## No More Waldens Here, Says Faculty Senate

The Faculty Senate unanimously passed a resolution against allowing other degree-granting institutions to operate on the university's campus at its meeting Monday.

"The resolution measures faculty feeling but does not have enforcing power," said Suzanne Steinmetz, adjunct academic affairs committee chairwoman.

"Presently there is no mechanism to evaluate institutions which are approved to function on campus. A (state) group is needed in Dover to evaluate the institutions; it has to go a few steps farther to see how it will be carried out," she said.

Existing contracts such as Walden University's for this summer, however, will not be affected by the decision, said ex-chairman of the Senate Executive Committee Ralph Kleinman.

Director of Continuing Education John Murray, who is responsible for screening of institutions that use campus facilities said, "I think it is a reasonable decision to make. The resolution provides guidelines which remove much of the ambiguity we were faced with. Without the resolution we were taking shots in the dark."

"We're interested in quality, and anything to assure us of that is beneficial," he said.

Steinmetz said there were five visiting institutions throughout the state last year, including Walden University.

"What makes the Walden situation unique is that it is not a full time institution; it operates in a very different mode," said Murray.

He also said that "the lack of accreditation added a degree of ques-

tion to the Walden situation."

The main concern, according to Murray, "is whether or not the institution's program is similar to Delaware's. We definitely would not consider one that is, that would be competitive. This consideration rules out many institutions since Delaware's curriculum is so comprehensive," he said.

"We have to try very hard to get direct first hand appraisals of the institutions concerned," he said.

"In the sense of the Senate, it is now on the record as to how they will handle this type of situation in the future. It does not refer to current commitments, Kleinman said.

The Senate's accepted resolution was determined by three primary factors:

- The university's reputation is crucial in "attracting and retaining high calibre students and faculty."

- The institution will be linked with, and judged by its association with the University of Delaware name.

- The University of Delaware is obligated to former students to maintain or enhance the quality of integrity and reputation of University of Delaware degrees.

The resolution allows for exceptions in cases when the courses offered are acceptable for credit toward University of Delaware degree requirements, he said.

Kleinman said that if a university student took a course under a visiting institution, each department would have the option to approve or disapprove acceptance of courses as they now evaluate transfer credit.

A proposed but unapproved amendment required that the visiting institution's complete degree re-

## Administration Cuts Faculty Offer by 1/4 %

University administration offered faculty a new contract calling for a 1.75 percent across the board salary increase, a three percent merit increase, and a \$500 bonus for each professor according to Dr. Margaret Waid, chief negotiator for the American Association of University Professors (AAUP).

A 1.5 percent salary increase and a \$600 bonus is proposed for the contract's second year.

The previous offer allowed for a two percent salary increase and a four percent merit increase.

"I can't wait to see the next offer," Waid said. "Each one they (the administration)

make takes a step backward."

The Offer would take effect July 1 if approved by a faculty vote May 17 and 18. However the steering committee of the AAUP is advising faculty members to reject the proposal, said Waid.

C. Harold Brown, vice president for Personnel and Employee Relations, and chief negotiator for the administration, said that offers made by the administration allow for a full seven percent increase, the maximum allowed by President Jimmy Carter's guidelines to the Council on Wages and Prices.

"We take seven percent of the sum total of the salaries of all 765 faculty members," Brown said. The pool of

money thus obtained is then doled out to the faculty in the three packets stipulated by the contract. Brown sees the combination of the 1.75 percent salary increase, the three percent merit increase and the \$500 bonus equalling a seven percent net gain for each professor.

"This method tends to show a slight bias toward less than average salaries," Brown said.

AAUP officials have argued that each instructor is eligible for a full cost of living allowance of six percent. A one percent merit increase would then bring the total raise to seven percent.

Faculty and administration also differ in interpreting the \$500 bonus.

"The terms of the contract proposal do not guarantee that this (\$500) is to be added to base salary," Waid said. "It may be no more than a sort of Christmas bonus."

The money cannot be included in percentage salary increases or percentage merit increases if it is not added to base salary, she said.

Brown said that the money is to be added to base salary.

The administration has called this proposal its "best and final offer," according to Waid. It had called its previous offer, issued May 3, its "final" offer.

The faculty vote Thursday and Friday will be the first taken in the two months of negotiations.

# Security Suggests University Take-Over of Shuttle Buses

Security officials have suggested that the university take over operation of the shuttle bus system currently contracted by Stiltz, Inc., of Newark.

