For four months I have written  
none in my Journal which I very  
much regret as during that time  
many & varied events have transpired  
among our friends & now cannot be  
recorded as I would wish to turn as  
to former events which have been not-  
ed down in their proper

On the 2nd of last Sept. our Aunt  
Carpenter was taken sick on the 4th of  
Sept. she died on the 6th her funeral  
took place from Mr Barneys Meetinghouse

Uncle was then very nervous & contin-  
ued so sleeping nine nights & the eighth  
failing rapidly & before the close of the  
that Month was totally blind - the last  
week in Sept Oct. the middle toe of his  
left foot became sore & poultices were  
applied it continued to spread & become  
more painful till three toes were sore &  
very painful - but for that think he  
would have rested tolerably well nights  
for the past three weeks - a letter received  
last Eve from Sister S her husband di-  
rected us to buy wool for Uncle's foot & this

Then we put the entire foot in a thick  
bit of wool & he has been more comfort-  
able than for a long time

This has been a pleasant Wednesday  
& people appear disposed to improve the  
good sleeping which last Sat. night

A. O. B & Ellen have P. M. been  
to the Village & made several calls Mrs  
Slaney is sick again - overdone I presume

This Eve A. O. B & lady with Septe. B.  
Pierce & W. W. B & two sisters & Mary Allyon  
went to Seekonk to meeting - and a good  
number were out & several from our town

Today Father & Mother presented a  
large family Bible to A. O. B - & his wife  
& Septe., Sarah, & self presented W. W. B.  
with a Family Bible - one a very nice one  
has also been obtained for Mr R. Bowen  
Our Bookstore man having sold out the  
Bibles were obtained at very low prices

Wednes. Jan'y 2<sup>nd</sup> 1858

this Morn 8<sup>o</sup>

Still good Winter weather but somewhat cloudy & some think we will have snow again & others prophecy rain at hand

Uncle had an excellent night last night took peragon in the Eve & his toe did not pain him as it has done & he rested very quietly from 11<sup>th</sup> A.M. till this Morn & I was only up twice after 12<sup>th</sup> A.M. this A. M. Uncle slept sound & this P.M. he has been very calm & listened to reading but more nervous this Eve -

Beth A. M. Father went into Prov - & Mother went with him to Edmund Carpenters & visited they returned just at dark - Mother went to meeting this P.M. at Seekunk with Mrs Carpenter says a good number were out some from our town

W.W.B. & A. O. B. went to the Village this Morn but found nothing for us in the P.M. Sophie has this P.M. been sewing for E. H. P. Now 9<sup>th</sup> A.M. it has commenced storming Sarah has been busy with the laundry today

Thurs. Jan'y. 3rd. 1856  
The storm of last Eve became  
a heavy rain during the last part  
of the night & the sprouts being frozen  
up the water came in bodily to one  
of the windows in the parlor chamber  
& the window in the room below it, doing  
some injury to Books &c on the table but  
in the chamber little but to make work  
was done - in came into the upper front  
only also wetting some things there

Uncle took Peragone again last Eve  
but did not rest as well as the previous  
night - has slept some this Morn but  
when awake has been more nervous than  
yesterday - he has just had his dinner  
sent him from Cousin E. H. P. - It is roast  
goose & all the etc. it came from Addison N.Y.  
Henry sends back all his turkeys & geese -  
Uncle ate some - it was cooked very nicely

Mather as usual caring for the family &  
preparing the meals - Father, Wm & Sarah  
are busy with the lard & pork - Eliza &  
Sephie are making vests - A. O. B. has gone  
to see his patients

I took my little birds from the old ones today  
Uncle Ben seems brighter today than for  
some time

Monday  
Morning this  
Month 15<sup>th</sup>

Friday Jan'y. 4th 1856—

Before midnight the clouds had passed away & the wind was blowing quite strong from the North West but this Morn is very pleasant no wind & a bright sun & the day has been the same the sleighing continues good though it is not smooth like it was before the rain We have got the rooms & articles wet by the Wed night rain dried & in their place

