a statement of the evidence which supported the finding as to that count and a statement of the Committee's reasons for the recommendation as well as a statement of the Committee's reasons for finding that any count was not proved. The Committee shall cause a copy of the Committee's report and the Statement of Alleged Violation to be served upon the respondent. The statement shall be the basis of the Houses's consideration of the matter.

(d)(1) If the Committee votes to dismiss all counts of a statement and there are no dissenting votes, the statement shall be considered dismissed and neither the Committee nor the House shall take any further action with respect thereto.

(2) If there are any dissenting votes to the determination in subparagraph (d)(1), the statement shall be considered dismissed and neither the Committee nor the House shall take any further action with respect thereto provided that the House shall consider the matter upon the written petition of any member of the House filed with the Speaker and approved by a majority vote of all members of the House. If any such proceeding is initiated in the House, the matter shall be prosecuted by the members of the Committee who dissented from the vote to dismiss. The statement shall be the basis of the House's consideration of the matter and the dissenting members of the Committee shall cause a copy of the statement to be delivered to the House and served upon the respondent. Rule 53.12. Disclosure of Evidence.

Upon the request of a respondent, the Committee may permit the respondent to inspect, copy or photograph books, papers, documents, photographs or other tangible objects which the Committee intends to use as evidence against the respondent in a disciplinary hearing and which are material to the preparation of the defense of the respondent.

Rule 55.13. Exculpatory Information.

If the Committee at any time receives any exculpatory information respecting a Statement of Alleged Violation against a member of the House of any law, rule, regulation or other standard of conduct, it shall forthwith make such information available to such member.

# Rule 55.14. Admissibility of Evidence.

(a) Any evidence that is relevant and probative shall be admissible in any hearing of the Committee, unless the evidence is privileged or unless the Constitution otherwise requires its exclusion. Objections going only to the weight that should be given to evidence will not justify its exclusion.

(b) The Chairman or other member presiding at a hearing shall rule upon any question of admissibility at the hearing of testimony or evidence presented to the Committee. The Chairman or other member presiding may limit the presentation of repetitious evidence. Rulings shall be final unless reversed or modified by a majority vote of the Committee members present. Rule 55.15. Witnesses.

(a) A subpoena to a witness to appear at a hearing shall be served sufficiently in advance of his scheduled appearance to allow him a reasonable period of time, as determined by the Committee, to prepare for the hearing and to employ counsel should he so desire.

(b) Except as otherwise specifically authorized by the Chairman, no member of the Committee or staff shall make public the name of any witness subpoenaed by the Committee before the date of his scheduled appearance.

(c) Witnesses at hearings may be accompanied by their counsel for the purpose of advising them concerning their constitutional rights and to raise objections to the admissibility of testimony and evidence. Counsel for a witness other than the respondent shall not be permitted to engage in oral argument with the Committee. After a witness has testified, his counsel may submit to the Committee, in writing, any questions he wishes propounded to his client and any request for additional witnesses or other evidence. Such request may be granted at the Committee's discretion.

(d) The respondent may apply to the Committee for the issuance of subpoenas for the appearance of witnesses or the production of documents on his behalf. The application shall be granted upon a concise showing by the respondent that the proposed testimony or evidence is relevant and not otherwise available. The application shall be denied if not made at a reasonable time or if the testimony or evidence would be merely cumulative. (e) Each witness appearing before the Committee shall be furnished a printed copy of the rules of the Committee.

# PROCEEDINGS BEFORE THE HOUSE

# Rule 55.16. Records of House Proceedings.

All papers filed in the House with respect to a proceeding involving an allegation of a violation of a Rule of Legislative Conduct shall be made available for public inspection at reasonable hours except that no paper shall be made available if its disclosure would violate any law or regulation. Rule 55.17. Special Procedures.

The House may adopt by Resolution any special procedures deemed necessary to a particular matter before the House. Copies of such special procedures shall be furnished to all parties and witnesses in the matter.

Rule 55.18. Consideration of Complaints by the House.

(a) If a Statement of Alleged Violation is served upon a respondent pursuant to Rule 55.8(c)(3), 55.9(f)(3), 55.11(c) or 55.11(d)(2), the respondent shall have 20 calendar days in which to respond. The response shall be by way of answer or motion, shall be in writing and signed by the respondent or his counsel, and shall be limited to the following:

(1) An admission or denial of, under oath, each count set forth in the Statement plus any supportive evidence and any other relevant information which the respondent may desire to submit.

(2) An objection to any count in the Statement on the grounds that it fails to state a fact which constitutes a violation of a Rule of Legislative Conduct.

(3) An objection to the jurisdiction of the House to consider the allegations contained in the Statement.

(4) A motion for a bill of particulars.

(5) An objection to the participation of any member of the House in the consideration of the allegations contained in the Statement on the grounds that the member cannot render an impartial or unbiased decision. The member of the House against whom the objection is made shall be the sole judge of his qualifications. A motion under this paragraph is not in lieu of an answer.

Any motion submitted pursuant to this rule shall be accompanied by a memorandum of points and authorities. Except for good cause shown, no pleading of motion not described in paragraphs (1) through (5) will be considered by the House and the House will not consider any answer or motion in such paragraphs which is submitted under this rule after the expiration of such 20 calendar days.

(b) As soon as practical after the receipt of any motion under Subsection (a) of this rule, the House shall consider such motion. Notice of the decision of the House respecting such motion shall be furnished the respondent. When the House has acted on all motions submitted under paragraphs (2), (3) and (4) of Subsection (a) of this rule, the respondent shall in accordance with paragraph (a)(1) of this rule, submit, within 10 calendar days of the date of the last House action, an answer to each count in the statement not dismissed by the House.

(c) Failure to submit, within the applicable time period, an answer to a count of a statement which has not been dismissed by the House shall constitute an admission to the violation alleged in the count.

(d) The Speaker, in his discretion, may extend or shorten any time limitations imposed by this rule if he determines that the extension would facilitate a fair and complete inquiry or the shorter time is required because of special circumstances.

(e)(1) As soon as practical after the expiration of all applicable time limitations for action under Subsections (a) and (b) of this rule, the House shall act, by the vote of the majority of the members, to:

(A) hold a disciplinary hearing on the violation charged in the statement;

(B) defer action on the statement but only if there is a grand jury or judicial proceeding pending; or

(C) dismiss the statement or any counts thereof.

(2) The respondent shall be notified in writing of action taken under paragraph (1) of this Subsection.

Rule 55.19. Disciplinary Hearings.

(a) A disciplinary hearing respecting a violation charged in a Statement of Alleged Violation shall be held by the House to receive evidence respecting such violation. A disciplinary hearing shall consist of two phases. The first phase shall be for the purpose of determining whether or not the counts in the statement have been proved. The second phase shall be for the purpose of determining what disciplinary action to take with respect to any count found to have been proved.

(b) At a disciplinary hearing the House may require, by subpoena or otherwise, the attendance and testimony of such witnesses and the production of such books, records, correspondence, memoranda, papers, documents and any other things as it deems necessary. Depositions, interrogatories and sworn statements taken under House direction may be accepted into the House record

(c) Prior to setting a date for a disciplinary hearing and issuing subpoenas for witnesses, the House shall resolve the scope and purpose of the hearing. A copy of this statement of scope and purpose shall be furnished to all witnesses. During the course of the hearing the House may expand or contract the scope in light of evidence received.

(d) (1) The order of phase one of a disciplinary hearing shall be as follows:

(A) The Speaker shall open the hearing by stating the House's authority to conduct the hearing, the purpose of the hearing and its scope.

(B) Testimony from witnesses and other evidence pertinent to the subject of the hearing shall be received in the following order whenever possible, (i) witnesses and other evidence offered by the committee staff, (ii) witnesses and other evidence offered by the respondent, and (iii) rebuttal witnesses.

(C) Witnesses at a hearing shall be examined first by the committee counsel or authorized staff member. Members of the committee may then question the witnesses. The respondent or his counsel may then cross-examine the witnesses. Redirect and recross may be permitted in the Speaker's discretion. With respect to witnesses offered by the respondent, a witness shall be examined first by the respondent or his counsel and then may be cross-examined by committee counsel or authorized staff member. Committee members may then question the witness. Redirect and recross may be permitted in the Speaker's discretion.

(2) Testimony of all witnesses shall be taken under oath. The oath shall be administered by the committee member designated by the Speaker to administer oaths.

(e) At a diciplinary hearing the burden of proof rests on the committee with respect to each count to establish the facts alleged therein clearly and convincingly by the evidence that it introduces.

(f) Phase two of a disciplinary hearing shall consist of oral and/or written submission by counsel for the committee and counsel for the respondent as to the sanction the House should impose with respect to any count of the Statement which has been proved. Testimony by witnesses will not be heard at phase two except by a vote of a majority of the House.

(g) The House by Resolution may establish rules by which members of the House other than members of the Ethics Committee may participate in a disciplinary proceeding before the House. Rule 55.20. Findings; Sanctions.

(a)(1) As soon as practicable after the completion of the first phase of a disciplinary hearing respecting a Statement, the House shall consider each count contained in the Statement and with respect to each count as originally drawn or as amended shall vote on a motion that the count has been proved. A count shall not be proved unless at least a majority of the House vote for a motion that the count has been proved. A count which is not proved shall be considered as dismissed by the House.

(2) If the House votes that a count has been proved, the House may upon completion of the second phase of the disciplinary hearing, by a majority vote consider and vote on a motion that any of the following sanctions be imposed respecting the violation charged in such count;

(1) Suspension or expulsion from the House.

- (2) Censure.
- (3) Reprimand.
- (4) Fine.

(5) Any other sanction determined by the committee to be appropriate.

A member of the House may not be suspended or expelled from the House unless by a vote concurred in by two-thirds of the members.

Rule 55.21. Disclosure of Evidence.

Upon the request of a respondent, the committee may permit the respondent to inspect, copy or photograph books, papers, documents, photographs or other tangible objects which the committee intends to use as evidence against the respondent in a disciplinary hearing before the House and which are material to the preparation of the defense of the respondent.

Rule 55.22. Exculpatory Information.

If the Committee at any time receives any exculpatory information respecting a Statement of Alleged Violation against a member of the House of any law, rule, regulation, or other standard of conduct, it shall forthwith make such information available to such member.

Rule 55.23. Admissibility of Evidence.

(a) Any evidence that is relevant and probative shall be admissible in any hearing before the House, unless the evidence is privileged or unless the Constitution otherwise requires its exclusion. Objections going only to the weight that should be given to evidence will not justify its exclusion.

(b) The Speaker or other member presiding at a hearing shall rule upon any question of admissibility at the hearing of testimony or evidence presented to the House. The Speaker or other member presiding may limit the presentation of repetitious evidence.

Rule 55.24. Witnesses.

(a) A subpoena to a witness to appear at a hearing shall be served sufficiently in advance of his scheduled appearance to allow him a reasonable period of time, as determined by the Speaker, to prepare for the hearing and to employ counsel should he so desire.

(b) Except as otherwise specifically authorized by the Speaker, no member of the Committee or staff shall make public the name of any witness subpoenaed by the Committee before the date of his scheduled appearance.

(c) Witnesses at hearings may be accompanied by their counsel for the purpose of advising them concerning their constitutional rights and to raise objections to the admissibility of testimony and evidence. Counsel for a witness other than the respondent shall not be permitted to engage in oral argument before the House. After a witness has testified, his counsel may submit to the Speaker in writing, any questions he wishes propounded to his client and any request for additional witnesses or other evidence. Such request may be granted at the Speaker's discretion.

(d) The respondent may apply to the Speaker for the issuance of subpoenas for the appearance of witnesses or the production of documents on his behalf. The application shall be granted upon a concise showing by the respondent that the proposed testimony or evidence is relevant and not otherwise available. The application shall be denied if not made at a reasonable time or if the testimony or evidence would be merely cumulative.

(e) Each witness appearing before the House shall be furnished a printed copy of the rules of the House.

#### 1st LEGISLATIVE DAY 133rd GENERAL ASSEMBLY First Session

#### January 8, 1985

Pursuant to Article II, Section 4 of the State Constitution, the 133rd General Assembly, State of Delaware, convened on Tuesday, January 8, 1985.

Acting Speaker Smith called the House to order at 2:20 p.m.

JOINT SESSION House Chamber January 10, 1985

The House reconvened at 6:40 p.m. for a Joint Session in the House Chamber for Governor du Pont's Farewell Address.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the Chief Justice and other members of the Judiciary. They were admitted and seated.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the Members of the Governor's Cabinet and other elected officials. They were admitted and seated.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the Members of the Senate. They were admitted and seated.

The Speaker appointed Senator Marshall, Senator Berndt, Representative Reynolds, and Representative Free to escort the Governor to the Chamber.

Representative Oberle moved that the House and Senate convene in Joint Session. The motion prevailed.

Representative Oberle moved that the Speaker preside over the Joint Session. The motion prevailed. Representative Oberle moved that the Chief Clerk of the House and the Secretary of the Senate act as secretaries to the Joint Session. The motion prevailed.

Representative Oberle moved that the Speaker appoint a Committee to escort the Governor to the Joint Session. The Speaker introduced Mr. and Mrs. P. S. du Pont, III, Elise du Pont, Lieutenant Governor-Elect S. B. Woo, Senator Boggs, and Marna Whittington.

Mr. Speaker called for a brief recess in place.

Mr. Speaker reconvened the session.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the duly appointed Committee to escort the Governor to the Chamber has arrived.

The Speaker invited the Governor to the rostrum and welcomed Him to the Joint Session.

The Governor addressed the members of the General Assembly as follows:

Governor-Elect Castle, Lt. Governor-Elect Woo, Mr. Speaker, Mr. President pro Tempore, members of the judiciary and cabinet, members of the 133rd General Assembly, Governor Boggs, honored guests, and all the secole of the First State of the United States of America.

Just sixteen years ago this week, I stood in the well of this chamber, swearing my constitutional oath as a new representative in the l25th General Assembly. This evening I return here for the last time, to thank all of you -- staff, members of my cabinet, members of the General Assembly, and most of all the people of Delaware, for your faith, your support and your help as we made the decisions and the choices that have led Delaware back to prosperity. I thank you, for together we have made a difference.

Eight years ago, as members of the General Assembly were taking that same constitutional oath of office and I was preparing to take office as Governor, I was contemplating the opportunities, the challenges, and the awesome responsibilities each of us in this hall would face as we attempted to rescue a ship of state drifting toward disaster.

I believed then that Delaware's governmental problems could be solved; that we could have a government that lived within its means; that we could have a government capable not simply of fulfilling its legal responsibilities, but of improving the quality of life of all Delawareans as well; that we could have a government that was respected by its people. I said that it would take personal discipline from each of us and political discipline from all of us.

As I began preparing my remarks for this evening, I thought back to those early days, when the problems were before us, demanding immediate solutions, but the solutions lay at the end of a road we had only just begun to travel. Now patience is a virtue, but back then I think we all wanted to make changes -- lasting changes -- and make them quickly. We wanted to be well on our way on the journey we were just beginning.

In some ways, that was possible. Executive Order Number One, signed half an hour after I took the oath of office, immediately required financial disclosure for all cabinet officials and appointees. A simple signature on a document began a visible process of restoring people's trust in their government and its officials — a trust that had been so badly shaken in the 1970's.

In other ways, visible progress took much longer --- and was certainly more difficult --- to accomplish.

As you all recall, Delaware was in serious financial trouble in 1977, primarily as a result of a spending appetite that was threatening to devour everything in its path. Why, some people even said the state was -- well -- perhaps bankrupt.

But we worked together to make the tough decisions. We froze the capital budget, reduced the operating budget, limited the growth of government and, perhaps most important of all, enacted constitutional spending restraints that made it virtually impossible to spend more money than was available. No government can spend its way to prosperity, and enacting constitutional restraints was a critical step in restoring the integrity of our government.

But government is not an end in itself, it is a means. Restoring integrity to government, restoring discipline to government and restraining government were part of a process of improving the means. The end was, and remains, to provide our citizens with the chance to prosper, to grow, to excel.

We reduced Delaware's high personal income tax rates which were stifling economic growth and were simply an unfair burden for our working men and women. We passed legislation like the Financial Center Development Act and the Blue Collar Jobs Bill — both of which brought jobs and opportunity to our people. We began to rebuild Delaware's economic base.