A university-operated shuttle bus system would provide better service through more direct control, according to Security Lieutenant Douglas Tuttle. "It would be less expensive than Stiltz," he said, "but not by any great significant amount." Stiltz service this year cost \$130,000, at \$10 an hour for each bus and driver.

The plan, outlined in a proposal now on the desk of University President E. A. Trabant, calls for the university this summer to buy one new bus for \$21,000 and six ten-year-old buses for \$2,000 each. One new bus would then be bought each year until, after six years, the fleet would be replaced.

Stiltz, according to Vice-president George Arthur, is getting rid of its 1969 models — the very models that the university will buy — because local school districts only allow buses to be used for ten years. "We've never had anything that old," Arthur said.

Of the six buses Stiltz plans to use next year at the university, the oldest two are two-

years-old, and two others will be new, Arthur said.

In the plan, two-way radios would be installed in the buses so Security could immediately learn of problems, Tuttle said. Such a system cannot be installed in the Stiltz buses because "We are never sure of which buses they'll be using," he said.

New buses bought by the university might have two doors and modified seating that would allow simultaneous entering and exiting. Handicapped seating would also be provided, Tuttle said. In addition, some smaller, and hence more economical, buses might be purchased. None of this is available through Stiltz, he said. However, most of the university's new buses would be the same as the ones now used.

"Stiltz has supervision problems at night," said Tuttle. "Complaints have dropped since we took over the late night route with the blue bus," Security has no record of the number of complaints. Aside from "headaches in running the service," he said fuel would be the only problem.

The university would also completely take over the maintenance of the buses, said Tuttle, using the facilities now used for all

university vehicles. University students probably would be hired as drivers, he said.

Arthur said Stiltz uses 12 drivers daily and has 10 buses available to cover breakdowns.

He suggested that unionized university drivers would be paid more than non-unionized Stiltz drivers.

Also, Stiltz has lost several thousand dollars in the last three months due to higher fuel costs, Arthur said.

Stiltz has been the only bidder for the contract for the last several years.

## Abzug to Speak

Ex-Congresswoman Bella Abzug is scheduled to speak to graduating students and their guests at Commencement on June 2.

Carter fired Abzug in January from her position as co-chairwoman of the National Advisory Committee on Women (NACW). She and Carmen Votaw were appointed in 1978.

"Constructive attention to the needs of women — who are half of our population and the poorest of the poor — is not among the first ranking priorities of our government," according to NACW committee findings.

Abzug served for six years as New York City's delegate to Congress as she campaigned for women's rights.

## Community Opposes Bookstore

Plans for the new university bookstore, announced Wednesday evening, met with strong opposition from Newark community members.

The proposed \$1.1 million building would be located at the south-east corner of Amstel and Orchard Roads across the street from Purnell Hall.

City councilman Ted Nutter and Planning Director Roy Lobata said increased traffic and lack of parking facilities around the proposed bookstore would cause problems.

Increased traffic would destroy the residential quality of the area, said one resident attending the meeting. Need for more street parking would compound the current shortage of available parking, said Lobata.

Dr. John Worthen, vice president of student affairs and advisement, said the Amstel Road site is the best location of all sites considered. Located across from the Purnell-Smith-Kirkbride building complex, the bookstore would be in the heart of the academic sector of the university, he said.

The two-story building would provide twice as much space as the current 9000 square foot bookstore in the Student Center, said Worthen. A visitor information

center would also be included in the building.

John Crowe, a resident near the proposed site, said it would be "a cultural crime" if the Bookstore is built behind the Blue and Gold Club. He is afraid that the store would detract from the Wright estate which the Club and surrounding land is part of. The Bookstore would "break up a beautiful layout and replace it with hodgepodge," said Crowe.

Proponents of the Amstel Road site said that other locations were ruled out due to even worse traffic and parking problems. Delaware Avenue behind Kirkbride Lecture Building was one proposed location for the store. An addition to the current bookstore would cause structural problems with utility lines. The suggestion to build an addition into Harrington

Beach at the rear of the Student Center was rejected because East Campus students need a place for recreation.

Keener business competition is anticipated between the bookstore and Newark merchants by the store moving out of the Student Center. William Gardner of Newark Stationary pointed out that the bookstore could draw more commercial business away from non-university merchants. Tax bases favor the Bookstore compared to private business. The Bookstore would be in direct and unfair competition with area businesses, said Gardner.

Problems and ideas about the new bookstore expressed at the meeting will be discussed at the next meeting of the President's Advisory Commission on Planning and Construction.

## Senate Asks End of Sanctions

President Jimmy Carter was asked by the Senate early this week to end sanctions against Rhodesia when its new black majority rule takes power June 1, the New York Times reported.