Uncle slept very little last night yet his foot was not very painful & he took peragone in the Evening, but today he has appeared unusually heavy & sleepy his foot was dressed this A.M. & looks decidedly better & so we applied another bit of wool —

William was at the P.O. this Morn & obtained two Newspapers after which Mr Goff came & dressed his beef

Ellen & Sarah have gone to cheer Miss lesson this P.M. went with sleigh & red Tom Sarah drove — I don't want cheer ride Mary Allen called in this Morn to get S. to go over there & cut Mrs Lee a dress

Sat. Jan'y. 5th. 1855-

A cold cloudy Morning & a little snow flying all day but about 4 o'clock P.M. it commenced snowing fast with Mercury at 19° wind blowing quite strong & a real storm as anticipated.

Uncle slept none last night - he did not take any person one last Eve - today he has slept a good deal & his foot has not pained him but little comparatively I much regret his sleeping more nights & so much days it makes night a weariness

Soon after breakfast Mrs. Morrison Williams oxen & team started for Providence Eben Lane had them to take in a load of sheep & William with Father on the sleigh & dolly soon started to carry in the beef & bread com-  
-post which Eben Lane will drive out -

A. B. O. B. soon was off to visit his patients & then to Seekonk to get his sleigh fixed - but soon after the snow set in all got home animals as well as men & there we all are comfortable & happy sheltered from the storm but my thoughts turn to shivering poor old fit

This A. M. Sophie sat with Uncle while I assisted Sarah to fill the sausages & this P.M. Sarah has baked & I have put Uncle's room in order No letters from either P.O. today

Sabbath Jan'y 5th. 1858.

The past night has been unusual stormy - snow with a high wind & it continued unabated till about noon today when the clouds dispersed & the eve is very pleasant & calm but cold - the snow is badly drifted so none of the cattle could be let out only by much shoveling & so it was put off till tomorrow still the men have been obliged to be out much in taking care of the animals - one of the hogs had to be gotten out of her pen she was almost perished the snow filled her pen

Uncle has passed another sleepless night but has been sleeping today & first as others feel like sleeping Uncle feels like talking - I feel very sorry for him so turned about his foot has been some painful today -

There has been no meetings today I suppose some either at our Church or at Seekonk A. O. B. has visited none of his patients today

Mercury

Monday Jany 7th. 1856-

A clear cold Morning but no wind & the day has been pleasant & the P.M. is really quite soft the Sun shines so brightly

Uncle still sleeps none nights but has had a good sleep during the day & but little pain in his foot Sister Sephe has sat with him today —

Brothers Wm & A. O. B with John & the oxen were off tettimes this Morn to break brush but found the snow so much drifled they only got through with the oxen without anything attached to them & had to shord to do that they went through to the village so A. O. B visited his sick & also got the mail - several newspapers & one letter for Sister E from Esther Ellis

Phelad. Jany -  
the letter being Sisters we know not its contents this P.M. Wm has broken to the Seekenkleine the milk man has been through today so far as to get milk from Mr Harters & here preparatory to going to the City tomorrow Morn

A. O. B found his patients much as when he last saw them —

Mather has prepared the meals for the family today & I have assisted Sarah some about the washing & this Eve all look tired Sister L. has a pain in her side this Eve —

Tuesday Jan'y. 8th 1855

Mercury this Morn  
at 8 A.M. 26° above 0

We had another snow storm last night an inch of snow fell perfectly level so no injury was done to the track made yesterday - the day has been very pleasant clear & mild but this Eve it grows cold & a strong wind & now 10 A.M. P.M. it is again cloudy

Uncle slept none last night till after 3 A.M. but has slept considerably this forenoon about 11 A.M. I got the wool carded & dressed his foot it looks decidedly better but still has spells of being very painful

William has again been out breaking track all day had quite a team of cattle & men this A.M. but this P.M. has been making track so Mrs Henry Allyn could get out she could in no way get any where but to her barn, - only six men & two yokes of oxen & those were all he could get out this P.M.