After eight years, I think we can all look back with pride on what has been accomplished. In 1977, a year of deep concern for Delaware government, we made a covenant with the people. We said Delaware should have an honest and ethical government, and we have taken steps toward that end. We said Delaware government should live within its means and balance its budget, and we have accomplished that goal. We said Delaware's economic base should be rebuilt to provide our people with the opportunity to grow to their fullest potential, and we have responded by helping to provide greater employment opportunity than almost any other state in this nation.

Together, we have made the difficult decisions, cast the tough votes, and held a steady course. Without support in the General Assembly, without the leadership of Richard Cordrey, Andy Knox, Lonnie George, Chuck Hebner and John Burris, it would not have come to pass.

Delaware and our people are better off today than eight years ago because our government has accomplished the most important task of any government; to create a climate of opportunity in which all of its people may grow, and excel, and prosper.

But of course Delaware's progress in the past eight years has been the result of the actions of many more people than are gathered in this hall this evening. Certainly we provided some leadership and made some fundamental decisions that were helpful in clearing the way for progress. But while government alone can prevent opportunity, government alone cannot create opportunity. Delaware is blessed with community leadership that kept its part of the covenant -- creating a partnership with government to enhance that climate of opportunity. Just think back to the major pieces of legislation that helped clear the way for Delaware's progress -- most could not have been enacted, and our success would not have been possible, without the active participation and commitment of our community leaders.

Some might suggest that eight years ago Delaware stood at a crossroads, and that we — in the words of Robert Frost's poem — "took the road less traveled by." But I would suggest that the course we have followed together was one of our own making, that the choice we made was to follow a road other states had not traveled before us. But then, in the First State, we have a tradition of not waiting to see what others will do, but making our own decisions and charting our own course.

In a sense, America has recently faced the same choice we faced in 1977. We have seen a federal budget that has been out of balance for nineteen of the past twenty years, a budget that Congress has neither the political will nor the personal discipline to control. We have seen America's powerful economic engine mired in regulation and taxation policy that has stifled growth and prevented expansion. We have seen our competitiveness eroded abroad as a result of poor management of the national economy at home.

Perhaps the federal government should learn a lesson from Delaware and our sister states, these fifty laboratories of democracy which created the federal government -- that strong, conservative financial management is a prerequisite to good government. If it is our goal to provide every American with a chance to make tomorrow better than today -- and that must be our goal -- then this free nation, with its heritage of opportunity for all, must learn to make the same hard decisions and learn the same discipline we have shown here in Delaware and in other states.

For the nation and for every one of our states, the challenge is identical: to create a climate of opportunity, then to transform that opportunity through education and economic growth into increased prosperity for all. To transform opportunity into prosperity requires both sound education programs and conservative economic policies.

Education is the springboard to the future for every one of us. Our educational system must demand performance, and teach the art of critical thinking. For the challenge each of us faces as an individual is to learn to make sound judgment on difficult issues; to reason through the facts, disregard the fictions, consider the alternative choices, and reach a sound judgment among them, in other words, to develop the capacity for critical thought. To reach that goal we must set our academic standards to challenge rather than accommodate, to instruct rather than entertain, to instill in every American the skills necessary to survive, and the intellectual curiosity necessary not just to survive, but to grow and contribute. In the past four years we have begun an educational renewal in Delaware focused on those goals; it is the responsibility of our new leadership to continue that progress.

In economic policy, Delaware faces an even more difficult task; a challenge equal to the challenge of adversity we faced in 1977 and 1978: and that is the challenge of prosperity.

Prosperity is welcome, of course; we have been striving for it for eight years. I am not one of those who Theodore Sorenson described as he viewed a meeting of President Kennedy's Council of Economic Advisers in 1962: "There they sat, gloomily contemplating the dangers of an upturn." But prosperity does not free us from the need for the same kind of discipline required by adversity; rather, it requires greater discipline.

Sometimes in the life of a government there comes a moment, when the pressure is off, the problems of the past seem resolved, and, with a sigh of relief, the government can look optimistically ahead, free of past concerns and constraints. It is a satisfying moment, but a dangerous one, too, for if at that moment the discipline that solved the earlier problems is lost, the seeds of future problems are quickly sown.

So it was in England, in 1946, when the national, though remarkable self-discipline had survived the Second World War. A euphoric electorate, intent on immediate reward for the deprivations of the past, abandoned the careful conservatism of Winston Churchill and embraced the free spending, protectionist ways of the Labor Party. England paid the price: twenty-five years later the per capita gross national product of England was less than that of Germany -- no, not West Germany, but East Germany.

So it was in the United States, in the 1960's. Bored with eight years of quiet, competent government and steady economic growth, the electorate opted to "get America moving again," to create a "great society," to expand domestic programs at home and military influence abroad -- guns and butter and the devil with the cost of consequences. Like England, America lost its discipline at a critical moment and paid its price; twelve years of high inflation, low productivity, huge deficits, and economic stagnation. The economic and social impact upon our people has been devastating.

It seems to me that Delaware stands at a similar point in time today. Eight years of discipline, prudence and bipartisanship have brought us unusual prosperity: eight consecutive surplus budgets, two tax cuts, two welfare increases, a doubling of the per-pupil funding for public education, the greatest proportional employment growth of any state in America, and an unemployment rate several points beneath that of the nation as a whole. And now, with the economic recession behind us and our local economy growing vigorously, we find ourselves faced with an unexpected dividend of prosperity: continuing and growing revenue surpluses. We already have about \$46 million in the bank in our "rainy day fund" as a cushion against emergencies. But instead of an emergency, we are faced with the prospect of such rapid revenue growth that we may have as much as \$90 million free and clear -- to spend, or refrain from spending, however we wish.

And so, I wonder, will Delaware be able to meet the challenge of this prosperity? During past years we have demonstrated that we could govern our appetites in difficult times; but can we do so in good times? We have proven ourselves in adversity, now we must do so in prosperity.

The temptation to try to win the approval of interest groups of every kind by spending our good fortune will be enormous. Spend on human services and corrections, they will tell us, on health and welfare, on teachers and transportation. If we yield to all those pressures and temptations, if we spend it all, we could quickly return to the problems and crises of earlier times.

To avoid mortgaging our future in this way will require spending less than we have available to us, not much more, in fact than the real growth in our economy, a difficult task which will once again require personal discipline of each of us and political discipline from all of us. It is most important to our future that we successfully apply that discipline if Delaware is to continue its progress.

Governor-elect Castle is no stranger to either of these central policy issues: he was the chairman of the Task Force on Education for Economic Growth which has prepared a blueprint for substantially strengthening our education system over the next four years; and he has participated in the economic decisions of this administration for the past four years. I know he will do well; give him the same support and counsel you have given me, and Delaware will continue to excel. To Governor Castle I say, Godspeed; the challenge is fresh, the opportunities boundless, and a talented people stand ready for your leadership in keeping Delaware the First State of the United States of America.

But now, my constitutional moment as Delaware's Chief Executive has passed; next Tuesday I join Elbert Carvel and Caleb Boggs as one of only three people in Delaware who can never serve as Governor of our State again, And so I'm afraid I shall not pass this way again; I leave with deep appreciation for your support, valuing your counsel, and having enjoyed -- no, loved -- the opportunity you have given me. For me, it simply has been the best of times. It has been my honor to have served you. Elise and I stood at the window in Woodburn earlier today, watching the snow fall gently on that magnificent tulip poplar tree, which was perhaps a sprout two hundred years ago when our nation began just a few blocks from where we stood.

We recalled some of the times, some of the places, and the many images of Delaware we will take with us as we leave you:

- Woodland Ferry, hot in the hazy August sun; cold beer, oysters and sawdust in the Georgetown firehall;

- A lighted Christmas tree afloat on Silver Lake reflecting its colors in the still December waters; all of us elected officials tug-of-warring the entire press corps into St. Jones Creek in seven and a half seconds flat;

- Carolling in the halls of the Smyrna Home and Hospital, seeing joy and memories light the faces of the elderly patients there; the crash of drums and brass as the University of Delaware marching band breaks into the fight song under the concrete stadium on an October Saturday;

- The flash of muskets and the smell of powder, the Union Jack moving across the meadow in the re-enactment of the Battle of Cooch's Bridge, where 208 years ago fourteen brave Delaware lads gave their fullest measure to help America become the land of the free.

But most of all we remember people -- thousands and thousands of you -- men and women, old people, young children, complete with pipes and shawls, ice cream cones and baseballs, glasses, hats, costumes, coats, diapers and canes -- people who slapped our backs, pressed our hands and wished us encouragement and cheer as we made our way through eight years of your lives. We will one day forget the speeches, the press conferences, the podiums and meetings, but we will carry with us always in our hearts your generous friendship.

As I said when we set out on our journey on that frosty morning on the Green eight years ago, "I pledge to you to do my best, to strive for the highest quality of leadership and the highest standard of performance that is possible to achieve. I cannot promise to do more; I shall not do less." I have done all I could to meet that standard.

Robert Penn Warren wrote that we must go out, "into the convulsion of the world, out of history into history and the awful responsibility of time." An awesome responsibility did await us in 1977; together we seized it, shaped it, used it to go forward, to achieve a better time, to improve the quality of life for all our people.

This evening we step out of history and into history, proud of our past, optimistic for our future, for together we have achieved our goals. Together, we have made a difference.

God bless -- and farewell.

### JOINT SESSION IN SENATE CHAMBER January 24, 1985

Pursuant to SCR 7, the Senate and House of Representatives met in Joint Session at 11:58 a.m., Lt. Governor Woo presiding.

The Lt. Governor invited the Speaker of the House and the President pro Tempore of the Senate to a seat on the rostrum.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the arrival of Chief Justice Daniel Herrmann and other members of the Judiciary. They were admitted and welcomed by Lt. Governor Woo.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the arrival of State and County elected officials. They were admitted and welcomed by Lt. Governor Woo.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the arrival of the Governor's Cabinet. They were admitted and welcomed by Lt. Governor Woo.

Senator Sharp moved that the President of the Senate preside over the Joint Session. No objection.

Senator Sharp moved that the Secretary of the Senate and Chief Clerk of the House act as secretaries to the Joint Session. No objection.

Senator Sharp moved that the Chair appoint a committee to escort the Governor to the Chamber. No objection.

The Chair appointed Senators Holloway and Berndt; Representatives Soles and Quillen as an Escort Committee for the Governor.

The Chair declared a short standing recess while awaiting the arrival of the Governor.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the arrival of the Escort Committee and the Governor.

Governor Michael N. Castle was welcomed and invited to the podium by Lt. Governor Woo.

The Governor addressed the Joint Session as follows:

Lieutenant Governor Woo, Mr. President pro Tem, Mr. Speaker, members of the 133rd General Assembly, elected officials, members of the judiciary and the Cabinet, and my fellow Delawareans.

Eight and a half years ago, on July 4th, 1976, we celebrated the 200th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence, with fireworks, parades, and Tall Ships in our nation's harbors. It was a fitting tribute to the document that made this nation free, and to the courageous acts of Americans who fought to preserve that freedom.

I was reminded of that day when I started thinking how Delaware might celebrate its part in America's second Bicentennial, the 200th anniversary of the birth of the United States of America. By 1787, the war of independence had been won, but the fight to unify the nation was still being waged. In that year, soldiers turned statesmen were called on to make the hard decisions that would give shape to an enduring government of the people.

The result was the Constitution of the United States, the document that bound this nation together and made it whole. Today it still binds us together, just as history binds us to the value of those who created it, and our celebration should reflect that. We must rededicate ourselves to those values as we celebrate America's Bicentennial, both as a nation and as individual states.

For Delaware, that means building on the successes bipartisanship and cooperation have brought us; assuring that opportunity knocks for <u>each</u> of our citizens, and <u>all</u> of our communities; continuing to strengthen our education system; reinforcing our commitment to fiscal conservatism and more responsive government; and dedicating ourselves to improving the quality of life we enjoy, in all of its aspects.

It means that a lawyer from Wilmington, a university professor from Newark, an agribusinessman from Millsboro, and a corporate executive from Claymont, each elected to a different office but sharing the same public trust, have a responsibility to work together as important as any of their constitutional duties.

It means recognizing the importance of the education we provide in our public schools, the value of the support we give our businesses, or the effect of decisions we make about state spending, but knowing as well that all three are related, each with the potential to enhance the others.

It means understanding that quality of life is multi-faceted, as fragile as it is diverse, and that there is still much we can do to improve it, to meet that centuries-old prescription of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

For as long as one child is in danger or neglected, as long as one senior citizen is denied the benefits of modern medical technology, as long as one community must endure the threat posed by hazardous wastes, as long as one family is denied the opportunity to enjoy the benefits of a growing economy, the challenge to make this state the best place to live in remains before us.

Last year, the General Assembly significantly increased the funding for the Department of Services to Children, Youth and Their Families, then only six months old. The Department has grown and matured in the past year, and shown the capability to take on even more responsibility for this most important element of our society. Further, it is continuing to identify new areas where its services can be improved.

Over the last six months, it has become apparent that a long-standing need requires our attention. While there are resources available to help young children and adults, severely disturbed adolescents often go without adequate treatment because there is no one with clear responsibility for their well-being. In my proposed budget, I will address the problem so that these services are not only provided, but provided in Delaware, assuring that much-needed family support is present.

\* \* \* \* \*

At the same time we are providing for those young people, we must consider the medical needs of all our citizens. Today Delaware enjoys health care costs lower than much of the rest of the nation, but those costs are still high, and there is considerable evidence that our favorable cost position is in jeopardy. This is a concern for all of us, and particularly for our senior citizens.

Today, we are discovering that the technological advances in medicine that should have only improved our lives had led to financial complications. Health care <u>management</u> has become one of the most important medical issues of the 1980's.

The state is uniquely qualified to take the lead in this effort, to lend its resources to it, and to set an example by instituting new cost management procedures internally. Recognizing that, I intend to use my office to bring together all the diverse elements of the medical community — doctors, hospital administrators, insurers and consumers — to find new ways to control these costs while maintaining the high quality care we have come to expect.

#### \* \* \* \* \*

Health care is the responsibility of each of us as individuals. But government must assume that responsibility in one very important respect -- dealing with the hazardous materials and hazardous wastes that represent one of the greatest dangers society faces today.

While Delaware has its share of these problems, we have been spared the experiences of those who live along Love Canal or in Times Beach. We cannot afford to rely on luck to protect our people from the effects of these dangerous materials, however. We must be prepared to deal with them quickly; we must have the capability to deal with them effectively. For that reason, I will recommend the creation of a separate Division of Hazardous Waste Management within the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control.

\* \* \* \* \*

At the same time we are protecting our citizens' health, we must take steps to protect their lives and property. Next week I will ask the General Assembly to increase its support for the Sentencing Accountability Commission's initiatives on corrections, and to continue its support for measures to better coordinate the efforts of the state's various law enforcement agencies. Each brings the opportunity to enhance our ability to keep violent criminals off the streets while reducing the costly burden of law enforcement and corrections on our taxpayers.

We will, of course, continue our successful fight against drunk driving. But at the same time we have scen alcohol-related fatalities decrease in Delaware, we have seen other factors claim more lives. I believe together we can take new steps to increase the safety on our highways, and to that end I intend to redirect the efforts of the Drunk Driving Task Force to accomplish this. I recognize that the state must be called on to provide resources for this effort, but we must weigh those costs against the ultimate cost of doing nothing.

\* \* \* \* \*

Helping teenagers who need help represents a small step to improve the quality of life in Delaware, as does assuring the availability of medical treatment, fighting environmental hazards and affording better protection for the lives and property of citizens. Together they represent our commitment to improve the quality of life for all our citizens.

But there is another aspect to that commitment, one of overriding importance, and it must be addressed.

Today Delaware is able to meet the needs of its citizens because we enjoy unparalleled economic growth. Thousands of new jobs were created in Delaware during 1984, and unemployment reached its lowest point in a decade.

The viability of state government is directly related to the health of our economy, and to our efforts to bring new jobs to Delaware. The commitment of the General Assembly to those efforts in recent years has made Delaware a leader in economic development; I am prepared to match your commitment, and to work with each of you to assure that the prosperity we enjoy today reaches every part of the state.