The request came in the form of a nonbinding resolution that passed the Senate by a 75-19 margin, reports said.

The resolution places the Senate on record against Carter's nonrecognition of last month's Rhodesian elections which will result in the inauguration of that nation's first black Prime Minister, Abel T. Muzorewa, reports said.

## Damaged Fuel Rods Discovered

Tiny cracks were found Sunday in parts of the fuel rod assemblies of the Salem One Nuclear Plant in southern New Jersey, according to the New York Times.

The plant has been closed for refueling since April 3. Since the discovery of cracks in the metal plates holding the nuclear fuel rods in place, all 193 rod assemblies are now being removed and inspected.

Damage has been found in 20 of the 116 inspected, reports said.

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) has stated that no damage has been done to the fuel rods, and there has been no radiation leakage. No explanation was given as to why the damage occurred, but the NRC revealed the same damage has occurred in other nuclear plants, according to reports.

## Cicada Due For May Arrival

The cicada, a locust-like bug, will be appearing for the first time in 17 years in late May or June.

Cicadas are a flying insect that do not sting, but the noise made by the males doing their mating call can become intolerable.

The insects have been living underground in an immature state for 17 years. They will surface long enough to mate, causing some frustration to humans by flying into their car windshields, and, after about seven weeks die.

The life cycle of the cicada is the longest known to man for an insect. The insects are about one and a half inches long.

## Death List Formed By Cult

The Peoples Temple is believed to have formed a death squad to eliminate 40 of the nation's political leaders, congressional investigators announced, said the News Journal.

Investigators believe the cultists have a "death list" designating national leaders for assassination in an effort to carry out the last wishes of the Rev. Jim Jones.

Jones reportedly had met with key aides and designated individuals to be eliminated. Members of the Peoples Temple drew up the hit list immediately after the mass suicide-murder rite in Guyana, according to reports. Congressional investigators feel that the impact of the threat will fade with the passage of time.

## Auto Makers Report Losses

Despite an increase in small car sales, the nation's auto manufacturers reported a 11.5 percent drop in auto sales for the beginning of May, reported the United Press International.

Economic analysts attributed the decline to consumer concern over the potential gas shortage and the limited

supply of small cars to compensate for falling big car sales, reports said.

While industrial executives expected the drop in sales, analysts expressed concern over the threat of a possible decline in national economic growth.

## Carter Woos Businessman

President Jimmy Carter, in a speech to business leaders on Tuesday, tried to justify his position on energy measures. The energy measures included removing price controls and cutting a proposed profit tax.

The President also reprimanded the House of Representatives for not giving him "adequate support" on his energy legislation.

Before the President's speech, Secretary of the Treasury W. Michael Blumenthal reminded the audience the President said two years ago he thought more than 50 percent of the American people thought there was no energy problem.

President Jimmy Carter lamented the fact Americans use twice as much energy as Germans without heed of conserving fuel.

## Fall Power Increase Proposed for WXDR

Dean of Students Raymond Eddy and Assistant Dean of students John Worthen will meet with WXDR staff May 24 to discuss the need for the station to increase its wattage above the present level, said Linda Berryhill, station manager.

The station is presenting three wattage increases to the administration. Presently the station operates at 10 watts, which has a clear signal of less than three miles, which barely covers Newark, said Berryhill.

An increase to 100 watts, which would cost \$7300, will increase the station's clear signal to five miles. This area represents most of southern New Castle County and could reach 700,000 listeners, she added.

At 500 watts the cost is the same, but the clear signal radius increases to 10 miles, which would cover most of northern Delaware and increase potential listeners to 900,000, said Berryhill.

The third proposal, an increase to 1,000 watts, would increase WXDR's clear signal radius 15 miles at a cost of \$9800, effectively covering all of Wilmington and reaching parts of southern New Jersey and Pennsylvania, Berryhill said. WXDR would be able to reach over one million listeners, she said.

Currently, WXDR's budget is \$8100 a year. If a wattage increase is approved there would be no problem getting money for necessary equipment, Berryhill said. The money would go to buy new transmitters, monitors and control systems. Besides

money allotted from student government, the station could ask corporations, The Delaware Arts Association and The Alumni Association for financial assistance, said Berryhill.

The purpose of the meeting is for WXDR to show that its desire to increase power is needed if WXDR is to serve the university, and Newark community, Berryhill said.

"At this point we are looking for a solid comprehensive argument or proposal," Eddy said. "We have to justify the cost. However, money is not the main consideration. Only if the station demonstrates value to the community and an interested student body is the proposal worthy at all," he said.