Father has been to mill this P.M. with a sleigh & red team but says traveling is very bad A.O.B. has been to see all his patient but mother found them much as yesterday

Gilbert called to see Uncle this P.M. & when he left Uncle gave him Aunt Carpenter's carpet bag as present for Sarah Frances his daughter aged seven years & Mother gave him the book & pictures sent by her from Cousin Anna Weston to Sarah Frances who has gone this far to Mrs Allyn's to get his

Wednesday Jan'y 9th 1856-

Another dear day & extremely cold but no wind blowing so it is less severe than last night when it either snowed or the wind blew the old snow about very much & in some places drifted

Uncle slept no more last night than the previous one & has appeared to sleep less today but now P.M. he is dozing

William was out again this Morn breaking brack & I hope he will not be obliged to go out again for he feels pretty well wearied out & his over the sum if I may judge for them

Father has been at home very busy today & takes P.M. with Williams & A. C. Os as assistance has cut up the beef & put down the hams for which I have made him to put them in ~~the~~

Mather has as usual prepared the meals today while Ellen & scrub have dinner No one has been to the Village today so no letters from the Office - I have finished reading the St. Joseph's Oracle to Uncle this P.M.

As he went to Carson E. H. Pierces yesterday & has not yet come home Anna came over today after my Opera House pattern Although the track is very poor yet several persons have tried the sleighing today

Thursday Jan'y 10th 1856-

Mercury the  
Moon 11.0 below 0

The past night has been extremely cold the Mercury at 9<sup>o</sup>. last Eve being 19° below 0 but now before Moon to 11° the same as yesterday Moon but the day has been clear but very cold tho. but little wind blowing - this Eve it is warmer - Mercury now 9.6. P. M. 8° above 0

A Uncle slept very little last night but has been sleeping a great deal today & heard no reading till Evening - his foot has been quite painful at times so Uncle thinks

It has been too cold for sleighing today & not a sleigh has passed I think excepting Brother Wm who went to the Village this Morn & after he came home took Sister L over to Mrs. Tilley's - this Eve he he went over & walked home with her -

Gather has been busy about home today & finds he froze one ear yesterday Morn going over to Mr. Hants for his oven

This was the day for our people to take their music lesson but it is so cold they will not go till tomorrow.

William obtained from the P. Office to day three ledgers & one Intelligencer -

Friday Jan'y. 11th. 1856-

A fine Winter day clear but for  
the weather of yesterday we would call  
it cold but it seems quite mild -

Mrs. C. this  
Mon<sup>th</sup> alone Uncle was less nervous last Eve than  
the previous Eve but slept very little  
towards Morning & today has slept less  
than yesterday - I increased his foot today &  
as far as I am judge it continues to improve

Father went this Morn to Providence as we  
began to get short of some of our necessaries  
S<sup>e</sup> she has gone again to Mr. Pierces - she carried  
over two of my birds to teach Agnes to sing

A. O. B. went up with Ellen & Sarah to drive  
for them as they have gone for their Music lesson  
Mary & John are getting in a slack of hay

Father is preparing the meals &c &c -

A. O. B. with the young ladies returned  
from their music lesson soon after 5d.  
they report she sleighing not very good up  
the North road - They met Am. E. Thorey  
at Mr. Bowmes

Father returned from the City before dark  
he fell on the ice when in the City we can  
not be sufficiently thankful he was not  
much hurt - he did not see Sister E.  
neither did he get any thing from the P.O.

Monday the  
12th

Saturday Jan'y 12th 1856-

We have had another cold night & the Moon was rising every bough & branch was covered with fine spikes of frost which looked beautifully - the sun rose clear but soon passed into a haze & the P.M. the clouds have gathered quite thick & a snow storm is anticipated at hand.

Uncle passed another sleepless night last night but has slept nearly all the day & fear he will consequently get no rest the coming night his foot has pained him severely but little since he had it dressed yesterday.

A. C. B. & Ellen have been to the Post Office today but obtained only newspaper - five of them -

Father has been busy at various jobs & William has been to the woods & hauled home a sled load of wood. John has not been here today - has worked at home -

Mother has prepared the meals & I & So has assisted Sarah to bake meat pies &c. & I have done my usual Saturday work -

This P.M. A.O.B. has been to see Aunt Blanding who had an ill turn last Tues. & has been very feeble since though A.O.B. was not called in till this afternoon -

There was a light fall of snow last night & there has been several falls of snow today but not an inch in all. It still continues cloudy though some indications of clearing <sup>as</sup> it draws towards sunset.

