

Premiere hiking and biking trail a decade in the making

Local and state dignitaries saluted the newly completed Pomeroy and Newark Rail Trail Monday as a premiere hiking and biking destination that will set a recreational standard throughout the region.

Gov. Jack Markell, U.S. Sen. Tom Carper, Newark Mayor Vance A Funk III, dozens of bicycling enthusiasts and even children from a nearby daycare center came out to celebrate the grand opening of the 2-mile walking and biking trail, which extends along the old Pomeroy and Newark Rail Line and

north into White Clay Creek State Park. Clear-blue skies and a pleasant breeze made the event – held on the south end of the new trail – all the more uplifting.

The \$4.7 million Pomeroy and Newark Rail Trail, 80 percent of which was funded through the Federal Highway Administration, has been 10 years in the making, said Newark Parks and Recreation Director Charles Emerson. It has involved acquiring land rights, and clearing and paving the tracks to the former rail line, which

was abandoned in the 1920s, he said.



Clerk shot dead during Newark 7-11 robbery

A 48-year-old male clerk at the Four Seasons 7-11 convenience store in Newark was shot dead early Wednesday after two masked men robbed the store, police said

Police have identified the victim as Mohammed Rafique Ullah of Newark.

Crime-scene tape around the parking lot of the store, at 100 Four Seasons Parkway just off Route 896, and brown paper covered the store windows Wednesday morning to shield the inside from onlookers. The store is closed for business while Delaware State Police detectives continue their homicide investigation.

has determined that two black male suspects entered the store around 12:40 a.m. Wednesday morning wearing dark clothing, and masks covering their faces. At least one suspect was armed with a handgun, police said.

The suspects confronted Ullah and demanded money, police said. Ullah complied and turned over an undisclosed amount of cash

As both suspects were fleeing the store, the suspect armed with the handgun turned and fired at least one round, striking Ullah in the upper body, police said. Both suspects fled on foot in an unknown direction.

Ullah was pronounced dead at the scene, and his body was turned over to the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner to determine cause and manner of death.

As word of the shooting spread Wednesday morning, regular customers began stopping by the store to leave flowers and share memories with each other.

nearby Brader School, pulled into the parking lot and told reporters that she stops at the 7-11 every morning for a Mountain Dew, and was saddened to hear the news that a clerk had been killed. She spoke highly of all the store's clerks,

and the owner. "Every morning I come here, and they are the nicest people ever," Bowlby said. "They know all their customers by names. They've known my children since they've grown up, and they take time out to ask about their softball games."

Anytime anyone is short a few cents for an item, the owners wave the person on and say, "Just bring the money tomorrow," she

said "I just want to make sure everyone knows how good these 7-11 employees and owners are. They've gone out of their way to

help people.' Ashli Wright described Ullah as a friendly man who always looked out for his regulars.

"He was a good guy," said

neighborhood as Ullah, just a short distance from the store. "I've known him for years. Every time I see him, he'd say, 'Hey, what's going on?"

Wright said the man was a hard worker who always took the night shift.

"He'd sleep all day and work all night," she said. "All he does is work.'

Other customers said that because the store had been robbed before, the clerk often locked the door at night but would open it for customers he knew.

The investigation continues. Delaware State Police homicide detectives are conducting inter-

views, reviewing video surveillance, and collecting evidence at the crime scene in an attempt to identify the suspects.

Police make several arrests

Newark Police have arrested seven people for public urination since Aug. 31, said Master Cpl. Gerald Bryda, who reminded citizens that the illegal act puts a damper on city residents' quality of life while running the risk of being perceived as indecent exposure.

In the first case, on Friday, Aug. 31 around 10:37 p.m., a Newark Police officer observed a 19-year-old male University of Delaware student urinating erty on South Christiana Drive, Bryda said.

When the officer attempted to make contact, the suspect ran away. Once the offi-cer apprehended the suspect, he determined that the suspect was under age 21 and had consumed alcohol, Bryda said.

The suspect was charged with disorderly conduct, resisting arrest, offensive touching (for a confrontation with the police officer) and underage drinking. Another incident happened

Police then learned that that suspect had consumed alcohol prior to his 21st birthday. He was charged with disorderly conduct

and underage consumption. On Friday, Sept. 7, officers on patrol observed two 19-year-old female University of Delaware students squatting against a pillar and urinating under the South College Avenue Bridge around 11:30 p.m., Bryda said.

When the officers approached them, the women tried to flee, but were quickly apprehended and arrested for disorderly conduct and underage consumption, Bryda said.

At 11:47 p.m. the same night, police observed an 18-year-old Bryda said.

The suspect was 5 feet from the sidewalk and made no attempt to hide what he was doing, he added.

The next night, around 1:48 a.m., police observed a 21-yearold male urinating on the side of New London Road near the Deer Park and arrested him for disorderly conduct, Bryda said.

In all of these cases, the suspects were urinating in plain view of officers and other bystanders, he said.

"It's one of those quality-oflife issues we see in the city, and we'd just like to say (to the urinators), the city is not your bathroom," Bryda said. "(Public

Police: Couple busted with 245 bags of heroin packaged for sale

New Castle County Detectives arrested a Newark husband and wife last week after undercover officers learned that the couple were selling illegal drugs out of their home in Scottfield, police said.



Both subjects have been charged with felony drug and weapon offenses, and endangering the welfare of three children that live at the residence

According to New Castle County Police, Following a month-long investigation, the New Castle County Drug Control Squad obtained and executed a search warrant, with assistance from the Safe Streets Task Force, at a home in the 100 block of Scottfield Drive last Thursday after receiving information that a couple, later identified as Shawn Earl and Theresa Earl, were selling heroin out of the residence.

At that time, detectives made contact with both subjects as well as three children. ages 3, 4 and 14, that were living in the home.

While executing the search warrant, detectives found 18 bundles totaling 6.12 grams of heroin in their bedroom closet. The heroin was packaged for sale in 245 bags, and a 12-gauge shotgun with ammunition and a small amount of marijuana was discovered on a table in the bedroom.

Both suspects were charged with possession with intent to deliver heroin, possession of a deadly weapon during the commission of a felony, possession of marijuana, conspir-

Police: Man exposes himself to woman after asking for directions

A man driving a white minivan stopped a 20-yearold female pedestrian near the corner of Haines Street and Delaware Avenue around 7:11 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 8, and asked her for directions to the Home Depot store, said Newark Police spokesman Master Cpl. Gerald Bryda.

During the course of the conversation, the woman realized the man was exposed from the waist down and was manipulating his genitals, Bryda said.

The suspect is described as a white male, between 45 and 55 years old, with brown hair. He was possibly driving a white Dodge Minivan with Maryland license plates.

The crime is classified as an indecent exposure in the second degree. Detectives are still investigating the incident. There are no suspects at this time

Bryda said police do not believe the man is the same person who has reportedly exposed himself to females around campus several times since 2011.