WXDR is also working on a market survey to determine the stations support, Eddy said. This should help show students interest toward the station, he added.

"We must convince them (administration) it is worth while, because the community can't be served with 10 watts," said Berryhill. If WXDR remains at the 10 watt status other stations will increase their power and we will eventually be pushed off the FM spectrum," she said.

Increased wattage would not effect programming, Berryhill said. We have a wide variety of shows that meet most students tastes. Since our audience will be larger we will have even more diversified shows, she said.

If Eddy recommends the station's proposal, it could be presented to the Subcommittee on Student Affairs and the Board of Trustees this fall, he said.



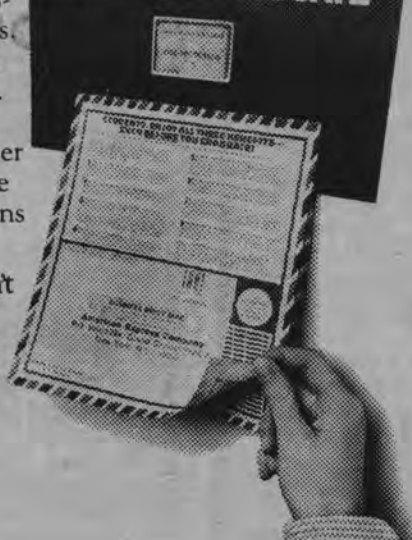

# Radar 'EASES' Speeding Blues

You're cruising down Interstate 95 when you spot a car parked along the shoulder of the road. Probably changing a flat tire right? Wrong!

Delaware State Police have purchased ten used cars, vans and trucks to implement "Operation Ease," a program to get Delaware motorists to comply with the national speed limit of 55 miles per hour, according to Colonel Norman Cochran, superintendent of state police.

The program started Monday.

"Operation Ease" is funded by a \$200,000 grant from the Department of Transportation. The grant financed the purchase of the unmarked autos, and the salaries of the off-duty troopers who will enforce the program, said Cochran.

Presently, only 30 percent of Delaware motorists comply with the national speed limit, he said. If this percentage is not increased to 80 percent by 1983, Delaware could lose up to \$3 million in federal funding for highways, said Cochran.

Only the 55 mph roads will be strictly enforced with Interstate 95 receiving major surveillance, he said. All local roads, such as, Kirkwood Highway - Route 896, Elkton road, and Route 273, will be enforced by

regular procedures, Cochran said.

The faster over the 55 mph speed limit you travel the more points you will acquire against your license, he said. For certain violations your driver's license can be suspended or placed on probation, Cochran said. Twelve points against your license and it would be revoked, he said.

Violators of the limit will face fines and court fees ranging from \$19.50 for up to five miles over the limit to \$36.00 for driving fifteen miles over the limit, Cochran said.

During 1978, Delaware police arrested 16,754 motorists exceeding the 55 mph limit, he said. High speed was the primary cause of 22 of the 113 fatal accidents that occurred in Delaware in 1978, Cochran said.

There was a recent ruling by a Florida Judge that radar speed traps are inaccurate. Cochran said "this is a Florida state rule, not a federal rule, therefore it has no effect on Delaware or our enforcement program."

There is very little time difference traveling at a constant speed of 55 mph as compared to 60 or 65 mph. The difference between driving ten miles at 55 mph and at 65 mph is only two minutes, said Cochran. Speeding also wastes gasoline. Motorists can get up to 40 percent better mileage by driving at 55 mph rather than exceeding the limit, Cochran said.

## Engineer Has Longest Memory

James Alwood, (EG 80) won the first place prize of \$50 for outpointing over 200 university students participating in "The Longest Memory Contest," co-sponsored by the psychology department and the PLATO project.

The concept of the memory contest was similar to the Milton Bradley game "Simon." Students were asked to memorize a series of squares and then repeat the pattern from memory on PLATO, the university's computer.

"The purpose of the memory contest was to see if there was any relationship between a student's major and his ability to memorize," said Fred Hofstetter, director of the PLATO Project.

"It was interesting to find that the top five students were science majors, none of whom had ever played 'Simon' before," Hofstetter added.

Students were allowed to repeat the process up to 30 times per session, for as

many as four sessions, Hofstetter said.

The memory contest was put together by Dr. John McLaughlin, of the university's psychology department, Hofstetter, and Jim Wilson, manager of the PLATO Project.

Other winners of the contest were: Mike Styler (AS80) \$25, Robert Waltzer (AS80) \$10, Eric Winter \$10, Paul Marvel (AS82) \$10, Doy Helmick (BEDC) \$10, David Carter (AS80) \$10.