Uncle had no sleep again last night but today has slept fairly his foot pained him but very little last night & I think not today. B - last night about midnight quite freely & without medicine. Sister S - has sat with him today while I have assisted Sarah some about washing.

Mother as usual has prepared the meals. Father has been very busy putting things in order on doors & out.

William went this Morn to Mr Fosters & had his sled shod and A. O. B - visited his patients this Morn found them much as yesterday - this P.M. he is making some Book boxes for Sister E. B. Plimpton.

Gilbert was here this P.M. & Uncle presented him with large family Bible - it was intended for Ned years but could not be obtained till last week - it was nice & very handsome & cost \$3.00

Father went to Providence today with chuckens & cabbage for Market & by him I sent my letter to the Office for his S. C. Army

This Eve all our young people have gone to spend the Eve at Mr Ruben Bowens - they did not get home till 11 o'clock - say they had a good time though Mr A. was absent gone to Brighton

Suzie Pearce was in she's P. M. she appears quite like herself now - they call her better

Father brought from the Post Office a letter for Uncle from Mr

Thursday Jan 17th 1858

Much warmer & a gentle snow storm till nearly noon but came so light it was of very little account in making sleighing - this P.M. it is clear & pleasant Uncle slept none again last night & not as soundly today as yesterday but got some good sleep both in the Morning & afternoon

Uncle Ben Smith (so called) died just before noon yesterday it is nearly six weeks since he fell & broke his hip & has gradually failed since - he lived longer than it seemed possible for one in his feeble state when hurt

Gather was up to Mr. Taskes a large part of this P.M. & again this Eve - the funeral takes place next Monday - Mr. Taskes family have had a serious time taking care of their aged relative

This P.M. A. O. B. has been into Seekonk making medical & business calls

W. W. B. went & hauled home wood this A.M. & this P.M. took sisters Ellen & Sarah to their Music lesson as it was very pleasant to sleigh ride Maria Plimpton went with them for the ride

Monday Jan'y. 18th 1856.  
Morning this  
From 250

The Moon was clear & very rising & the day has been unusually pleasant for a winters day with good sleighing

Uncle slept none last night but today has had a long quiet & sound sleep but about my bed time (10. A.M.) Uncle seemed quite nervous - thinking of Mr. Murray's family

Father went to Providence today - carried three barrels of apples & brought home grain owing to the drifts the sleighing is very bad in some places & ~~the~~ Father broke his sleigh quite badly with such a heavy load or buckey one

A. O. B. carried Mother & Ellen the P. K. to call on Aunt Blanding & Mrs Threlkeld now the former is very feeble the latter quite smart & making mugs as busy as ever

This Eve A. O. B. & Ellen went to meeting at the Village they brought several newspapers from the P. K. & a letter for me from

Mrs A. O. Murray Hobie

W. W. D. has been hauling home wood today & this Eve he has gone to Seekirk to meeting carried Sarah, Sephe, & Maria Plemlton - Lizzie went with A. O. B. & Ellen this Eve to meeting

Monday the  
20<sup>th</sup>

Saturday Jan'y. 19th 1858-

Another lovely Morn but colder than  
yesterday still it has been thawing a  
considerable till 8 A.M. after which the  
clouds gathered & it looks like it might  
Morn soon & the wind is North East

After another sleepless night Uncle did  
not get to sleeping this Morn till nearly 9 A.M.  
since which time he has slept soundly most  
of the time & has taken no dinner but corn  
Starch puddling with milk & sugar I made  
some of the pudding for Aunt Blanding & sent  
by A.O.B. this Morn when he visited her she  
much the same as yesterday - was restless the  
last part of the night

W.W.B. & John have been to Thorney gutter  
today & hauled home fire wood

This A.M. Mr Peabody came out & brought  
Laura Henslow & carried home her  
I have dressed Uncle's foot again today & A.O.B.  
says it is doing nicely this is the sixth week dressing

