The Main Street and Center Annex post offices will be open Saturdays Dec. 14 and 21, from 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., on Sunday, Dec. 15, from 2 to 5 p.m., and from Monday, Dec. 16 through Friday, Dec. 20, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

## Aetna Fund Drive Tops \$24,000 Goal For City Firemen

President Olan Thomas Expresses Appreciation For Public Participation

Volunteer Nurses From Red Cross To Aid With Second In Series Of Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine; Local Clinics To Be At Aetna Firehouse No. 2, Ogletown Junior High

When the second series of Sabin oral polio vaccine clinics are held throughout the state this Sunday, 45 volunteers from the nursing section of the Delaware chapter American Red Cross will be stationed at clinic sites.

The nurses will assist with distribution of the oral vaccine, are part of a group of more than 200 Red Cross nursing volunteers who serve in programs such as this, in disasters, and in instructional activities.

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## New Radio Station WNRK For Newark Approved By FCC

Late Herman Handloff's Application Reinstated For Dover's J. G. Smith

After nearly five years of litigation, the Federal Communications Commission in Washington has granted an application to build and operate a new AM radio station in Newark.

The commission reinstated the 1961 decision which granted the application of the late Herman Handloff to build and operate Radio Station WNRK, and simultaneously approved the assignment of the permit to Radio Newark, Inc.

James G. Smith of Dover is president and owner of Radio Newark, Inc., and William S. Cook, also of Dover, is executive vice-president. Radio Station WNRK will operate on 1260 KC with a daytime power of 500 watts.

The transmitter will be located on Walther Road, some three miles southeast of Newark. WNRK is the first station assigned to Newark, Delaware's second largest city and home of the University of Delaware, and is the 11th station to be granted in the State of Delaware.

Advised of the WNRK approval, Smith said "We are extremely pleased to have this opportunity to provide the first daily mass communications medium to Newark and the surrounding area. Construction of WNRK will begin in the very near future and we expect to be serving this vital and expanding area of Delaware early in 1964."

Smith is a graduate of Johns Hopkins University and commanded an Army Infantry company in Korea in 1953. He is president of J. G. Smith Autos of Dover, and has an interest in several other automobile firms.

With the plane gone, the urge to run overcame us. Direction didn't matter. Speed alone was important, the speed that comes with the desire to escape the fear of the unknown. And so we ran for the nearest building and I found myself in a latrine, huddled between two sinks.

The initial attack passed but still we didn't know what had happened. We were forced to reluctantly face the fact that an enemy had caught us unprepared, and we headed back to the barracks to find out what to do. Surely the sergeant would know. After all, the sergeant knew everything.

But he was dead. A bomb had penetrated the room of the three-story building and crashed its way to the ground floor before exploding and catching him in bed. He wasn't horribly mutilated like you'd read in stories; he was just lying there with a deep cut across his head with his life draining out in a large, red pool. My stomach convulsed and I vomited as I tore up the stairs to my belongings.

Instinctively, I grabbed my training gas mask and ran to the hangar. Our very old B-18 Douglas bombers were a mess, victims of strafing that made them easy targets while lined up in their neat rows. I saw one and cried big, boyish tears at the sight of the burning, twisted hulk. Grabbing a fire extinguisher I ran to its defense, but how could I extinguish a roaring inferno, fed by hundreds of gallons of gasoline?

A friend grabbed my arm and advised we make ourselves scarce, and we ran again. Halfway across the field however, I looked up and saw a fighter heading straight for us. Little flames leaping from its guns as the pilot headed for an easy target, and diving for the ground again, I somehow twisted my mask beneath me.

As the plane passed over, the heavy snarl of cordite from Pearl Harbor blew along, but what was cordite? I hadn't even heard of the word but I just knew that pilot had dropped gas on us.

And I remembered. I remembered the first thing I was to do when I smelled gas, and I held my breath. With heart pounding from excessive adrenalin — with lungs already straining in protest of too much running — I locked my chest muscles and reached for my mask. I panicked as I tried to get it without raising my body, but I still held my breath. I don't believe a truck smashing over me could have forced me to release it.

Later, hiding in the trees along the edge of the field, we watched the first waves of bombers come over the field. Flying low now with our Navy's anti-aircraft shattered, they leisurely dropped their bombs in neat patterns, demolishing every hangar.

How could this thing happen? Excitedly, we talked about the previous week. For days we had had our planes scattered, fueled and armed, and we had been required to stay with them 24 hours a day. Word reached us that negotiations in Washington were going badly and war might come, and we had been ready.

But on Saturday, peace had come. Eagerly we towed the aircraft back to the flight line and hurried to disarm them. The commanding officer viewed the neat rows, gave his approval, and we piled into cars and buses and headed for the town. And then came the next day...

## Annie J. Cannon To Be Honored At Wesley College

A convocation will be held next Wednesday at Wesley College in Dover in honor of the 100th birthday of Annie Jump Cannon.

Dr. Cannon was born in Dover and was graduated in 1880 from Wesley College. After graduating from Wesley in 1884, she studied at Radcliffe, received her MA degree from Wesley, and became associated with the Harvard Observatory. In 1911, she became curator of astronomical photographs at the Observatory — a position she held until her death in 1941.

While at the Harvard Observatory, she developed a method of classifying the stars according to their spectra, a system now used internationally and known as the Harvard Classification.

At the time of her death in 1941, she had classified more than 400,000 stellar bodies.  
Dr. Cannon was honored with degrees from the University of Delaware, Wellesley, Mt. Holyoke, Oglethorpe, and in 1921 received a doctor of astronomy degree from Groningen, Holland — the highest honor ever accorded an American woman by a foreign university. In 1925 she was the first woman to receive an honorary scientific degree from Oxford and was elected an honorary member of the Royal Astronomical Society of Great Britain.