## Bird Is the Word

If the campus attitude last semester could be summed up as "alcohol and apathy," one could describe this semester without using the first two words.

A state senate bill that would put two students on the university Board of Trustees has received little push from the student body. Petitions have gone unsigned, a planned rally was cancelled, and legislators who asked for student input must decide whether or not to pass the bill without any.

The student government, after spending nearly a year rewriting their constitution and adopting a new system, received support from less than six per cent of their constituents in a referendum election, while elections for officers earlier this month did only slightly better.

When facts concerning CIA-sponsored mind control research conducted here were uncovered, when a surprising News-Journal article on university race relations was printed, and when protests ranging from South African divestiture to nuclear energy were staged, the amount of student interest was almost non-existent.

The alcohol that marked last Fall was still around, but not as evident. Nor will it be in September, when a ban on "out-door campus parties" will shut down several campus traditions.

In fact, the only events that aroused a large portion of the students were a Dan Fogelberg concert at the Fieldhouse, a program of pigeon poisoning, and the erection of a 13-foot Blue Hen in front of Colburn Lab.

Those last two items could probably indicate what the current state of student concern and interest is; currently, it's for the birds.

bees are the center of the universe and the earth is hollow. You would have gotten a letter from God who was just pretending to be a guy named Eugene. And you would have laughed, maybe. But we didn't want to take the chance with such cheap shots at defining how incompetent a lot of people are around this university.

You see, just because we try to provide objective news coverage, doesn't mean we cover everything. And if you think objectivity exists, you are wrong. People, even reporters, are subjective and there is no way out of it. The best newspaper in the world would probably consist of staff members, each devoting their enthusiastic energy to covering their own special interests.

**Readers Respond****Was There A Sag In the Coverage of Ag?**

When I politely protested they apologized and offered us a few lines in campus briefs to make up for the error. We decided to use it to publicize our upcoming elections for Class Representatives to the Ag CC. The elections were held for 2 days in the lobby of Ag Hall, as usual. The Review obliged by printing the Ag CC's officer elections would be held in the Blue and Gold Room of the Student Center. Some good-will gesture, eh?

After this a deluge of other costly errors by The Review fell on us. Next we were promised a feature article to make up for the now numerous mistakes. "Well," I thought, "this makes sense. We are an active College Council with lots of activities — we deserve that." — and I fell for it. We had an interview, the notes from which the reporter must have immediately filed in the circular file, because the long promised article never appeared. I decided to give The Review one last shot. We contacted The Review about Ag Day requesting an advance article which would set things straight at long last. What did I get? A run-of-the-mill, after-the-fact narrative with a pic-

**DUSC Allocation Priorities Shakey**

To the Editor,

As the members of the DUSC met on May 10 to allocate next year's budget to various student organizations, on one decision they apparently lost their rational minds and values. Although in many instances they seemed to demonstrate ideal discretion and careful judgement in weeding out allocations for unnecessary and non-representative purposes, the DUSC very disconcertingly doubled the funds allocated to the Gay Student Union, which received \$950 of our tuition money.

First of all, the DUSC grants are to represent and enhance the college experience of as many students as possible, and DUSC President Bob Lucas mentioned, "We have to consider how many students are actually getting their money's worth." As a basis of comparison, it should be pointed out that allocations to the Business and Economics College Council dropped from \$600 this past year to \$280 next year. Funds granted to the Engineering College Council took a nosedive from \$290 in 1978-79 to a merely trivial \$70 for 1979-80. In addition, after requesting \$2,277, the Minority Center Advisory Board received just \$400. Since I totally support prudent budget allocations to only merited requests, it's quite irrational to grant the Gay Student Union \$200 more than was granted the Business and Economics College Council, the Engineering College Council, and the Minority Center Advisory Board PUT

TOGETHER. That's about as reasonable as Idi Amin winning the Nobel Peace Prize. These latter three organizations represent a much larger proportion of the students at this university than the GSU does, and the potential of these three organizations to productively contribute to the entire college community is great.

Furthermore, Lucas very reasonably stated that many groups should independently subsidize their functions by raising their own money, rather than being allotted funds. That sounds ideal, but why does the GSU seem to be an exception? Productive service organizations directed toward the entire university community such as the Campus Crusade for Christ and Interservice Christian Fellowship are self supportive and don't ask for a penny out of the students' tuition money. So why is the budget board so supportive and assistive of the GSU?