A.O.B. went to the Village this P.M. to visit  
his patients & carried Laura P. & Sister L.  
to Mr Grosvenor's where they made a call -  
Mother has been at home all day & busy as  
usual - Mother as usual has cared for the  
meals & Sarah has baked - I helped assisting  
her some in the Morn

Another cold cloudy Morning &

At 7<sup>th</sup> A.M. the Morn William started  
for Providence with Laura Plempton so  
she would not be late to her School - he  
returned at 10<sup>th</sup> A.M. - brought out Dr. Plem-  
pton & Sister E - to take their turn visiting  
At 11 A.M. the funeral of Mr Benjamin Smith  
took place all our people attended but  
Mother Rollin & self. it was six weeks yester-  
day since he fell & broke his hip.

This P.M. W. H. D has been hauling home  
wood & feels too weary to go to meeting this Eve  
& as A. O. B. has gone to visit a patient this  
Eve none of our family attend tonight

Owing to the funeral we have not wash-  
ed today as is usual on Mondays

Tuesday Jan'y. 22nd 1858-

The weather continues clear & cold but as there has been no wind for a few days it looks very pleasant

Uncle slept none last night but had a sound sleep all through the day Old Mrs. Hooton died last night about midnight & they came for Brother A. O. B. to assist in laying her out as those there could not straighten her limbs - she had been cur ed up for a long time - she died suddenly & it made Uncle feel quite nervous.

This Morn. Father with Dea. Plimpton & Sister E - went to see Aunt Carpenter & found her more comfortable than they expected - they stopped but a short time soon after dinner A. O. B. & lady started for Lonsdale & Pawtucket - Mr. Camsfield A. O. B. thinks has a consumption & he will not go again they spent the Eve at Dr. Benoni's & arrived at home at M'd.

William has hauled home wood today & this Eve with Dea. Plimpton & Sisters E. & L. have attended meeting in the School house by Capt. Joseph Bless & very good meeting & quite fully attended

Sarah washed today & left she prepared dinner

Wednesday Jan'y 23rd 1858

Still clear & cold - the past was a  
beautiful moonlight night & morn  
appeared to improve the sleighing last  
Evening I think they went to Seekunk  
to meeting

Auncle had no sleep again last night but  
has been sleeping soundly today - dressed his  
leg again today it continues to improve in  
looks <sup>B</sup> again early this Morn without medicine  
E. H. Pierce called this Morn just in time  
to see me dress Uncle's foot

A. O. B. went to the City this Morn & Mr  
Plimpton went home with him -

W. W. B. & John dressed two nice pigs this  
Morn for sale & this P. M. has been hauling  
home wood -

A horse run just here this P. M. having  
cleared the sleigh somewhere on the river  
meadows & was stopped on Mr Haents hill &  
taken back but has since passed in a sleigh

This Eve W. W. B. E. P. P. L. H. B. S. M. B. &  
H. B. A. - went in one sleigh to Seekunk to meet  
me & A. O. B. & E. A. B. & L. B. P. went in another  
they say the house was so full all could not get  
seats - however the meetings close - just as they  
went on to the Common Wm. Long was turned  
over but no one seriously hurt - Sister E. the  
most so as she was under the others the sleigh  
was some injured - John Ramsey called the Eve  
& Ann & Mary Barn the afternoon

Monday June  
Morning after  
Thomas' birthday

Thursday June 24th 1856

Another clear cold Morning & quite  
rainy but looked pleasant & the day  
had been softer than yesterday -

Uncle took peragon last night yet  
slept none at all & did not get to sleep  
till 10d. this A.M. & was awake till P.M. while  
but this Evening has been sleeping soundly

This has been the day for old Mrs. Horton's  
funeral which took place at 11d. A.M.

Father, William, & Jacob have been today  
at Mr. Horton's assisted them all that was needed

This P.M. W.W.B. has taken home the  
sleigh he borrowed last Evening & brought  
his own home it having been repaired

A.O.B. was called early to Mr. E. Bowens  
this Morn Mrs. Bowen appears more unwell  
he then went to Mr. Richards where he had  
been invited to attend a Post Mortem exam-  
ination - Mr. Richards died night before last