## EDUCATION

If we are to expect employers to create new jobs in Delaware, then Delaware must assure that its citizens have the skills to fill those jobs. That responsibility falls to our public school system.

A year ago, the General Assembly decided to reject the status quo in education and begin building a better future for Delaware by providing the best possible education opportunities for our young people today.

The General Assembly appropriated significant new funding for our schools, so that we would have the ability to provide the best possible education for our young people and attract the best teachers to teach them. More important, the men and women of the General Assembly unanimously endorsed the work of the Governor's Task Force on Education for Economic Growth, a series of nearly 80 recommendations for improving our schools.

Each of the recommendations will make a small difference in the quality of our schools. Together, they have the potential to make a great difference. But whether we implement a dozen recommendations, or all of them, they will have little real and lasting impact on how well we prepare our children for the future if our commitment to education falters.

1984 cannot be viewed as the year Delaware did something about its schools, but as the year when Delaware put education — including higher education — at the top of its list of priorities and decided to keep it there.

This year we will implement a career ladder for our teachers, recognizing that we cannot afford to lose our best teachers because they are not paid enough or because of the frustration and isolation their jobs entail.

We also will decide on a mastery testing program for our public schools, designed to show whether our students have learned the skills needed to take on a new educational challenge. In combination with a rigorous set of promotion standards and the career ladder, these tests represent our long-term commitment to <u>parents</u> that the schools they support will be held accountable.

In the months to come, the debate on education will no doubt center on "how <u>much</u>" -- how much in pay raises, how much for equalization, how much will the mastery tests cost? Today you and I must reaffirm our commitment to "how well" -- how well our teachers teach, how well our young persons learn, and how well our graduates perform once they leave the public school system.

We have accepted the cost of more testing, better compensation for teachers, smaller class sizes in the lower grades and good textbooks. We must <u>demand</u> the "no-cost" items on our education improvement list, because it is what the parents and taxpayers of this state want.

We must demand better attendance, higher homework standards, and additional time on core curriculum and basic subjects. We must demand greater discipline in the classroom, and make sure schools have the resources to make it stick. We must find ways to assure that businesses and the community play a greater part in our education system, and that parents participate in their schools and set standards at home.

## DELIVERY OF STATE SERVICES.

The goals we have set for our education system will require greater coordination between the Department of Public Instruction and the individual school districts.

If it can work in education, then it can work in other areas of government as well. Over the next four years, my administration will seek ways to eliminate overlapping services, to assure that multi-dimensional problems are adequately addressed, to increase the accountability of government. It is not enough to protect a child from abuse if we allow that child to go without adequate shelter or food. It is not enough to provide the elderly with food and shelter if they lack proper medical treatment, or help in dealing with crime. One of my first goals will be to improve coordination of human services, to find more innovative ways to meet human needs without higher costs to the state. We spend hundreds of millions of dollars each year on those services; we must find more effective ways to make sure that money is well spent. It may be, for instance, that the private sector is able to provide these services more economically; we are prepared to take the steps necessary to move in this direction.

Not only must we better coordinate the services we provide, but we must shift our emphasis from treatment to prevention, because it is far more costly to cure someone than to keep them healthy. By assuring that state agencies work together to coordinate the services they provide, we will be able to dramatically increase the quality of service without increasing its cost.

I have divided my cabinet into four cabinet councils to formalize the relationships among the departments that make up the Executive branch of government. Each cabinet council, made up of the secretaries of the departments and supported by their respective staffs, will have the responsibility to work together on issues that cross departmental lines of jurisdiction, resolve potential problems before they become conflicts, develop plans for long-term issues, and combine resources to accomplish together more than each department might separately.

### STATE SPENDING

Two months ago, when 1 began to prepare the fiscal 1986 budget, I asked cabinet secretaries and other agency heads to tell me how we could reduce ongoing state spending in Delaware. Each agency and department was asked to examine its base budget and decide whether the programs it contained were really necessary, and how they could be run more economically.

There was a simple reason for this. The original requests submitted to the Budget Office, if approved, would have resulted in a huge increase in state spending. Even after the Budget Office had reduced those requests significantly, we were being asked to permit state spending to grow faster than inflation.

That was unacceptable.

But holding the level of state spending to the rate of inflation poses a dilemma: If we only spend as much as we spent last year, plus whatever is needed to compensate for higher costs, then we are frustrated by the inability to do anything new, to do anything different, to add needed new programs.

But the idea that government truly responsive to the needs of our citizens must constantly demand a greater share of their earnings is equally unacceptable.

I believe that, as we administer the government of the State of Delaware over the next four years, we must be prepared to ask basic questions about what government is, about what government does, and most important, about how we can reduce its demands on our resources while making it more responsive to our needs.

Historically, we have placed new demands on government, adding program on top of program, without considering the merit of what government is doing already, without ever asking whether the old programs are still needed. We treat last year's budget as the minimum, and let revenues determine the maximum.

In the process, we apply to the taxpayers together a standard that would be unacceptable to them as individuals. If an individual overpays his or her taxes by a few hundred dollars, we send them a refund. But if the taxpayers <u>as a whole</u> pay tens of millions more taxes than the state needs, we keep every penny, succumbing to the temptation to spend it.

Instead, we must begin to assign priorities to existing programs, just as we assign priorities to new programs. We must be able to react to society's needs without hampering its ability to grow economically, or its ability to meet its own needs. In the next four years, we must begin to ask government in Delaware to reexamine its priorities, to spend its resources differently, not simply spend more.

Individual decisions we have made preparing the fiscal 1986 budget may not be popular with certain special-interest groups. Taken together, the decisions represent an opportunity to make government more responsive, more flexible, and better able to serve the men and women who support it with their earnings.

### FIRST STATE IMPROVEMENT FUND AND TAX CUT.

We accept education's demands on our revenues, just as we accept the need for new programs to fulfill the state's responsibilities to its citizens. Our state's growing revenues make it possible for us to meet both. The operating budget 1 will recommend next week represents approximately a five percent increase over the current budget, and provides adequate funding for all needed state programs.

But, for the second year in a row, Delaware's revenues promise to <u>exceed</u> the state's spending needs. Based on the latest figures from the Delaware Economic and Financial Advisory Council, the state will have available to spend \$44.5 million more than that budget requires.

This money belongs to the taxpayers of this state.

Special interests will try to claim as big a share of it as they can; we will be asked to entertain countless proposals for spending it ourselves. We can allow neither to happen. You and I have a duty to return it to the taxpayers, and we cannot support any proposal that does not do that, or use it in a way that will reduce future demands for taxes.

I believe we can do both in the coming year.

I am proposing that personal income taxes be cut by at least five percent across-the-board, and that the personal exemption allowed to all taxpayers be increased from \$800 to \$1,000. The total cost in fiscal 1986 will be \$14.5 million. Should our revenues continue to grow in the next few months, then we must be prepared to reach bipartisan agreement on a greater tax reduction.

By enacting the tax cut and increasing the exemption effective January 1, 1986, we continue to restore the balance to our revenue sources, protecting the state from the effects of recession. We further undo the damage caused by bracket creep during recent years of high inflation, and we return the money in the fairest way possible to the people who earned it -- our citizens.

The proposal takes into account the many unknowns on the national scene: whether and when the next recession will occur; what cuts in federal taxes will be enacted; and what programs the state will be forced to pay for as the federal government struggles with the deficit. It will allow us to absorb the impact of recession and adjust to changes in federal tax aw and federal programs.

With the balance of our excess revenues, I propose a one-time appropriation of \$30 million to create the First State Improvement Fund, dedicated to the celebration of the Bicentennial of the Constitution, but designed to accomplish permanent improvements in Delaware.

This money will be set aside and, together with accumulated earnings, be spent over three years for the benefit of much-needed and long-deferred improvements throughout the state. I believe we can anticipate more than \$11 million per year between now and Delaware's Bicentennial celebration for these projects. The Fund provides the opportunity to affect each of our communities, and to make lasting changes in the state's economy in a way that will help guarantee our continued prosperity.

A portion of the annual expenditure should go to projects that will help Delaware attract new business and industry - land purchases, infrastructure improvements in the hospitals, clinics, office buildings and other institutions throughout our state system and the school districts.

Finally, the Bicentennial celebration itself. Earlier I talked about the Bicentennial as a reaffirmation of the values central to this democracy. Delaware is well-prepared for that reaffirmation as we embark on a course of lasting changes in state government.

But Delaware must lead the Bicentennial celebration, because the nation will look to us as the First State on December 7, 1987, and I propose that we invite America to join us, that in each of our three counties we open our doors to the nation in 1987 and 1988.

Today I have written to the President inviting him to join us in that celebration.

But if we are inviting America to join us in our celebration, then we must be prepared to create a lasting memory for all those who visit us - and for ourselves.

A final portion of the proceeds from the First State Improvement Fund should be set aside to match local government efforts to beautify and enhance the quality of life in our towns and cities. The money will be used for all the diverse projects that will be part of the celebration — painting a town hall, putting on a pageant devoted to local history, beautifying a park, helping a school bring its students to the Bicentennial festivities, organizing sporting events, or publishing an oral history based on the memories of our senior citizens.

We should celebrate our Bicentennial with a recognition of the pride and value of our state's heritage and a partnership between state and local government that will help to insure that every town, city and county in Delaware can point to a bicentennial accomplishment supported by these funds.

This is an ambitious proposal, but one which has the potential to make permanent changes in Delaware and create a lasting impression for the rest of our nation.

In his Inaugural Address on Monday, President Reagan spoke of history as a "ribbon, always unfurling. History is a journey. And as we continue our journey we think of those who traveled it before us."

In the next three years, Delaware will pay tribute to those who began the journey two hundred years ago. At the same time, we must think of those who will follow us. We have the opportunity to speed them on their journey, and help assure its success.

### JOINT SESSION House Chamber January 31, 1985

Pursuant to <u>HCR 16</u>, the House and Senate met for a Joint Session in the House Chamber.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the Members of the Senate. They were admitted and seated.

Mr. Speaker Hebner invited the President of the Senate and the President pro Tempore to share the rostrum.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the Chief Justice and Members of the Judiciary. They were admitted and seated.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the State and County elected officials. They were admitted and seated.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the Cabinet Officials. They were admitted and seated.

Representative Oberle moved that the House and Senate convene in Joint Session. The motion was properly seconded and adopted by voice vote.

Representative Oberle moved that the Speaker of the House preside over the Joint Session. The motion prevailed.

Representative Oberle moved that the Chief Clerk of the House and Secretary of the Senate act as Secretaries of the Joint Session. The motion prevailed.

Representative Oberle moved that a committee of four be appointed to escort the Governor to the House Chamber. The motion prevailed.

The Speaker appointed Representative Anderson, Representative Free, Representative West, and Representative Reynolds to escort the Governor to the Chamber.

The Sergeant-at-Arms admitted the Governor and the duly appointed Committee to the House Chamber. The Speaker invited the Governor to the rostrum and introduced him to the Joint Session.

The Speaker introduced former Governor Carvel.

The Governor addressed the members of the General Assembly as follows:

Lieutenant Governor Woo, Mr. President pro Tem, Mr. Speaker, members of the 133rd General Assembly, members of the judiciary and cabinet, and the people of Delaware.

Five years ago, the members of the General Assembly made a fundamental decision about the fiscal integrity of Delaware's government. By constitutionally mandating a 98% limit on spending, you declared that government would live within its means -- in good times and bad.

The years that followed placed unusual demands on this body. But you accepted the responsibility for controlling the growth of State spending, resisting the pressure to "bend" the rules despite the difficult decisions that resulted. Those decisions were made particularly hard when Delaware suffered the effects of a severe nationwide recession. However, while other states laid off employees and dramatically cut services, we in Delaware were able to meet our obligations without lay-offs and without drastic cutbacks.

When the General Assembly met last year, the recession was over and the State was faced with a huge increase in revenues, one that offered the chance to "catch up," but at the same time raised the prospect of new, uncontrolled spending. The new revenues available to us last year allowed the base budget to grow at a rate faster than inflation, so that we could fund projects delayed in the previous two fiscal years. To your credit, you honored the 98-percent limit on spending, limited the growth of the base budget, and returned much of the anticipated increase in revenues to the taxpayers through a major cut in personal income taxes.

Again this year, Delaware faces the prospect of revenues far in excess of its needs. Again, we must resist the temptation to spend it all. Again we have the opportunity to lessen the burden on the taxpayer by reducing our tax rates. And we are presented with the unique opportunity to meet many long neglected needs for capital improvements without incurring additional long-term debt that would be paid for by our children and grandchildren.

At the same time, however, it is our responsibility to the citizens of this State to assure that the State meets its obligations: that our schools are adequately provided for, that our roads are in good condition, that the people who must turn to the State for help receive it, that we back up our commitment to jobs and economic development. In the next five months, we must reach agreement on a budget that assures all these things.

The Budget I am presenting today indeed fulfills the State's responsibilities to all its citizens, and then does considerably more. It meets the objective of restraining growth in the budget, reduces further the tax burden, and prevents additional long-term debt while meeting our capital needs.

Based on the Delaware Economic and Financial Advisory Council's December forecast, we estimate that in fiscal 1986 revenues available to us will be \$860.5 million. We will carry forward another \$65.4 million from the current fiscal year, bringing total available funds to \$925.9 million.

We are required by law to add \$2.1 million to the "rainy day" fund, and we must reserve \$18.3 million for the two-percent cushion against unexpected demands on the State during the fiscal year.

From the balance, I am proposing an operating budget of \$853.4 million.

Included in this Budget is a total of approximately \$63 million, or about eight percent of the budget, which will be devoted to new programs or new commitments. Those commitments include \$20.6 million for a 4.3 percent salary increase for State employees. This increase is being recommended at a time when union wage settlements nationwide are below three percent. We are proposing \$18 million in additional funding to improve education in Delaware, and \$12.7 million for new programs -- from helping teenagers with special problems to providing for more adequate protection against environmental threats. In addition, this budget proposes the final step in a long-term process of removing from the capital bond bill salaries of employees in the Department of Transportation and the Department of Natural Resources and transferring them to the operating funds where they belong. It is wrong to borrow money to pay current operating salaries, and I have included \$4.5 million in my proposed budget to end this practice.

But if you were to adopt this spending plan intact, we would still have a surplus of \$44.5 million in Delaware.

For that reason, I am proposing a reduction in personal income tax rates of at least five percent and a \$200 increase in the personal exemption, which together will reduce revenues by \$14.5 million in fiscal 1986 and \$29 million in fiscal 1987.

And I am proposing that the balance of excess revenues -- another \$30 million -- be placed in the First State Improvement Fund. This fund is designed to bring lasting improvements to the State's infrastructure and further strengthen our economic base. By funding projects in this manner, we will be able to address additional long-standing infrastructure needs that otherwise could be met only through the normal capital budget program.

### \*\*\*\*\*\*\*

Having served as a legislator for 10 years and as Lieutenant Governor for four years, I know the frustration of being unable to see a valuable program adopted because funds are not available. Preparing the budget, I have encountered the same frustration.

When we began our agency-by-agency analysis of State government in November, we quickly realized that our ability to redirect the State's efforts is severely limited by the fact that current programs and fixed costs claim as much as 93 percent of the funds appropriated for each department.

Simply building on past budgets year after year without re-examining our priorities has severely limited our ability to make government more responsive and at the same time limit its growth.

But we must limit the growth of State government to as near the rate of inflation as possible. That policy makes sense for two reasons.

First, as I stated earlier, we allowed State spending to grow at more than double the rate of inflation last year in order to catch up on many programs deferred because of the recession. For that to occur a second year would place us in jeopardy of returning to the cycle of tax and spend common for so many years in State government. With the uncertainties about the effect of decisions made in Washington, it is necessary to restrain our spending, particularly in this fiscal year, until we see the actual long-term obligations that the State will be required to assume in the future.

Second, sustained low inflation requires government to adjust its spending patterns. It is no longer necessary to increase a budget by eight or nine or ten percent just to keep even. At a time when inflation is projected at less than five percent, government must restrain its spending to a similar level.