Apparently the GSU has quite an influence on the budget board. If they're try-

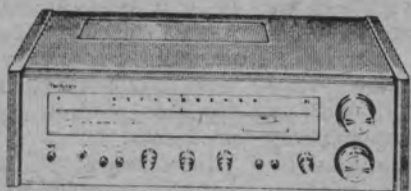

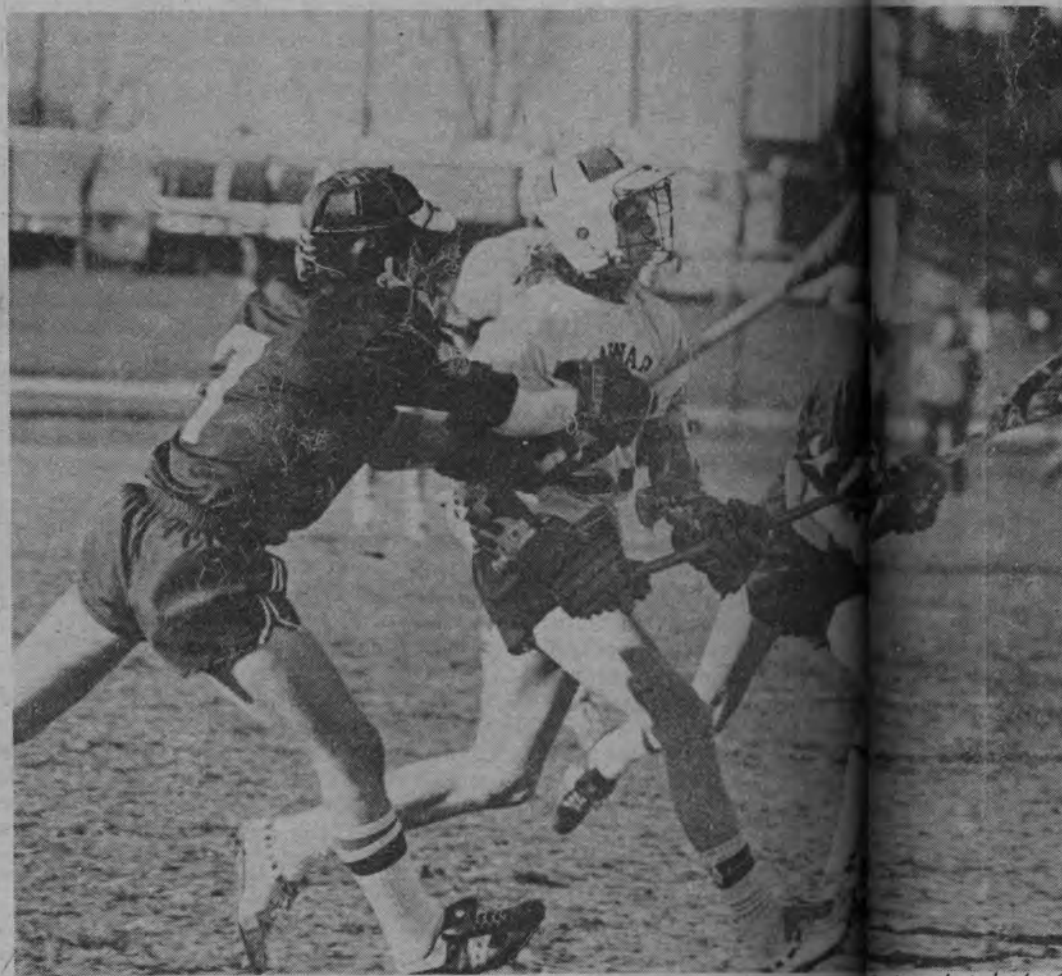

# New Castle Past Comes Alive

History will come alive tomorrow in New Castle as residents don colonial costumes and open their homes for the 55th annual "Day in Old New Castle" festivities.

New Castle, founded by the Dutch in 1651, is one of the Delaware Valley's earliest settlements and is noted for being the first state capital. Unique among historic communities, most of the old homes and public buildings are still used today. The cobble streets and village green of New Castle's commercial and riverside areas remain representative of the way American cities looked in the 18th century, since they have been restored by new residents.

Sixteen historic private homes, reflecting history and individuality of present residents, along with nine

public buildings, will be open for public touring from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. tomorrow. Special events are planned throughout the day.

Hosts dressed in colonial garb will be available in each home to explain points of interest and answer all questions. A special walking tour of New Castle's finest gardens is also planned. And various special events — the ringing of the tower bells, re-enactment of William Penn's landing in New Castle, and various musical programs

and church sponsored luncheons will add color to the day.

House tour tickets, available at the old courthouse plaza, are \$8.50 for adults and \$5 for students. All proceeds benefit the Immanuel Episcopal Church on the Green restoration fund.

New Castle is located on Route 273, 12 miles east of Newark. Free parking is available and police will be there to direct traffic and provide tour information.

# Robert Lucas Glides in Action As DUSC Pres. with New Goals

With 18 credits, a 3.7 grade average, and the completion of two positions in student government on his semester's record, Bob Lucas glides into action as the newly-elected Delaware Undergraduate Student Congress (DUSC) President.

"It's (this year) been a strain, but I think I've held up pretty well," said Lucas, who is also a fraternity brother at Kappa Alpha.

The 19-year-old sophomore explained that with a full schedule, "I try to budget my time very carefully." Budgeting is something he experienced first-hand as University of Delaware Coordinating Council (UDCC) Treasurer since last spring and UDCC Financial Controller of the Budget Board since last December.

Lucas decided to run for student government president because "there are many more things, a broader spectrum of things, I can get involved with."

The political science major also works during the week at Morris Library in the circulation department and occasionally as a tour guide.

During Winter Session and summer vacation, he returns to his home in the small, rural community of Ephrata, Pa., to work for a recreation center located there.

Despite his heavy schedule, Lucas finds spare time for hobbies, such as intramural tennis, jogging and playing golf. "I just love being outside," he said.

Although Lucas was accepted at Pitt and Penn State, he says, "I was scared off by the numbers."

But being from a small town has not given Lucas small goals. "Everyone keeps telling me, 'Everyone goes in with good ideas, and they come out crawling.' Maybe it'll happen. I don't know, but I'm not going to give up halfway through the year like people in the past have. We're going to push it the whole way through," Lucas said.

One of his goals is for students to feel their vote in student government matters. Lucas believes the student activity fee will show students that they can gain from voting.

A mandatory fee of \$5 per semester from every full-time student would help the budgets of student organizations, or as he stated, "increase the size of the pie so everyone gets a bigger slice."

A portion of the fee collected would be set aside for a plan that proposes to keep Morris Library, Carpenter, the Computer Center and

the Student Center opened for longer periods of time.

In addition, a major concert is planned in the only currently-available location, The Fieldhouse, "although we're trying to come up with some alternatives," Lucas said.

As another goal, Lucas hopes to extend the drop-add period from the current six weeks to eight weeks. He feels the administration's simultaneous curtailment of the 11-week drop-add period and the establishment of the 15-plus credit tuition fee were "totally unnecessary."

The addition of two student trustees to the Board of Trustees' present 32 is a "very, very high goal" for Lucas. Although "student listeners" exist on the committees of the Board he says the trustees "let it open for you to talk, but they sort of try to put themselves so much higher that you feel compelled to stay down and listen."

Listening to Lucas discuss various plans for improving the university as we walked down KA's steps to the door, I wondered where he found the time to be so busy.