The approach I have taken to the budget this year offers an opportunity for all of us to have a lasting impact on government - and on our State. At the same time, it will make great demands on our resolve, because the change in approach to State spending I am recommending is no less significant than the constitutional budgetary restraints <u>you</u> enacted several years ago. And change inevitably brings opposition.

Our answer to the special interests and critics must be that government cannot be allowed to fuel inflation, that it cannot be allowed to grow faster than the incomes of the men and women who support it.

We must be committed to finding alternatives. In the course of developing the budget, department by department and division by division, I found that some agencies in fact proposed programmatic budgets which result in providing more services without substantial increases in spending. For example, when Dr. Tom Updike, Director of the Division of Mental Health, proposed his budget last fall, he proposed a "continuum of care" to meet the needs of the people the division serves. More important, the division adopted the concept of reallocating departmental resources to fund new initiatives.

Dr. Updike's approach has been to place his division's clients in less restrictive settings -- to provide a level of care <u>appropriate</u> to each individual's needs -- and thus reduce costs associated with institutionalization. This approach is at once more compassionate and less demanding on the State's resources.

I believe every agency and department in the State can do the same thing.

The operating budget I am presenting is 5.2 percent larger than the fiscal 1985 budget. It sends a message to the taxpayer that we know whose money we are spending, and that we will spend only what is needed. The rest belongs to them, and we will not contrive new uses for it at their expense. That must be our commitment to the people of Delaware.

Having talked about the philosophy behind the budget I am presenting, I would like to turn now to the budget itself and discuss some of the programs we are recommending.

# NEW AND EXPANDED PROGRAM INITIATIVES

# DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES

First, the Department of Health and Social Services.

<u>24 Hour Comprehensive Emergency Service</u>. The State's Mental Hygiene Clinics have the responsibility of providing comprehensive mental health services statewide. Currently, these clinics are able to send staff members to respond to emergency situations only during regular working hours.

An increase of eight staff members will provide comprehensive emergency service and a mobile crisis unit to respond to acute, individual mental health emergencies in the community 24 hours a day. The agency anticipates that an additional 600 to 700 people will be served as a result.

<u>Shifting a 50-bed Geriatric Unit to Governor Bacon Health Center</u>. I am proposing the creation of an alternate placement facility for geriatric patients at the Governor Bacon Health Center.

By spending \$600,000 for this unit, we expect to realize a <u>net savings</u> to the State of \$383,000. Moreover, this supervised residential service for 50 patients who do not need the total care Delaware State Hospital provides will relieve the pressure for additional beds at the State Hospital.

This is a prime example of how we were able to remove a program from the budget base -- at considerable savings -- without affecting State services. Rather, we were able to increase our flexibility and better use the State's resources.

Drug <u>Residential Program</u>. While Delaware provides a residential treatment program for alcoholics, those with severe drug-related problems are unable to turn to the State for help today.

To address that problem, a drug-abuse residential treatment program for adult drug users has been recommended in the fiscal 1986 budget. This long-term care program will have a ten - to twelve - bed capacity, and it will provide a highly structured environment to those adult drug users who do not have substantial criminal justice system involvement.

## DEPARTMENT OF SERVICES TO CHILDREN, YOUTH AND THEIR FAMILIES

I am recommending a series of new expenditures in the Department of Services to Children, Youth and Their Families:

First, funding to allow expansion of the foster home program in Kent and Sussex counties to provide needed new foster home beds and shelter foster home beds.

Second, the creation of a new, conservation-oriented program, called the Marine Institute, for 30 to 40 youths currently classified as minimum security immates at Ferris School for Boys. Similar programs in other states have resulted in a lower recidivism rate than we are achieving at Ferris. It is also less costly.

Third, I am proposing to remedy the State's inability to provide services for severely disturbed adolescents by appropriating \$835,000 for contract mental health services.

Today the State offers acute youth mental health services for children up to the age of 12 at the Terry Psychiatric Center; after the age of 12 youths are treated at the Adult Mental Health Center at Delaware State Hospital.

By providing six psychiatric hospital beds for youth diagnosed to be dangerous to themselves or to others, the State can provide up to 30 days of treatment for approximately fifty of these youths annually. At the same time, this proposal will provide psychiatric hospital care for a smaller number of young people who require longer hospitalization.

### EDUCATION

In the coming fiscal year, we will continue to implement the recommendations of the Governor's Task Force on Education for Economic Growth, and 1 am recommending a total of \$18 million for new programs in our public schools. On top of the \$21 million increase approved last year, this demonstrates our continuing commitment to our schools.

As Governor, I am prepared to continue the commitment of new dollars if teachers and the school system demonstrate that they are equally committed to improve the quality of the education our children receive. We cannot continue to be at the forefront of seeking improved funding for our schools if our schools are not at the forefront of improving educational opportunities for children. Indeed, in the next year I personally will demand of our school system the same accountability for their increased funding that the taxpayers demand of us when we spend these funds.

Let me cite a few statistics that raise disturbing questions that demand answers.

According to the U.S. Department of Education, Delaware spends more per student than all but eight other states. But our spending doesn't show up in the classroom. Not only do we pay our teachers less than twenty-one other states, but we have fewer teachers per student. The fact is, we have more non-teaching employees than most other states. In other words, we spend too much on the system and too little in the classroom.

I look to the State Board of Education to address this seeming imbalance. I look to the Department of Public Instruction and the school districts to recommend ways we can assure that a greater proportion of the money we appropriate reaches the classroom.

In the budget, four million dollars has been included for increased compensation under a career ladder program designed to reward the best teachers and set higher standards for all of them. I endorse the work of the Monitoring Committee, and thank its members for their efforts. But I believe that this program should benefit teachers and specialists, the people who make the biggest difference in our children's school day.

The last component of the Critical Curriculum Program, Teacher Scholarships, is funded at a cost of \$250,000, bringing the total cost of that program up to \$450,000. Four additional Curriculum Improvement workshops also are included in this budget.

The proposed budget for education includes an additional \$2.9 million to fulfill the second year of the equalization legislation. Another \$1.2 million is included to further reduce class sizes in grades one through three.

I am recommending increased funding to the Delaware Teacher Center to allow additional workshops, minigrants, and supplies, and twenty additional district computer literacy grants of \$15,000 each.

## DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES & ENVIRONMENTAL CONTROL

Within the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control, 1 am recommending creation of a new Division of Hazardous Waste Management, at a cost of \$150,000. The new division will be responsible for air pollution control and the control of hazardous solid wastes, for the "Superfund" cleanup of toxic waste sites, and for the prevention of any additional sites. An additional year of funding, \$200,000, has been recommended for continued work to protect Delaware's inland bays.

The escalating growth in the area of our prison population will create a shortage of beds at the end of the fiscal year. To alleviate this situation, I have recommended that \$190,000 be appropriated for staffing and operational costs to open 112 beds on July 1, 1986, within the new 300 bed institution now under construction at the Delaware Correctional Center.

I have also reviewed recommendations on the security needs of the correctional system, both within and outside our major institutions, and propose that approximately \$225,000 be appropriated to meet these needs. I am also proposing \$190,000 to expand our Prison Industries effort.

The budget I have proposed provides additional probation officers to more effectively control and manage Probation and Parole cases, and I am recommending additional support to improve collection of fines, victim compensation costs and restitution payments.

Finally, I have included \$987,400 for correctional officer pay increases. The proposal will increase the starting rate for correctional officers from \$11,837 to \$13,428.

I have not mentioned every department, but the needs of each have been met. For example, in the Department of Community Affairs, an administrative assistant has been provided to assist the Advisory Council for the Coordination of Services to the Handicapped.

For the Department of Agriculture, I have recommended expanded agricultural marketing and development programs with the potential to increase the ability of our farmers to sell their products and help them develop new crops.

### FIRST STATE IMPROVEMENT FUND

New programs have been included in the budget of each department, and each budget reflects our efforts to reduce costs and shift funds from old programs to new initiatives, as well as our commitment to limiting government growth to approximately the inflation rate.

Our revenues have outstripped the rate of inflation, however. Spurred by a healthy business climate and conservative decisions about government spending, Delaware's economy continues to grow, bringing new revenues to the State.

The budget 1 am proposing reflects my strong commitment to that conservative approach. Further, I am strongly committed to maintaining the 75-percent limitation on new indebtedness. Yet I recognize that there is a long-standing need for repairs and restoration that must be met. Fortunately, the State's growing economy makes it possible to address those needs in a creative way while maintaining the 75-percent limit. I propose to create a new source of funds, separate from the bond bill, using excess revenues available this year. This approach has the advantage of reserving a portion of our excess revenues over a three-year period as insurance against unforeseen changes in the economy.

Last year, faced with a similar excess of revenues, the General Assembly approved a major cut in personal income taxes, a package of "one-shot" appropriations, and a budget twelve percent larger than the previous year's budget.

Now our approach to the revenue surplus anticipated in fiscal 1986 must change. We cannot commit ourselves to a further inflated budget and large-scale spending today when there is uncertainty about the economy and the effect of decisions Congress may make about federal taxes and the federal budget. Even if the national economy continues to grow, even if Delaware's economy continues to outperform the national economy, and even if we are not forced to adjust to federal tax changes or program cuts, we must adopt a more systematic approach to that surplus.

Over the past two months, we have considered a number of possible uses for the surplus: a tax cut, a tax rebate, a reduction of the State's long-term debt, a program to rebuild the State's infrastructure. Each proposal would either reduce the present tax burden on our citizens, or reduce the demands we place on them in the future. That is, by rebuilding a bridge at today's prices, we eliminate the need to do so later, when costs will be higher. By increasing the State's ability to attract business and industry, we enlarge the tax base and thus reduce the demands we make on individual taxpayers.

The proposal I am placing before you today does both, by cutting taxes and by <u>investing</u> our surplus in long-term improvements.

I am recommending that the "First State Improvement Fund," which would be capitalized at \$30 million and invested so that we can use both principle and interest, be used in the following way:

Between 10 and 20 percent of the annual expenditure should be used for economic development projects, building on the efforts of the past five years to encourage business to grow in Delaware. The purchase of land, the improvements in needed infrastructure, the provision of public amenities have all shown us that when government and the private sector continue to work together, abundant economic yields are forthcoming.

A similar amount should be set aside to match funds generated by local communities for physical improvements which will beautify and enhance the quality of living in our towns and cities in time for the Bicentennial. This portion of the fund would allow each of Delaware's counties and towns to embark on projects that would have lasting value, building community pride at the same time they were making permanent improvements.

The balance of the money should be used to finance needed rehabilitation and restoration of the State's existing infrastructure, improvements that in many cases are long overdue but have not been possible in past years.

I believe that the importance of this concept calls for the creation of a new steering committee for the fund which will annually recommend to the General Assembly how best to invest these monies in important development improvements. The recommendations of the board, which will be appointed by the Governor and the General Assembly, will coincide with the legislative review process for our annual capital improvement program. This proposal is predicated on continued prosperity in Delaware; should changes in the economy or unusual demands on the State require it, we must be prepared to reallocate this fund to meet prior commitments. To that end, in recommending creation of the Fund I am also recommending that the enabling legislation include a "trigger" allowing us to shift its resources to the General Fund in the case of an emergency.

### \*\*\*\*\*\*\*

As you recess today to hold your hearings on this Budget, I ask you to remember what brought Delaware to where the State is today. The sound fiscal policies of the prior Administration and General Assemblies were forged out of necessity and ultimately, a commonality of experience – we know the bad times. They were constructed by wise leaders and dedicated managers who once given the challenge answered the call. They were a result of sound decision-making and good laws.

The budget provides the State with the resources to meet its responsibilities, and at the same time reflects our ultimate responsibility to the people who support State government with their taxes. More important, it reflects my commitment to making government more flexible and responsive, not simply more expensive.

I ask you to join me in that commitment.

Thank you very, very much.

Mr. Speaker Hebner appointed Senator Adams, Senator Vaughn, Senator Slatcher, and Senator Neal to escort the Governor from the Chamber.

Representative Oberle moved that the Chief Clerk of the House and the Secretary of the Senate compare their respective Journals. The motion prevailed.

Representative Oberle moved that the Joint Session be adjourned at 2:27 p.m. The motion prevailed. The House reconvened at 4:35 p.m.

Representative George read the following statement: STATEMENT DELIVERED ON FLOOR OF HOUSE CHAMBER, MAY 8, 1985 BY REPRESENTATIVE ORLANDO J. GEORGE, JR.

I would like to address today a topic which is of the utmost concern to many Delawareans and indeed to people all over the country. As you are no doubt aware, it was recently announced by the Reagan Administration that they propose cutting the appropriation to Amtrak from 684 million dollars to 480 million dollars. This drastic reduction in federal subsidy to the Amtrak system would, in my opinion and in the opinion of many experts and other elected officials, both here and across the country, wreak havoc on one of the major transportation systems in the United States. The chairman of Amtrak told a House Energy and Commerce subcommittee in April that cutting the Amtrak subsidy would "kill the rail system". Another witness indicated that if Amtrak receives inadequate federal support in Fiscal 1986, all intercity rail passenger services will immediately cease, including service on the dense corridor in which Delaware stands. Why is this move even being contemplated? The United States government has spent billions recently to rehabilitate a passenger railroad system that had been allowed to deteriorate and now, the suggestion is made that we negate that rehabilitation and disrupt urgently needed commuter service. We would also be adding to the cost of accommodating 20 million passengers on other modes of transportation, as well as adding to administrative costs by bringing into play labor protection laws enacted by Congress years ago. In short, it would cost us more money to shut down Amtrak than to keep it running!

I will not take the time of this body to list the many statistics and other data which I have to back up these statements. Anyone who is interested in this information may certainly request more specifics from me. But my purpose in rising today is to bring to the attention of this Assembly and to the people of Delaware the very real, permanent and irrevocable danger which termination of Amtrak service would bring to our state. Even though the original Reagan proposal has been tempered, the very thought of meddling with the continued growth and restoration of our important railway system is frightening. Amtrak has come a long way since the United States Congress authorized governmental control of the railway system. It is up to a point where 60 percent of the costs of the railroad are borne by passengers and only 40 percent are subsidized. This compares favorably with the subsidy costs given to air transportation in our country (\$34 per rail passenger vs. 42 per air passenger). 17,500 people each day ride the train between New York and Washington. Delaware ridership alone in Fiscal Year 1984 was 526,000 people. Amtrak expended nearly 2.2 million dollars for goods and services in Delaware in fiscal year '84 and Amtrak employs 985 of Delaware's residents who earn 25 million dollars and pay taxes. Indeed, if Amtrak shuts down, we will be faced with yet another burden on our unemployment insurance system. Our workers will suffer, our passengers will suffer, our tax revenues will suffer--this is not something which we should take lightly. We must protest and we must request that our Senators and Congressman protest. Anyone who has seen the beautifully renovated station in downtown Wilmington cannot help but wonder about those who suggest taking steps that might force us to close that station and gut the Amtrak system. The United States would then be the only industrial nation in the world without rail passenger service. We cannot states would then out the only induction in the work without rail passenger service. We cannot state and idly by and let this happen. I urge each of my colleagues in this body and the Senate to contact our representatives in Congress and to alert our constituents to do the same. To quote Senator Biden from the Congressional Record of February 27, 1985. "There is no doubt that improvements must still be made in Amtrak operations and I fully expect they will be made. Amtrak management has shown that the railroad can meet the goals set by Congress. I prefer a course of action that continues to push Amtrak toward a better financial performance, rather than the Administration's meat-ax approach. I urge my distinguished colleagues to keep America's passenger railroad rolling." I urge my distinguished colleagues to do the same. Thank vou.

Section 501, Title I of the Delaware Code establishes May 30th. as the official date for observance of Memorial Day in the State of Delaware. The wording of the law leaves no doubt as to its meaning, yet every year a resolution is rushed through the General Assembly allowing observance of Memorial Day on the last Monday of May so as to coincide with the Federal observance.

Each year the Delaware military veterans have belatedly and in a disorganized manner opposed this casual waiver of the law regarding one of our most significant veterans' recognition days.

From its original day of inception in 1868 and for almost 100 years thereafter, Memorial (or Decoration) Day was observed in the various states on May 30th as a solemn occasion for honoring their war dead and a rededication to the principles for which these fallen had given their lives. Unfortunately, in recent years, the purpose of the ovent has been subverted and the date commerciallized [sic] as a "play" holiday. Moving the observance date to a Monday, thus creating a long weekend, has been a primary factor in this degradation of an otherwise important religious and patriotic event.

The various veterans organizations are working on a national level for Congressional restoration of the May 30th observance. A number of states no longer use the "last Monday in May" date.

The nine statewide veterans organizations represented on the Delaware State Veterans Affairs Committee, established under Executive Order No. 67 dated 15 Dec. 1978, strongly oppose any further shifting of the observance of Memorial Day from May 30th to the last Monday in May. On their behalf, as chairman of the committee, I most seriously request that you, as one of the leadership in the 1st Session, 133rd General Assembly, exert your influence and position to oppose any further effort to tamper with the observance of Memorial Day on May 30th as established in the existing statute.

Dear Al:

I looked for you on Wednesday in Legislative Hall at 1:00 pm and you were not in, therefore, I will drop you a note on H.B. 26 with my comments.

I believe Family Court presently has a statutory means of obtaining jurisdiction over a custodial parent receiving child support when there is an allegation of mismanagement of the funds being provided for the child. It is Title 10, <u>Del. C.</u>, §950 – Imperiling the Family Relationship.

I believe that Family Court presently has the ability to impose sanctions against a custodial parent for mismanagement of child support funds. It is Title 10, <u>Del. C.</u>, §925.

I note that H.B. 2 which relates to domestic relations on page 10 also has an accounting procedure set out similar to H.B. 26.

I am told that the Child Support Commission has voted to not endorse H. B. 26.

I am aware of the concern of bona fide child support payors over the mismanagement of their child support payments.

I have requested federal funds from the State Budget office to contract with an outside agency to investigate allegations of misappropriations of fiduciary funds belonging to the child and paid by the obligor.

If you wish to pursue H.B. 26, I suggest an amendment thereto, to read as follows:

"(14) Order a person receiving funds for the support of a child to account for the expenditure and management of such funds, pursuant to a Court rule."

I personally would have no problem with enactment of the amendment. The Court rule would set out the procedure so that the details would be available.

Dear Rep. Marony [sic]:

As a Delaware resident of 12 years and as a veterinarian for 17 years, I find the controversy over the use of the high altitude chamber disturbing. Euthanasia of surplus dogs and cats is unpleasant and any method of euthanasia can be abused. However, the use of the chamber at the Delaware Humane Association is not inhumane. Mrs. Prescott has records of service to the chamber, numerous people have seen the chamber in action and have reported humane euthanasia.

The problem is the misinformation and distortion of information spread by a group of people (probably well meaning and sincere) about a method of euthanasia they do not understand. Of course l'd be distressed if locked in a chamber but l'm also distressed when held down and l see someone coming at me with a needle. Reports that animals explode are ludicrous. Claims that animals with middle ear infections have excruciating pain in the chamber are exaggerated. Having been subject to middle ear infections as a child, I can attest that just having a middle ear infection is painful. Causing the animal to pass out in 15 to 30 seconds, as the high altitude chamber does, is a blessing. The animals lungs do not collapse, they don't "blow up like a balloon", they don't "suffer for 20 minutes", these claims are absurd.

What the claims do, however, is play on human emotion. If I read these letters to the editor with no knowledge of the chamber I'd probably be outraged also. My concern is that the legislature also may make its decision on the basis of emotion rather than in the light of logic and fact. If the legislature believes that the chamber needs to be regulated, that's fine. However, to ban the chamber is legislative overkill.

I further believe you need to take a look at the group spearheading this drive to ban the chamber. People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA) is a group which is intense, well financed and "against" much more than they are "for". Many of the original group are vegetarians. They are against animal research, against confinement rearing of swine, against intensive veal production, against caged laying poultry operations, against large scale production of broilers. In Massachusetts recently a bill was introduced into the state legislature to ban all animal research in the state!

In closing I would like to applaud the humane organizations of the State of Delaware. Their job of collecting, finding homes for and in many cases euthanasia of animals is difficult but has served the people of Delaware. This legislation seems to be a solution for which there is no problem.

I am sorry to see that you are under your annual attack on the use of the high altitude chamber for euthanasia. I abhor the misinformation that has appeared in the media and is being disseminated to the public. I especially reject the personal attacks on you by people who obviously have not taken the time to get to know you. I think you should know that many of us in the veterinary profession have a great deal of respect and admiration for the work that you and the Delaware Humane Association have done over the years.

I would like to go on record as stating that the high altitude chamber used properly is not an inhumane method of anesthesia. This is a view supported by the American Veterinary Medical Association in their guidelines on euthanasia. The Delaware Veterinary Medical Association has also voted to support the AVMA guidelines on euthanasia

Euthanasia with the chamber involves removing oxygen so that none is transferred to the animals lungs and tissues. The animal passes out from lack of oxygen and dies. I have observed the chamber in operation and do not find it objectionable or inhumane.

Sodium pentobarbital is also a humane agent for euthanasia. It is however, a class II narcotic and is subject to both state and federal regulations. It must be securely stored and used by a licensed veterinarian or someone under veterinary supervision. Sodium pentobarbital also has the potential for abuse if it is injected outside of a vein or if an improper dose is used an animal may go through an excitement stage. The animal will appear dazed but frenzied, and may vocalize, urinate, and defecate. There is the further temptation when a vein is not readily available to simply dump the drug into the thorax hoping to hit the heart.

I hope that the carbon monoxide chamber and chloroform will not be included in any bills which may be introduced. As you know I believe that the carbon monoxide chamber is a risk to shelter personnel. Chloroform has been shown to be a potential human carcinogen.

Non-narcotic injectable euthanasia solutions are available. These are quite expensive and require more training of shelter personnel. There are two groups of animals which create problems in giving injectable euthanasia agents. Those which are quite ill frequently have no subcutaneous veins for injection. Also vicious animals require restraint and may be subjected to pain and injury prior to injection. These animals may be more humanely euthanized in the high altitude chamber. There is, therefore, no one best method of euthanasia.

As a veterinarian, I dislike the thought of the thousands of animals which are euthanized in Delaware each year. Any method of euthanasia has the potential for misuse and abuse by unskilled personnel. Part of the solution is to be sure that animal shelter workers have training and experience in the euthanasia method adopted by that shelter. Nobody hates the killing of dogs and cats worse than the people who have to do it daily in the shelters. They get no joy out of accidents which may occur whether they are using a chamber or injecting sodium pentobarbital. Accidents happen even in veterinary practices.

I wish only the best for you and the Delaware Humane Association.

In January of this year I had the opportunity to visit the Delaware Humane Association in Wilmington.

While there I witnessed two dogs being euthanized. The equipment, Euthanair Model SU serial # 255 manufactured by the Euthanair Engineering Company of Los Angeles, California, appeared to be in excellent condition and well maintained. The operator, an employee of the Delaware Humane Association, described the use of the equipment and appeared quite knowledgeable. He proceeded in a gentle and swift manner.

It is my opinion that this is a very humane method of euthanizing cats and dogs and other small animals. Also, there is considerable safety to the operator who in this case does not have to handle lethal drugs and syringes or be exposed to toxic gasses.

I continue to be very concerned about Senate Bill 138 which I feel unfairly addresses animal euthanasia methods. My concern is for the animals and for the future of animal humane involvement in our state.

Last week I visited an organization that I am very proud to be involved with, the Delaware Humane Association. Two of their dedicated and capable technicians euthanized a homeless, aged, and unhealthy dog. It is very sad but yet good to know that they are there and willing to do this, unfortunately, necessary job.

The high altitude, low pressure method was utilized. I observed that it did the job humanely and in a very acceptable time and manner. Their equipment is well maintained and in good working order. The technicians know what they are doing, and above all are very concerned about the humaneness of the procedure.

The Delaware Humane Association is run by a director, employees, and volunteers that are dedicated to the humane treatment of animals. I have been closely associated with them during the 17 years I have been a veterinarian in Delaware. I definitely trust them and I feel that the State Senate should as well.

I don't think that shelter technicians should be expected to inject barbiturates intravenously or that veterinarians should be hired for this procedure. As Dr. Paul Meckley and I have mentioned to you, this method is not always smooth and easy, irregardless of who is doing it. It is not always easy to hit the vein or to keep the needle in the vein for the entire administration. Many animals object to having their front leg squeezed with the tourniquet or by hand and many object to having their front leg extended forward. The barbiturate effect, like that of other drugs, is not always what we want it to be.

I am concerned by the disappointment and depression that I feel the employees and volunteers at DHA are experiencing. They are doing a good job for all of us and use no tax money--they need appreciation. Instead, they are being faced with distrust and negative publicity. Because their existence is threatened, they have to direct their concerns to Senate Bill 138.

Please do anthing you can to give them a hand.

In my opinion, no discomfort was experienced by the animal using this method, contrary to much of the publicity that it has received. In some instances where using lethal injections would create a threat to human safety the High Altitude-Low Pressure Chamber would even appear to be the preferred method of euthanasia. Putting animals to sleep is never easy but, of the methods available I strongly feel that the High Altitude-Low Pressure Chamber has a definite place and use in animal management. For these reasons I urge you to vote against S.B. 404. Its passage would serve no useful purpose.

I have never experienced lethal injection, but I have experienced loss of consciousness from decompression, not once but many times.

When I was a pilot in the U. S. Air Force in World War II, one of my lungs collapsed ostensibly from high altitude flying. When I was fully recovered, I wished to return to flying status and, as part of that, volunteered as a guinea pig for our base flight surgeon to do experiments in pressure breathing. And so twice a week for a month or so, I was placed in a decompression chamber, air was pumped out until I lost consciousness, and then I was immediately given oxygen. The idea was that by constricting the muscles used in expiration and holding one's breath at the same time, more oxygen could be forced into the blood stream thereby enabling one to retain consciousness for a longer period at high altitude in an emergency.

The point of all of this is to say that in my experience, decompression is totally painless and one is not even aware that it is happening. There is no feeling of being out of breath or of suffocation or any other unpleasantness in the experience. It is my personal opinion that the decompression chamber is the most humane way of terminating consciousness, i.e., life.

Representative Outten read the following communications into the record:

...We met with Mrs. Pat Prescott at the Delaware Humane Association and she assured us that the dog to be euthanized would lose consciousness and he/she would not feel any pain. We watched as a healthy dog was placed in the chamber. The machine was turned on and the dog became unsteady on his feet. He fell and began thrashing so violently that the newspapers that had lined the floor of the chamber were now completely covering all but the head and one paw of the dog.

We were confused as to why the dog was not yelping but found out later that with the decompression effect on the lungs animals are unable to vocally display any distress. The dog was clearly gasping for breath and seemed extremely distressed. This lasted approximately 1-2 minutes. His eyes were bulging and remained open even after being removed from the chamber.

After speaking with Mrs. Prescott we had expected a quick, painless death. What we saw was to the contrary. We feel our efforts must now be directed towards preventing the continued use of the decompression chamber. We have also witnessed euthanasia by sodium pentobarbitol injection and feel it is definitely more humane.

In our meeting with Mrs. Prescott she kept referring to animal welfare organizations in a disrespectful manner. She failed to mention the good work they do, only discussing their budget...

...Finally, we would point out that we have repeatedly and emphatically stressed to Mrs. Patricia Prescott, Executive Director of the Delaware Humane Association that they should phase out and completely eliminate use of the high altitude/low pressure chamber. Since only a few euthanair chambers remain in operation across the United States, we no longer own or maintain the altimeter testing equipment for the chambers. In fact, the majority of the operating chambers in the United States are in the process of being phased out since repair parts and trained mechanics are no longer available... On June 18, 1985, I received House Bill No. 106, as amended by House Amendment No. 1, which is entitled:

"AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 43, TITLE 11,

DELAWARE CODE RELATING TO VIOLATIONS OF

PAROLE OR CONDITIONAL RELEASE."

This bill would require that any person "who commits a crime while at large on parole or conditional release and is convicted and sentenced therefor shall serve the unexpired portion of the sentence under which he was released consecutively before any new sentence" begins. Furthermore, under this bill any new sentence imposed for a crime committed while at large on parole on conditional release "shall be served consecutively after the completion of the sentence imposed for the original offense and shall not be suspended."

The terms used in House Bill No. 106 are undefined, however, with the result that the legislation is unintentionally overbroad in its application. For this reason, and to enable the redrafting of the legislation to better accomplish its purpose, I am returning House Bill No. 106 without my signature.

The purpose of House Bill No. 106 is to mandate and aggravate the punishment of parolees, work releasees, furloughees and supervised custody inmates who commit crimes while on conditional release. The term "crime" is undefined by the legislation, however, and the general definition of that term in the Delaware Criminal Code includes "an Act or omission forbidden by a statute of this State and punishable upon conviction by ... fine [among other punishments]". The effect is that a parolee, who, for example, is fined for a traffic violation, must be returned to prison to serve the balance of his original sentence. Any violation or any misdemeanor will result in the conditional releasee's reimprisonment. I do not believe that this was the intent behind House Bill No. 106.

It is also unclear what the phrase "at large on parole or conditional release" means in the context of this legislation. Is the provision aimed only at crimes committed by conditional releasees who evade their custodial arrangements, and so are "at large"? Again, I do not believe that is the intent of the legislation.

I agree with the concept underlying this bill. Offenders on parole or other conditional release have been granted a priviledge [sic.] which carries with it a special responsibility on their part. When a parolee, work releasee or supervised custody inmate commits a crime while enjoying the priviledge [sic.] of conditional release, he violates a special trust. It is entirely appropriate, therefore, that such an offender suffer not only the consequences of his actions, but be subject to stiffer punishment than in the ordinary case.

But the effect of House Bill No. 106, in its present form, will be to mandate the reimprisonment of every offender who violates any provision of the law. In order that this legislation can be redrafted to better accomplish its true purpose, I am returning House Bill No. 106, as amended by House Amendment No. 1, without my signature.

I stand ready to cooperate, however, in the redrafting and reenactment of this legislation. I will ask the Sentencing Accountability Commission to assist in this effort, so that this legislation will fit into the comprehensive sentencing scheme SENTAC is charged with developing.

On June 26, 1985, I received House Bill No. 195 as amended by House Amendment No. 1 which is entitled:

"AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 84, TITLE 11, OF THE DELAWARE CODE RELATING TO THE DELAWARE POLICE TRAINING PROGRAM" Environmental Protection Officers, including Game Wardens, and Marine Police Officers of the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control, hired after January 1, 1985 will be required by House Bill No. 195, as amended by House Amendment No. 1, to attend the Delaware Police Training Program and to receive certification from the Counsel on Police Training.

I am advised that the curriculum currently adopted by the Delaware Police Training Program includes 12 weeks of in depth study of subjects such as the Law of Arrest, the Motor Vehicle Code, Criminal Code, Traffic Accident Investigation, Investigating Crimes Against the Person and Property, Patrol Procedures, Pursuit Driving, Riot Control and General Police Tactics. Considering the fact that Delaware's Marine Police are very limited in their jurisdiction, namely, insuring compliance with State law and the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control's regulation of all vessels using, moored or anchored on State waters (see 23 <u>Del. C. §2118</u> (b), it should be clear that only a small percentage of mandated courses made a part of their curriculum would be applicable at all to the duties of the Marine Police. I further understand that most, if not all, of the Marine Police and Environmental Protection officers currently in the employ of the State have already matriculated through the Police Training Program on a voluntary basis and without any statutorily imposed mandate.

It is incumbent upon the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control, together with a representative of the State Police Training Program, to develop a new curriculum and explore other available educational resources that would more adequately serve the purpose of educating Delaware's Marine Police.

I wholeheartedly endorse the concept of education and training in police enforcement skills for these enforcement personnel. However, in the specific case of the Marine Police, the Delaware Police Training Program offers very little for them in light of the skills that are necessary for them to discharge the duties set forth at 23 <u>Del. C.</u> §2118. It is not intended that the Environmental Enforcement Officers (including Game Wardens) and the Marine Police are at all prohibited from attending the Police Training Program. That option is certainly available to them on a voluntary basis, and should be followed until a more appropriate curriculum is developed, either wholly within the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control, or in conjunction with some other program existing now within or outside of the State. With those facts in mind, I return House Bill No. 195 as amended by House Amendment No. 1 unsigned.

I am returning without my signature House Bill No. 65 as amended by House Amendment No. 1, received on June 30, 1985, which is entitled:

"AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 11, TITLE 30, DELAWARE CODE RELATING TO PERSONAL INCOME TAXES BY ALLOWING A CREDIT FOR MEMBERS OF DELAWARE VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANY AUXILIARIES FOR CERTAIN EXPENSES."

This bill would permit voting members of Delaware Volunteer Fire Company Auxiliaries to claim a Delaware State tax credit in an amount not to exceed \$75.00 against their tax that would otherwise be due for expenses actually incurred for the purchase of clothing, equipment, motor fuel, and other essential items necessary to perform their duties provided that those duties performed include a minimum of 50 hours of volunteer service.

All Delawareans owe a debt of gratitude to their community volunteer firemen and their support groups such as fire company auxiliaries who volunteer countless hours and risk their lives in an attempt to protect our lives and property. While these countless hours of service are performed without any pay or other remuneration, they do not go unrecognized nor unappreciated.

This year, Delaware is enjoying a record budget surplus, and, as a government, we should be looking for ways to return some of this money to Delaware's taxpayers. In deciding how to return some of this money to Delaware's taypayers, it is important that we look for a comprehensive approach to cutting taxes. Arriving at a comprehensive approach to cutting taxes has been a very important goal of my administration so far this year. Next week, I will sign legislation passed by the General Assembly which eliminatesthe Inheritance Tax as it applies to surviving spouses and which increases the personal income tax exemption from \$800 to \$1,000. Very soon, I expect to be signing legislation that provides for a nine percent (9%) across-the-board cut in Delaware's personal income tax rates.

It is my opinion that these tax cuts will benefit every taxpayer of the State of Delaware by returning part of Delaware's surplus in a way that will do the most good. Clearly, House Bill No. 65 as amended by House Amendment No. 1 does not lead to such a result. It would be terribly inconsistent to enact legislation that would fractionalize or in any way set apart persons, groups, or business entities for special tax relief.

For the reasons cited above, I am returning without my signature House Bill No. 65 as amended by House Amendment No. 1.

On June 28, 1985, I received House Bill No. 178, which is entitled:

"AN ACT TO RE-INCORPORATE THE TOWN OF NEWPORT."

This bill would make a number of changes in the charter of the Town of Newport; for example, the revised charter would provide for a Town Manager, which the Town currently has but which is not specifically provided for in its existing charter. Because the document enacted by the General Assembly does not contain the entire text of the proposed new charter, I must return House Bill No. 178 without my signature.

House Bill No. 178 comprises 38 pages, which are numbered "1" through "31" and "34" through "39". (In fact two identical pages numbered "31" are contained in House Bill No. 178.) It is clear that the legislation was supposed to include additional pages numbered "32" and "33", because there is no continuity of text or subject between pages "31" and "34" and because the footers on each page of the bill indicate that each numbered page is one of "39".

Nor are the missing pages mere surplusage in the intended enactment. Page "32" contains the substance of the Town's "Comprehensive Development Plan" authority, the heading for which is seen on Page "31" of the bill, and, continuing over to page 33, the missing pages also contained provisions relating to the Town's official map and limitations on planning.

Since the actual document delivered to me labeled House Bill No. 178, which is missing these pages, will go into the Session Laws if signed, and form the text of a chapter in the Laws of Delaware, I must veto the bill so that a correct charter change can be enacted. This is not simply an engrossing error; the actual document introduced, debated and passed by the General Assembly does not contain the provisions found on supposed pages "32" and "33". Therefore, I must return House Bill No. 178 without my signature.

On June 28, 1985, I received House Bill No. 231, as amended by House Amendments Nos. 1 and 2, which is entitled:

"AN ACT TO AMEND TITLES 10, 13, 29 AND 30 OF THE

DELAWARE CODE RELATING TO CHILD SUPPORT ENFORCEMENT." This legislation embodies a comprehensive revision to Delaware's child support enforcement laws initiated by the State Commission on Child support in response to a federal mandate. Unfortunately, due to a fatal defect in the title of the bill, I must return it without my signature.

Each substantive provision of this bill is directly linked to some aspect of child support enforcement, except Section 5, which deals with the rule-making authority of the Family Court. Section 5 prescribes general rule-making powers for the Court in line with similar powers granted to the Superior Court and the Court of Chancery. But though Section 4 of the bill calls for Family Court to make rules providing for expedited procedures regarding the determination and enforcement of support obligations, Section 5 goes well beyond what is necessary to implement that responsibility, particularly in view of the Court's existing statutory authority to "make and publish Court rules governing policies, processes, practices, and procedures".

Article II, Section 16 of the Constitution of 1897 provides that "no bill... shall embrace more than one subject which shall be expressed in its title". House Bill No. 231 violates this constitutional provision on two counts: The general rule-making authority of the Family Court is a subject distinct from child support enforcement, and the title of the bill in no way constitutes fair notice that the legislation deals with such rule-making. Thus House Bill No. 231 is unconstitutional.

I reach this conclusion reluctantly, since House Bill No. 231 is the result of the hard work of the State Commission on Child Support and its legislative sponsors, and since Delaware should enact this legislation prior to October 1 of this year. The fatal flaw in the title of this bill was brought to the attention of the sponsors after its passage, however, and a new bill, without the general rule-making authority provision, was passed by the House of Representatives prior to its adjournment on July 1. I am certain that the State Senate will pass the corrected bill promptly when it returns in special session in the near future, and so I veto House Bill No. 231 with the expectation of signing replacement legislation well before October 1.

At this time, however, because House Bill No. 231 runs afoul of Article II, Section 16 of the Delaware Constitution, I am returning it without my signature.

On July 8, 1985, I received House Bill No. 80, as amended by House Amendment No. 1, which is entitled:

"AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 6, TITLE 29 OF THE DELAWARE CODE PROVIDING FOR ATTORNEYS' FEES FOR SMALL BUSINESSES IN ACTIONS INVOLVING A STATE AGENCY."

This bill will give Delaware Courts the discretion to award attorney's fees to small businesses when the small business prevails against the State in a civil action or an appeal of an administrative proceeding when the initial action was brought on behalf of the State based on circumstances arising out of the conduct or operation of the small business. The bill also provides that the award of such attorneys' fees shall not exceed \$5,000.

House Bill No. 80 as amended by House Amendment No. 1 leaves in doubt the issue of whether attorneys' fees can be awarded for cases that are currently under litigation either at the administrative level, or currently in court (trial level or on appeal). I have been advised that there are literally hundreds of cases currently going on in the State involving State Agencies and small businesses that would fall within the definition contained in §604(2) of this bill. The Division of Revenue, Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control, the Department of Labor, the Department of Health and Social Services and the Department of Community Affairs are only a few of the State Agencies that are involved in these disputes.

Secondly, House Bill No. 80 as amended by House Amendment No. 1 is internally inconsistent when one addresses the funding or appropriation issue. Section 604(d) directs agencies that are held liable for attorneys' fees to make such payments from unencumbered funds in their budget line titled "Contractual Services". Any unencumbered funds in a contractual services budget line are considered general appropriated funds. The Bill is inconsistent to the extent that subparagraph (e) indicates that the implementation of this Act or the payment of any attorneys' fees is subject to specific annual appropriations in the annual operating budget. I have been advised by the Budget Office and the Controller General's office that there are no specific annual appropriations in this year's annual operating budget. Futhermore, House Bill No. 80 as amended by House Amendment No. 1 is not considered to be an appropriations bill in a way that would allow this bill to be self-implementing for purposes of funding various agencies' liability for payment of attorneys' fees.

For the reasons above stated above, I am returning House Bill No. 80 as amended by House Amendment No. 1 without my signature.

# JOINT SESSION

# House Chamber

January 14, 1986

Pursuant to <u>HCR 89</u>, the House and Senate met for a Joint Session in the House Chamber. The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the Senate. They were admitted and seated.

Mr. Speaker Hebner invited the President Pro Tempore to share the rostrum.

The Speaker appointed Representative Gwynne Smith, Representative Katharine Jester, Senator Nancy Cook and Senator William Slatcher to escort the Governor to the Chamber.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the Chief Justice and Members of the Judiciary. They were admitted and seated.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the Cabinet Officials. They were admitted and seated.

Representative Oberle moved that the House and Senate convene in Joint Session. The motion prevailed.

Representative Oberle moved that the Speaker of the House preside over the Joint Session. The motion prevailed.

Representative Oberle moved that the Chief Clerk of the House and Secretary of the Senate act as Secretaries of the Joint Session. The motion prevailed.

The Sergeant-at-Arms admitted the Governor and the duly appointed Committee to the House Chamber. The Speaker invited the Governor to the rostrum and introduced him to the Joint Session. The Governor addressed the Joint Session as follows:

Mr. Speaker, Mr. President Pro Tem, members of the House and Senate, elected officials, members of the judiciary and cabinet, fellow Delawareans.

It is with considerable pleasure that I come before you today for the second time in the capacity of Governor of the State of Delaware, to fulfill the constitutional duty imposed on this office.

Our Constitution requires that the chief executive of the State "shall, from time to time, give to the General Assembly information of affairs concerning the State, and recommend for consideration such measures as he shall judge expedient."

The men who have occupied this office have been faithful to that duty. Taken together, the governors' messages collected in the State Archives present a series of "snapshots" of Delaware over nearly two centuries, a tapestry of life in which government evolves and takes shape and issues fundamental to democracy are debated.

They reflect the accomplishments and aspirations of the people of the State since the birth of the nation.

Today, as we begin the second and concluding session of the 133rd General Assembly, it is worth considering what we have added to those accomplishments, as well as what we hope to do in the months to come.

As we do so, we should consider an observation made by the statesman, Henry Clay, more than a century and a half ago.

"Government," Clay said, "is a trust, and the officers of the government are trustees; and both the trust and the trustees are created for the benefit of the people."

That the people of Delaware have benefited from the bipartisan administration of that trust in recent years cannot be questioned.

Today our State enjoys unprecedented prosperity and job growth. Our unemployment rate, which reached a record-breaking low of four and one half percent in the past year, is testimony to that.

Three personal income tax cuts in seven years, which have resulted in a reduction of more than forty percent in the personal income tax rate for the average Delaware family, provide proof that government has exercised the fiscal restraint our taxpayers demand.

That fiscal restraint is all the more commendable in light of the unprecedented growth in resources available to the State in recent years.

Much credit must be given to the co-chairs of the Joint Finance Committee, Senator Cook and Representative Corrozi, and the other members of the committee, for limiting the growth of the base budget to what is reasonable and necessary, protecting our taxpayers from unconscionable demands in the future.

We have used surplus funds to reduce debt, and we have used them as well to make needed repairs to our rural roads, schools and State buildings--which will mean future savings for our taxpayers.

We have demonstrated a strong commitment to education in Delaware with a substantial infusion of new State dollars to the public education system, and by requiring higher standards of both teachers and students.

And we have continued Delaware's tradition of protecting our environment and our citizens from threats to their well-being.

There is much to be proud of in the accomplishments I have just described. Yet the list of what State government has accomplished is much longer.

We enjoy the services of thousands of dedicated and hard-working State employees, and our progress must be measured as well in the efforts of those individuals: a caseworker helping a troubled teenager, an administrator eliminating red tape in providing services to our citizens, or a State trooper saving lives.

Together, they assure that the quality of life in Delaware is preserved and protected.

That concept--quality of life--taken in its broadest sense, embraces all that government does, and whether or not we succeed in governing is largely determined by the quality of life in our State.

By that measure, it is fair to say that we have succeeded, that we have made a difference.

At the same time, of course, there is more we can do, and I would like to turn now to the positive steps we can take in the coming year.

In doing so, however, this caution.

It was neither wishing nor good intentions that allowed us to cut taxes three times, bring thousands of new jobs to Delaware or provide programs that truly benefit our citizens.

Thoughtful management, fiscal restraint, bipartisan cooperation, and a respect for our taxpayers made those things possible.

The ability of government to meet the demands of its citizens and to assure the continued growth of our economy requires that we remember the crushing cost of government that is poorly managed, careless with its resources or heedless of those who support it.

I am committed to the tradition of government that has been established in Delaware in recent time, and I am confident that you--as partners in that tradition--share my commitment.

Two and a half decades ago, a national effort to protect the environment was given impetus with these words:

"It is our task in our time and in our generation to hand down undiminished to those who come after us, as was handed down to us by those who went before, the natural wealth and beauty which is ours." President Kennedy spoke those words in 1961.

Since then, we have seen vast improvements in the quality of our water; we have afforded protection to land that otherwise might have been irreparably harmed; and we have eliminated dangerous pollutants from the air.

Delaware has been a leader in cleaning up and protecting the environment, but there are still challenges before us.

Most important, perhaps, is to assure the continued protection of our coastal zone. Last year our authority over that sensitive area was challenged and thrust into the hands of a federal court.

We are fighting to retain that control, but whatever the outcome of the case, all of us must be prepared to work together to take immediate steps to assure the continued protection of our natural resources.

There are fewer obstacles to our efforts to combat the effects of hazardous materials.

Last year, with your support, the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control renewed its commitment to protect our environment. That commitment was backed up with a substantial increase in funding and positions within the department.

Just last week, we took a step forward when new quarters for many of the scientists, engineers and technicians in the Division of Air and Waste Management were dedicated near Delaware City.

Locating those offices in the midst of some of the most troublesome hazardous sites in our State, as well as near the majority of the State's petrochemical facilities, was a practical step--and demonstrates the State's commitment to a clean Delaware.

When you receive my budget in two weeks, you will see that that commitment is continuing—and increasing. Together, we can assure that the department is properly staffed to fight illegal dumping that adds to environmental hazards in our State and to clean up existing hazards.

I will recommend that another million dollars be set aside for Superfund clean-ups, and that the department be equipped with the best available technology to measure pollutants in the ground, in the air and in the water.

And I will make one further recommendation:

To assure that Delaware never be considered as a future storage site for low-level radioactive wastes, I will recommend that we join the states of Pennsylvania and West Virginia in the Appalachian Compact for disposal of those wastes.

As I said earlier, the success of government depends on the thousands of men and women responsible for its operation. So it is vitally important that we have the ability to attract and keep good employees.

It was that concern that prompted me last year to create the Compensation and Productivity Commission which recently reported to you on the state of our merit system.

Drawing on both the public and private sectors, the commission brought together a talented group of people whose charge was to examine the merit system and recommend changes which would make the State a better and more competitive employer.

Today I would like to publicly offer my thanks to Mike Cassell-the other Mike Cassell-chairman of the commission, and all the other members for their work. Their report describes a system in need of repair, and then proposes concrete, practical steps to accomplish those repairs. It also came to an important conclusion: that for the most part our total compensation package is indeed competitive with other governments. To be sure, adjustments are necessary to assure equity within the system, and I will recommend appropriations to restore equity where it has been lost.

The commission having done its work, it is for us to turn those recommendations into actions, and in the next few months we will consider measures, both administrative and legislative, needed to assure that we have skilled employees in all State agencies, and at the same time offer employment opportunities that are both challenging and rewarding for each State employee.

As we do so, I would like to make two observations.

The first concerns "pay for performance," an approach based on the idea that the best employees should be paid more. I believe that with responsibility should come the opportunity to reap greater rewards, and I urge the General Assembly to approve changes in our merit system which will allow us to reward excellence in management, because it is a means to better government.

If the first issue requires a "hands-on" approach by the Legislature, the second requires "hands-off." Too often in the past, pay raises for particular groups of State employees have been based on

political clout rather than merit, and the result has been a pay system that is unfair to employees who are equally or more deserving, but who have less political influence.

At the same time, it has resulted in a system of enormous complexity when we need a merit pay system that is simple to apply and easy to understand.

If we are to remedy this, then you and I must agree that our role in the State compensation system is to set standards and provide the resources to meet those standards, not to set individual salaries.

Soon after I took office, I ordered the creation of a series of cabinet councils to improve communication and coordination among departments with overlapping responsibilities.

Today I can report that the members of my cabinet, men and women of ability, have made the cabinet councils work beyond even my expectations.

One of the most exciting initiatives to come out of those meetings addresses an important issue confronting Delaware and the nation--early childhood development.

The first five years of life are of special importance in a child's development. It is during those years that we have the opportunity to treat many <u>problems</u>—poor health, the effects of broken families, poverty and inadequate education—that quickly rob a child of any chance for success and happiness.

Failing that, society must treat the enduring <u>symptoms</u>—unemployment, illiteracy and dependence on assistance from public and private sources—all of which place substantial long-term demands on our

resources, none of which ever really restore what has been lost to the individual. As Chairman of the National Governors Assocation Committee on Human Resources, I have given high priority to developing programs on the national level that indeed treat the problem, and it is my

hope that in the coming year Delaware will take the lead in this matter. I am proposing several steps.

First, I will recommend a comprehensive infant mortality prevention program and expanded services to high-risk infants, as well as pilot pre-school programs for four-year olds in each county.

We will also begin an education program in publicly supported day-care facilities, and continue our support for the Delaware Read-Aloud program, which has inspired similar programs in other states.

To make sure this effort--which we will call Focus on the First Sixty Months--is as effective as possible, we will conduct a state-wide public information program to make parents aware of potential problems and ways they can solve or help them.

In a State as caring as ours, there can be no excuse for allowing a child to be robbed of all hope even before he or she learns to write his or her own name.

Now I will turn to the most pressing matter before us today, and the reason I asked to address you as the session begins.

Benjamin Disraeli, the great British prime minister, said that government was the keystone of human progress.

I believe government has no responsibility more important to that progress than the responsibility for educating its citizens.

Two years ago, Bob Barnett and I served as co-chairmen of the Governor's Task Force on Education for Economic Growth. In the two years since the task force issued its report on Delaware's public schools, we have made substantial progress toward many of its recommendations.

We took steps to reduce class size, we made kindergarten compulsory, we increased academic requirements on a state-wide basis, and we implemented a new funding mechanism to give school districts an incentive to increase local funding to schools.

However, one major area of the report has yet to be addressed as fully as I would like it to be. It was Goal No. 3 of our report: to improve the performance and compensation of teachers and school personnel.

During the past legislative session, my Administration followed the guidance provided by the Task Force and put forward the concept of a teacher career ladder. I should say in passing that the career ladder was modeled on one already working in Tennessee, the state where General Motors decided to build its new Saturn plant and create many thousands of new jobs. GM made that decision, in part, because of Tennessee's commitment and approach to public education—including the career ladder.

The effort to start a career ladder in Delaware's public schools failed, for several reasons. We spent too much time trying to refine the legislation before introducing it, leaving too little time for discussion among the many groups concerned with education, or for debate in the General Assembly. And there were many in the education community who had serious reservations about imposing a new system statewide without first testing it.

The result was a stalemate in which neither taxpayers nor teachers were truly served. The legislation was tabled, and action deferred until January, 1986.

Well, January is here, and the time to continue our discussion of a career incentive program is here as well. But that discussion should reflect a major change that has been occurring on the education landscape across the nation and in Delaware.

Very simply, the number of college students preparing to become teachers has been declining, and long-term demand threatens to outstrip supply.

Before schools open next year, school districts may have to hire as many as five hundred new teachers. But our State's colleges expect to graduate only 245 education majors--less than half of the anticipated demand.

Certainly one reason fewer college students are looking to teaching as a carcer is based on salary expectations. And in Delaware, starting teacher salaries are below those in surrounding states. Take New Jersey, for example.

A side-by-side comparison by the Delaware State Education Association--you probably saw it in the newspaper this weekend--shows that experienced teachers with master's degrees are paid virtually the same in Delaware and New Jersey. The difference is less than two percent.

Not so at the starting level.

In New Jersey a starting teacher earns \$18,500, while in Delaware the average salary for a starting teacher is only \$14,910. That's a difference of almost 20 percent. And that is one reason why Delaware is losing the battle when it comes to recruiting good teachers.

Now, I'm sure some would conclude that the recruitment problem shows the State has not made an ample commitment to education--that we must pay, and pay dearly, for solving the teacher shortage problem. But let's look at the facts.

Today, Delaware ranks eighth in the nation in per pupil spending.

Instuding my budget proposals for fiscal 1987, the State will have increased funding for public education by over fifty-seven million dollars in just three years--an increase of nearly 23 percent.

As part of that, we will have increased Division III funds---which are spent mostly on teacher salaries--by 70 percent and will have done so on a matching basis to encourage local districts to hold referenda and thereby increase the amount of local funds flowing into our schools.

And it's working. Of the ten school districts which have held referenda, nine have voted to increase local school taxes to qualify for the additional State funds.

In short, if we have a problem recruiting teachers in Delaware, it is not from a lack of commitment of resources from our taxpayers.

Rather, it is because we as elected officials are not making the tough decisions about how to spend education dollars that will allow us to attract the best teachers for our children and improve the quality of their education.

And let me widen the circle. It also raises questions about how committed those in leadership poisitions in the education community are to finding the best ways to enhance education with the resources that are already provided.

Time and again we are told by those who take America's pulse that the public is more than willing to support the dedication of new funds to education, but <u>only</u> if they see an improvement in the quality of the end product.

The challenge is clear: we must target our resources and demand that they be spent in areas which will produce results, and we must challenge the leaders of our educational community to find better and more efficient ways to handle the resources presently in the system.

So I am asking you today, as the session begins, to give immediate consideration to a series of steps intended to address the problem before it can erode the quality of education in Delaware.

It is my hope that when you and I leave here at the end of January, we will have taken the first steps in preventing a crisis in our schools.

If we fail to act, it will be a crisis that confronts us.

The first part of this program I am recommending to you concerns <u>recruitment</u>, providing the school districts with the means to attract new teachers.

I am recommending that the General Assembly approve in January the 285 dollar pay increase for teachers which was left on the table last June.

I am further recommending a minimum additional increase of one thousand dollars per teacher in Fiscal 1987 and changes in the pay scale to give up to two thousand dollars for starting teachers.

And I will recommend appropriation of the third year year of Division III funds-more than five million dollars, most of which historically has gone for salaries.

Together, these measures—combined with the local share of teacher salaries—will allow each of our school districts to compete in attracting skilled young professionals.

To attract more young people to teaching, I will propose creation of teacher scholarship loans for the top fifty graduating high school seniors who major in education at Delaware colleges. The loans--up to \$1,000 a year for four years--would be forgiven at the rate of \$1,000 for each year of teaching in a Delaware school.

To bring more teachers to Delaware, I have directed the Delaware Development Office to work with the school districts to help them develop a comprehensive marketing plan so that we can compete with states as far away as California, Florida and Texas, states which already have successful national teacher recruiting programs.

In recent weeks, my education advisor, Helen Foss, has been in almost constant contact with the many groups concerned about education in Delaware. And out of those conversations has come a theme, the second part of this education program. The theme is <u>revitalization</u>, using the vast resources within our education system to improve the system.

For instance, the Department of Public Instruction has developed a training and evaluation program to improve student achievement by increasing the effectiveness of teaching, and this revitalization effort deserves our support.

By the fall of 1987, the program will allow administrators in our schools to draw on new evaluation techniques and teachers will have been exposed to methods that research has shown make for effective schools.

By revitalization, too, I mean development of a strong and comprehensive staff in-service program, to be developed after studying existing programs and making whatever changes are necessary to help our teachers improve their skills.

Finally, the <u>rewards</u> aspect of this program.

I recognize that valid opposition to any incentive program will continue as long as there are concerns about funding and the evaluation process.

But I am committed to finding ways to offer incentives for good teaching, and to assuring that Delaware's school districts are able to attract good teachers.

So I will propose a pilot program to be developed in the next fiscal year and implemented during Fiscal 1988.

It involves a single district developing an incentive program to reward teachers who have shown special talent in teaching children. Using DPI evaluation instruments, this program will include teachers in its development, and will offer an incentive pay plan to reward outstanding teacher skills.

I am happy to announce today that Mike Walls, Superintendent of the Christina School District, with the approval of his board and support of the leadership of the district's teachers association, has already agreed to participate in this pilot program.

If it is proof that is required to make a teacher incentive program a reality in Delaware, then this pilot program in our largest school district is designed to provide a fair test of the system. If it is a new approach that is required, then this program is the means to that new approach.

Mike reflects the concern of parents in that district for higher standards in the classroom. He shares my willingness to take a fresh look at how we can provide incentives for our teachers, and he enjoys my unqualified support in this effort.

There is one other important education issue before us--vocational education. I will sign an executive order creating a Task Force to Study Vocational Education under the aegis of the State Board of Education.

Drawn from both public and private sectors, the task force will take a comprehensive look at vocational education in Delaware and report to us by the end of the year, recommending an approach that will allow us to ensure a balanced and appropriate education system.

In the past year, as we have reached out to the community for support and fresh ideas about education, I have discovered that there is taking place a lively and imaginative debate about how we can improve our schools.

Let me tell you what I mean.

A year ago, when I met with the State PTA, I challenged its members to find ways to make our schools even better---not with programs that cost more money, but with programs that make more effective use of the money we are already spending.

A few weeks ago, Janet Crouse came back to me with a long list of ideas.

Ideas like increasing the flexibility in funding formulas.

Like reducing the rate of teacher absenteeism.

Like changing the system so that school buses aren't running empty when students remain after school for extracurricular activities.

In the weeks to come, I hope we can begin a similar dialogue here.

Only good can come of it, for our State and our young people.

Today I have discussed education, the environment, a program to help our youngest children and our commitment to making lasting improvements in the State merit system.

There is much left to discuss, however: economic development--including support for the agricultural community--bond bill reform, the many social services the State provides, and the need for

safer streets and better roads.

And, having reviewed the impact of a conservative approach to State spending, I am mindful of the need to strengthen the control we have over State spending, particularly in light of what is happening in Washington.

When I present my recommended budget for your consideration, I will address those matters, because each deserves our attention and there are important steps we can take in each area. For now, I would like to leave you with a final observation on the state of the State.

\* \* \* \* \* \* \* \*

We have spent a great deal of time talking about education in recent years, and backed up our demands for higher standards with a substantial increase in State support for public education. In both can be found ample evidence of our commitment to good schools.

But I would suggest that commitment should be viewed in a broader context--a commitment to Delaware, to all that is good in our State, and to make our State better.

Consider:

Not far from here is the Delaware Fire School, the training ground for the thousands of men and women who volunteer to fight an ancient enemy and save lives. It is, if not the best, then among the very best in the nation.

I don't find that surprising.

As you drive through Sussex County, or Kent County, or southern New Castle County, you see some of the most beautiful farmland in the country. You also see the results of independence and innovation—successful and well-run farms in the country, and a farming community that knows the State is willing to respond to its needs.

Construction cranes tower over the Wilmington skyline, as that city continues to confound those who would suggest that the revitalization of our cities is flagging. It is a city on the move.

Not far from Wilmington, in Delaware City, tremendous strides have been taken to assure the health and safety of that Town's residents. A threat has been removed, and State government has reinforced its commitment to protecting its citizens.

All over the State, there are productive and growing businesses, a tribute to both the enterprise of the people who run them and the energy and skill of their employees. We make space suits, we manufacture chemicals, we build cars, we produce food for the table and do countless other things- all well.

In my Inaugural Address, I quoted the words of Theodore Roosevelt, who said, "This country will not be a good place for any of us to live in unless we make it a good place for all of us to live in." I said the same sentiment could be applied to Delaware.

It is a belief shared by the citizens of this State.

All of us are committed to a better Delaware, and I am confident that in the months to come you and I will honor the trust bestowed upon us, and continue to honor that commitment.

Thank you very much.

JOINT SESSION

#### SENATE CHAMBER January 30, 1986

At 1:54 p.m. Senator Cordrey appointed Senators Vaughn and Berndt as a committee to inform the

House that the Senate was prepared for a Joint Session.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced and admitted the Members of the House of Representatives. Senator Cordrey invited the Speaker of the House, Mr. Hebner, to be his guest on the rostrum.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced and admitted to the Chamber the State elected officials and members of the Governor's Cabinet.

At 1:57 p.m. on motion of Senator Sharp, and without objection, the House and Senate convened in Joint Session pursuant to  $\underline{SCR 90}$ .

Senator Sharp moved that Senator Cordrey preside over the Joint Session. There was no objection. On motion of Senator Sharp and without objection, the Secretary of the Senate and Chief Clerk of the House were appointed as secretaries to the Joint Session.

On motion of Senator Sharp, the Chair appointed the following as an Escort Committee for the Governor: Senators Holloway and Neal, Representatives Corrozi and Bennett.

A brief recess was called by the Chair awaiting the Governor's arrival.

At 2:00 p.m. the Sergeant-at-Arms announced and admitted to the Chamber Governor Michael N. Castle escorted by the previously appointed Committee.

Senator Holloway introduced the Governor and Senator Cordrey invited him to the podium. The Governor addressed the Joint Session as follows:

Mr. President Pro Tem, Mr. Speaker, members of the 133rd General Assembly, the Cabinet, honored guests and fellow Delawareans.

I will take about 25 minutes of the rest of your day. But, I can tell you to get to this point a lot of people put in a lot of hard work. There are a lot of big books you will be looking at later today. And, a lot of members of my Cabinet do that; but, of course, there is always one who has to do most of the work and stands out. And that is Steve Golding, my Budget Director. And I would like to thank him for all the work he's done for the last six months.

Delaware has enjoyed some very good years recently. It has been a time of prosperity and opportunities for our citizens.

This must be attributed, in part, to the fact that state government has learned to meet its responsibilities while limiting the demands it makes on its taxpayers.

The result has been eight years of balanced budgets and a ninth in the one I am presenting today, a healthy reserve of \$47.6 million in the constitutionally mandated rainy-day fund, and another \$19.2 million in the two-percent set-aside.

At the same time, we have continued to provide the programs and services our citizens expect. In fact, the State's ability to serve its citizens has increased in recent years, while the cost to individual taxpayers has decreased.

The tax cuts enacted in 1984 and 1985 alone have resulted in \$130 million the State might have collected remaining in our taxpayers' hands, and since 1979 the average family has seen its personal income taxes cut by over 40 percent.

We have done very well.

But now there is concern about the effect of the Gramm-Rudman Amendment, which is supposed to reduce the federal deficit by cutting federal spending. Tomorrow President Reagan will sign an order cutting funds that would have gone to state and local governments.

Delaware will not be exempt from the Gramm-Rudman cuts, and in the months ahead we must decide which programs deserve our continued support and whether State funds should replace federal funds.

But while we will have to shoulder our fair share of the burden, we will not find ourselves among the hand-wringers, for one very good reason -- we have learned from experience the importance of imposing limits on State spending. We know how to make the hard choices.

I will have more to say about Gramm-Rudman shortly. Now, however, I would like to turn to the budget I am presenting to you today.

First of all, it reflects the importance of controlling the growth of State spending. This budget provides for a total increase of 5.3 percent in expenditures when compared, dollar-for-dollar, to the current fiscal year, including both base operating budget and one-time expenditures.

I believe that is enough.

It is a budget which allows government to both match the rate of inflation and provide for additional growth in key areas -- notably education and environmental protection -- that will have long-term and lasting benefits for the citizens of Delaware and their children and grandchildren.

It is a budget that will allow the State to live within its means, and turn back to those who support it -- the taxpayers -- whatever revenues are not essential for its operation.

The Delaware Economic and Financial Advisory Council's latest estimate of new revenues in fiscal 1987 is \$911.3 million. After we add the expected fiscal '86 surplus of \$58.1 million and meet our reserve requirements, \$939.3 million will be available for State programs, plus \$10.8 million for grants-in-aid. Of that amount, 1 am recommending \$923.6 million for the fiscal 1987 budget.

The balance, \$15.7 million, I will discuss later.

Having described the budget in general terms, I now turn to the specifics, and there is no more appropriate starting point than the departments which claim a substantial part of the State's resources and provide services to many of our citizens.

### HUMAN SERVICES

Under the broad umbrella of human services are a number of important agencies -- Health and Social Services, youth services, as well as elements of our education system.

Diverse as their concerns may be, they share a philosophy -- that the State's role is to assist each individual to live his or her life to the fullest, independent and unencumbered by institutional restraints or regulations.

They work to prevent cause rather than effect, to get at the roots of poverty and failure rather than simply provide long-term support for those who suffer the consequences of early neglect.

They are committed to making institutionalization the solution of last resort, keeping as many citizens as possible in the community.

And they share a goal -- that the quality of care the State provides for each citizen is the best possible.

I told you two weeks ago that I am proposing a comprehensive program to treat many of the problems that affect our youngest citizens -- poor health, the effects of broken families, poverty and inadequate education.

Just as our aggressive economic development program aims at bringing new opportunities to our citizens, so our social programs must be designed to assure that every citizen is able to seize those opportunities, that they have not been robbed of initiative and hope as children.

In the coming year, we will begin a comprehensive effort to assure that <u>all</u> children in Delaware are born healthy and that they receive postnatal care that keeps them healthy. This will be a statewide effort, and one that centers in the home, where it can do the most good.

At the same time, recognizing that foster care is sometimes a necessary alternative, I am recommending that we take steps to assure that enough foster care homes are available by increasing foster care rates by 15.5 percent in the coming fiscal year, and provide the staff necessary to improve service coordination.

Finally, to assure that young children are able to derive full benefit from our education system when they begin school, I am recommending that pilot programs be established in each county to identify learning disabilities among four-year-olds.

Many other citizens require our help, of course, and the budget I am presenting to you today will allow us to meet federal guidelines to care for the mentally handicapped at Stockley, and in the process increase our ability to provide adequate services.

l am also recommending increased funding to continue toward our goal of deinstitutionalization whenever possible, and to continue to reduce the Stockley population from over 400 to 240 -- giving our mentally handicapped citizens a new measure of independence.

If society's progress is measured in part by how we treat the mentally retarded, then we have made a great deal of progress. We have recognized that few people need or want their lives regulated by those who would help, or their independence taken away in the name of compassion.

The assistance the State provides must be appropriate to the level of an individual's needs. If providing meals at home for the aged will allow our senior citizens to live out their years in

greater dignity, then we should provide resources to do it.

If there is a need for temporary shelter for someone in need, then we should provide that as well. And if there is a youngster in need of guidance which is not provided at home but who does not require incarceration at Ferris, then we should provide an alternative.

The budget I am presenting to you today does those things.

It also recognizes that at times the State's responsibility to provide assistance is accompanied by the need to provide incentives to greater independence and productivity.

We are meeting our responsibility by recommending a four percent increase in Aid to Families with Dependent Children, the second such increase in as many years.

But a study of our AFDC clients shows that over 29 percent remained on public assistance for over nine years, reflecting the failure of the system to provide alternative programs to assist people to regain their self-respect.

We must provide the means to break the chain of dependency that prevents people from achieving independence and success. We will take our first steps in that direction this year.

I am recommending creation of an employability program that will permit the department to begin to target clients who, because they are going to school or caring for children at home, cannot get a job.

# ENVIRONMENT

In my State of the State Address, I told you that I have given high priority to protecting our environment.

Recently the State's ability to respond to threatening situations, and our willingness to take tough action where necessary, have been tested and proven.

A major oil spill in the Delaware River was contained; laws to protect both our environment and our citizens have been vigorously enforced; and dangerous storage sites have been cleaned up. Each underlines the importance of the State's role in protecting, our citizens from harm.

In the budget before you, I am allocating over \$1 million to insure that Delaware has the resources to monitor the air quality, the expertise to keep our water clean and enough enforcement personnel to insure that the regulations we establish are obeyed.

We are also living up to our promise to clean up already contaminated sites which threaten our natural resources. An additional million dollars has been set aside to continue the programs of toxic waste cleanup and insure that there are no needless delays once appropriate remedial plans have been approved and these Superfund projects can begin.

The message of this administration is clear: we will not tolerate the violation of our laws or the pollution of our environment. The citizens of this State, and the vast majority of businesses and industries in Delaware, expect nothing less.

### CRIMINAL JUSTICE

You cannot read a newspaper or listen to a news report today without realizing that crime continues to demand society's -- and the State's -- attention.

Our citizens expect to be safe in their homes and on the streets of their communities. That requires an efficient and fair criminal justice system, and a corrections system that can protect society from dangerous criminals while helping other offenders learn to be productive members of society.

The citizens of this State don't want to hear excuses. They don't want to be told about overcrowding which has resulted in dangerous offenders being set free, or that those convicted of drunk-driving offenses are not serving their sentences.

Commissioner Sullivan has already begun to address those twin concerns and, to assure that the State is able to live up to its responsibility for public safety, this budget includes \$1.4 million for the start-up of the new, 300-bed minimum-security facility at Smyrna.

In conjunction with existing facilities, this will help us meet the demands placed on us by a growing prison population while guaranteeing that those sentenced for drunk-driving offenses indeed serve out their sentences.

I am recommending that you continue funding for an alcohol and drug program as well as the broader elements of our sentencing accountability initiative, and a new alternative program for juveniles, which will provide the means for rehabilitation for forty young offenders.

My budget also includes new funding for Family Court in Kent and Sussex counties, and resources to continue to eliminate delays in both Family Court and the criminal justice system as a whole.

# PUBLIC EDUCATION

One third of the budget I am presenting to you today will be spent on the education of our children in kindergarten through 12th grade — over \$306 million. Not only does education again receive the largest allocation of new State funds, but almost a quarter of total spending on public schools has been added in just three years.

As set forth in my state of the State Address, several steps are being taken to enhance teachers' salaries and assure that we have the ability to continue to attract and keep good teachers:

- o I have recommended a \$285 increase for every teacher to be adopted immediately.
- I have recommended a \$9.5 million pay increase for education employees -- adding up to over \$1,000 per teacher -- with a proposed change in the teacher pay structure to increase starting salaries by approximately \$2,000.
- o And I am recommending an additional \$5.4 million for Division III, 98 percent of which has been used for educational salaries in the past.

Combined with increased local supplements, particularly in those districts which have passed referenda, teachers this year will receive perhaps the largest single pay increase in any year in Delaware's history.

Other funds are being recommended for a scholarship loan program for high school seniors going to Delaware colleges and majoring in education; to support the training and education components of the DPI instructional improvement Model; and to support the development of Mastery Testing.

Now, we should examine what we expect to obtain for this great commitment of our dollars and human resources.

- As I have already said, we want the ability to recruit new teachers in a highly competitive market.
- At the same time, we must retain more experienced teachers, whose financial needs draw them away from the classroom.
- We must follow through on an evaluation process in which administrators and teachers know exactly what to expect and are focused on the teaching elements which have direct correlation with student achievement.
- We need a comprehensive teacher in-service program to help make good teachers better and to provide improvement programs for those evaluated as unsatisfactory.
- Our efforts to enhance education must focus on improving the way we use existing dollars. We spend more per pupil on education than almost any other state, and this year I want educators and interested citizens to work together to ensure that that money is being spent properly.
- And we need to begin a pilot program that will make schools more efficient in providing support where it belongs --- in the classroom.

This is in addition to the pilot incentive program I described in my State of the State Address and which Mike Walls, the Christina School District and the local teachers association have already begun working on.

# HIGHER EDUCATION

While much of our time and resources have been devoted to public education in Delaware, higher education must not be ignored.

Each of our institutions plays an important role in the State, but I think it is appropriate to single out one development at the University of Delaware for mention.

In the past year, the University has taken great strides toward becoming a national center for research in the area of composite materials, an esoteric subject with results as practical as a new, safer bumper for automobiles.

I am particularly proud that the University of Delaware has begun to receive national recognition, and my budget includes an increase in funding for the important research that is going on under Byron Pipes' enthusiastic leadership.

We are also increasing our support for the colleges of engineering, science and business, funding a pilot program in computer software development — another area where the University excels — and more funding for the Research Partnership Fund.

The budget also reflects the priorities of both Delaware State College, where a Faculty Development Program is addressed, and Delaware Technical & Community College by carmarking substantial funds to make salaries competitive.

# MERIT SYSTEM EMPLOYEES

In my State of the State Address, I indicated my support for the report prepared by the Compensation and Productivity Commission. My budget includes funding which will accomplish the major recommendations made by the Commission.

First, I propose that we restore internal equity to our system. The Commission ranked each of our 1,200 job classes in relation to all other classes. Some 900 employees were found to be compensated at less than the minimum pay level for the type of job they are performing. My budget provides \$650,000 to bring these employees within the higher recommended pay range and to assure that our entire pay structure is competitive with other state and local governments.

Second, funds are included in my budget to help improve productivity. I propose we focus on management ineffectiveness, since that has been identified as the single greatest cause of declining productivity in the United States. A Management Development Institute to provide a comprehensive, structured training program for managers and supervisors will help them improve their skills and become more effective. I have also included funds to develop employee incentive programs -- like flextime, service awards, and employee participation programs.

Finally, my budget includes a 4.5 percent pay increase for all State employees. When combined with the teachers' pay plan, additional compensable elements -- such as hazardous duty pay -- and a uniform shift differential, I am proposing over \$26 million be dedicated to salaries. That's 49 percent of our new revenues available this year.

# TRANSPORTATION

Since the beginning of this decade, Delaware has received over \$300 million in federal funds for highway projects; in 1985 alone, we received almost \$56 million.

Few other states have qualified to receive their full share of federal funding for highways, and this speaks well of what we have accomplished in building a good road system statewide.

As we address our highway needs in the coming session through the budget and bond bills, it might be useful to consider what has been accomplished recently.

Of great concern to the residents of the Dover area, as well as travelers up and down our State, is the U. S. 13 relief route. I'm happy to report that the initial public hearing stage of planning on this important project has been completed, and the Department of Transportation's recommendation for a route will be presented to the public and the General Assembly in the near future.

Construction on several other major projects begun during 1985, after years of planning, and Delaware motorists will soon see the benefits of improvements to Concord Pike, Route 4 in the Newark area and Route 8 in the Dover area.

And this year other major projects will begin -- the I-495 Edgemoor Interchange, Route 7 from Route 13 to the Pennsylvania line, U.S. 13 through Smyrna, Denney's Road in Dover, U.S. 13 from Seaford to Kent County, Route 1 through Bethany Beach, the second phase of work on Concord Pike and Naamans Road.

For Sussex County in particular, we will begin a comprehensive planning study of east-west routes to address the problem of heavy summer traffic and inconvenience experienced by many Sussex County towns.

# AGRICULTURE

A good transportation system is essential to all segments of our economy. The success of our agricultural community, for instance, depends on good roads.

But the State's support for farming does not stop there. My recommended budget includes funding both to assist the State's farmers in protecting their crops from harmful pests, and in marketing their products effectively once they have been harvested.

And it addresses a problem that has caused havoc in other states in recent years -- Avian Influenza. We in Delaware have been spared from the substantial losses other states have experienced, in part because the State has moved quickly when there is a threat. Today I am recommending that we provide the Department of Agriculture with the means to sustain and enhance its efforts to control Avian Flu.

### CAPITAL SPENDING

Now I would like to turn to the annual bond bill, which authorizes long-term borrowing and sets priorities for improvements to the State's infrastructure.

While we consider budget and bond projects separately, in fact they are closely linked and discussion of both is appropriate today.

It has become apparent to all of us that the time has come to increase both public scrutiny and public discussion of the State's capital spending program.

Each agency and department already has been asked to set its own priorities for the coming fiscal year, to document them and measure their cost effectiveness. After the Director of the Delaware Development Office holds public hearings on these proposals in February, I will present them to the General Assembly in early April.

In addition, I will instruct all cabinet secretaries to make their capital spending proposals available during their presentations to the Joint Finance Committee. As I said when I began, the last few years have been good to Delaware as we have learned the importance of cooperation and bipartisanship.

Delaware is a working partnership, and that partnership has paid off.

The guiding and fundamental principles of that partnership have been to restrain the growth of government; to help those who need help, but otherwise keep government out of its citizens' affairs; and to make sure that those who are responsible for our prosperity enjoy the benefits of their own labor by returning to them revenues the State does not need.

In preparing my recommendations on State spending for Fiscal 1987, I have hewed closely to those principles.

As a result, this budget, which meets the needs of all departments and increases State spending in several critical areas, leaves unexpended \$15.7 million which will be available during fiscal 1987. These funds should be used to address two important considerations.

The success which we have achieved in producing balanced budgets and surplus revenues is directly linked to the success of the private sector and to the employers and employees who make it work.

Therefore, I would propose that we return \$10.5 million to further encourage job growth. I propose that this be done in a balanced way.

I am recommending that we reduce the Public Utility Tax by 10 percent, reduce the Gross Receipts Tax on manufacturers to help attract blue collar jobs, extend a monthly exclusion from the Gross Receipts Tax to all businesses that do not have one now, and reduce paperwork for thousands of small businesses by simplifying filing requirements.

In addition, I am supporting several measures which will close loopholes and assure fairness in our tax laws. Taken together, these regulatory changes will result in no cost to the State or to our taxpayers.

One other adjustment must be noted: I am recommending that we increase the permitted deduction for charitable contributions to match the federal limit. This will help Delaware's charitable organizations.

Balanced with this tax adjustment for the business community, I would also continue our effort to lower Delaware's personal income tax with a modest, across-the-board reduction of all tax rates, from the lowest to the highest, of four percent.

These two proposals for tax relief to the business community and to the individual taxpayer would result in a net reduction in State revenue for the next year of approximately \$10.5 million -- and leave another \$5.3 million still unappropriated.

Those revenues I would leave unappropriated until we know how Gramm-Rudman will affect us. Unbridled and unchecked federal spending over the last decade has endangered the vitality of this

nation by producing a deficit so large that the federal government is competing with both the states and the private sector for capital needed to continue economic expansion.

While we must recognize that some cuts will cause pain for certain groups in our society and their legitimate needs should be met with state and local resources, we cannot simply replace federal cuts dollar for dollar.

I therefore propose reserving \$5.3 million for the purpose of examining those final federal cuts as the Joint Finance Committee prepares to draft the budget and using those funds in areas we decide should be addressed.

\* \* \* \* \*

The people of this State have made it abundantly clear that they want us to take as little as possible from them, to use what we take wisely, and to place clear limits on what government is and does. There is no question that the excellent management and careful control of State spending in recent

years offers new opportunities. But they are opportunities to improve government and refocus its efforts, and not an excuse to expand it or increase its cost beyond reason.

Compassionate? Yes. Caring? Yes. Innovative? Yes.

But there is no compassion in creating a life of dependence.

It is not caring to stifle initiative.

And there is no innovation in simply increasing government's spending appetite, adding new programs on top of old ones.

The citizens of this State want responsive, active government that continues to set and meet new goals.

But, at the same time, they want government to exercise judgment as it weighs the new programs it would impose on its agencies, to meet the goals it set already before taking on new responsibilities.

If I may leave my text for a moment at this point as I conclude, I would like to discuss the tragedy that came to this country 2 days ago in the death of Christa McAuliffe and six other very brave people who undertook a space mission on the space shuttle Challenger. I think in this case it was made perhaps more terrible by the mere fact that there was a teacher aboard and so many young people in our country were focusing on this. But this teacher, Christa McAuliffe, was living her dream, her dual dreams perhaps to teach and to go into space and I watched the television as many of us did perhaps to see if we could fathom any reason for something like this and she said something which she probably never intended to be a quote but I noted that she said it as she was being prepared to go up into space. She said, "To follow your instincts and go for your dreams." And I think that Christa McAuliffe would have approved what teachers are doing today — trying to explain to young people around this country and perhaps around the world what happened and why it happened. And it is for these reasons today that I want to propose that the Education Scholarships I have recommended be named in her honor. It is a fitting tribute to honor her memory in encouraging young people perhaps to follow in her footsteps, to follow into teaching and perhaps into space.

And I thank you very much.

#### \* \* \* \* \*

The Chair thanked the Governor and asked the previously named Committee to escort the Governor back to the Executive Offices.

At 2:28 p.m. on motion of Senator Sharp, the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House compared their respective journals, found them to agree and so notified the President pro Tem. On motion of Senator Sharp, the Joint Session then adjourned and the two Houses separated to

reconvene in their respective Chambers.

The House reconvened at 3:20 p.m.

Ennis, D.