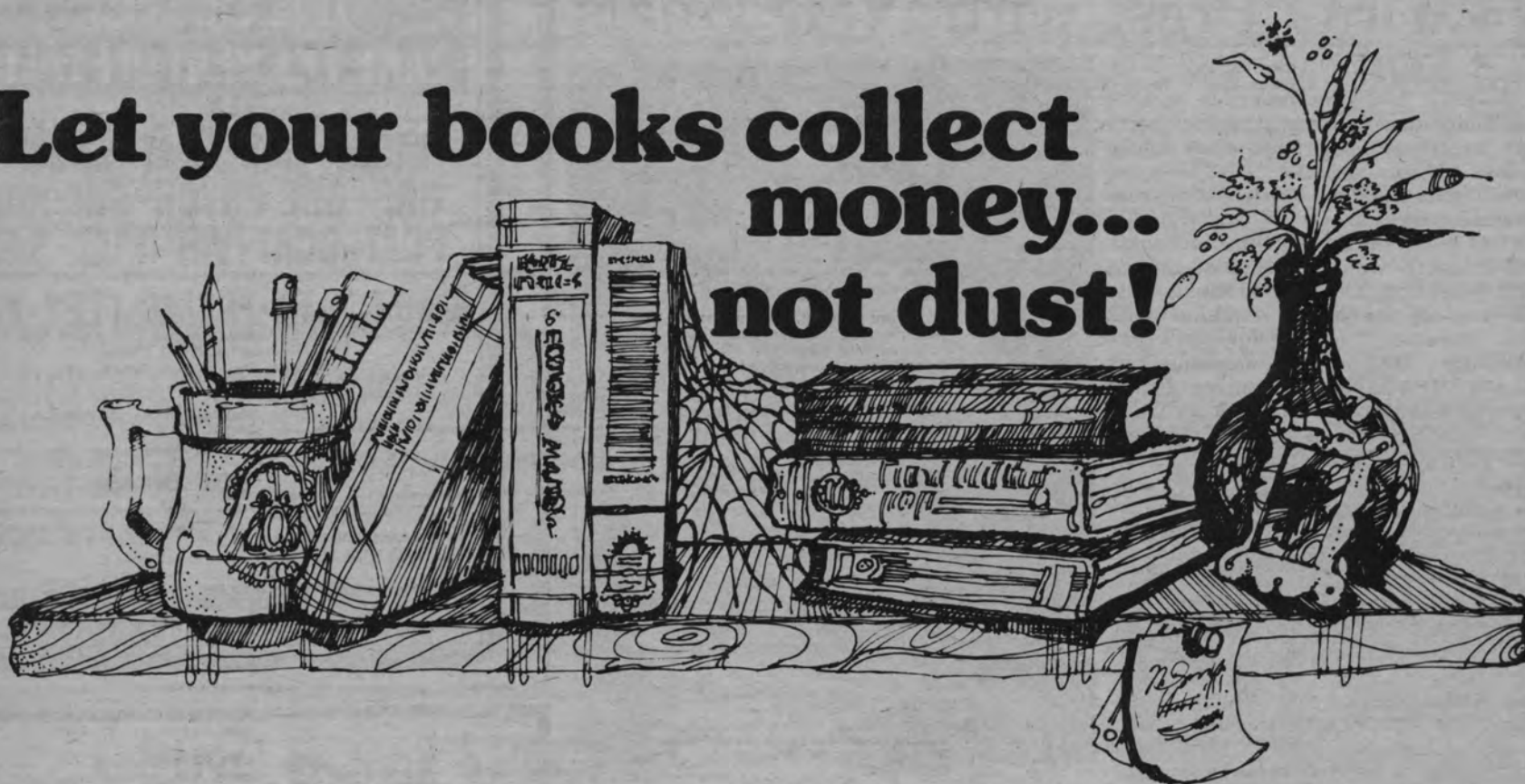

## McCreary- 'Fast Eddie'

Speed kills, with one exception. When speed is energized in a foot-race of 100 yards or the more conventional measurement of 100 meters, speed doesn't kill.

Ed McCreary is the 100 meter specialist for the Delaware track team, and a pretty good one at that. One only has to glance at the record book to know that.

McCreary owns the school record in the 100-yard dash with a time of 9.5 seconds. He is also tied for the 100-meter dash record with a time of 10.5.

His name is also beside the 200 meter dash record with a time of 21.4. The accomplishments stretch on. He is a member of three record-breaking relay teams, the 440 relay (42.3), the 880 relay (1:28.6), and the sprint-medley relay (3:25.6). And, yes, he also tied the 60-yard mark with a time of 6.3 seconds. He is a busy, young man.

Despite all of his collegiate accomplishments, this sturdy 5'9" 165 lb. junior may have

had his greatest thrill last August when he raced a 1931 Model A Ford and a horse-and-sulky in a promotion at the Brandywine Raceway. It was called "Man vs. Machine vs. Horse-and-Sulky with McCreary featured as the sprinter. He beat the car by two yards while the horse never finished the race.

"There were 4000 people and I was to run between the 5th and 6th races," explained McCreary, "I only trained for three weeks but I was really psyched. I heard the car coming at the finish line but I was able to hold on."

McCreary, a soft-spoken accounting major, works hard to improve his speed.

"I do a lot of upper-body lifting to strengthen my arms," offered "Fast Eddie". "The Arms and legs have to act like pistons and in order for that to happen, a sprinter has to build the strength in his arms." He further explained that lifting increases stamina and power, which are both essential to running.

McCreary is quick to laud his teammates, who are the defending ECC champs and currently hold a 13-meet winning streak over the past two years.

"The conference championships, won two weeks ago at Rider, are the whole season for us," noted McCreary who is the defending conference champion in the 100 meter dash and anchorman for the champion 400 meter relay team of a year ago.

McCreary received a scare in the 11th grade when he broke his hip as he pulled away at the start of a race. The force of his start jarred the hip muscle which pulled the bone from the hip. He was sidelined for about six weeks but has come back strong from this serious injury.

He has been showing opponents his heels ever since.

## "My Best Shot"

Much is written of the stars, the football players who survive the hitting and make it on the field and on the sports page. To the guys who don't survive the hitting little attention is granted.

Jim Patrick is sound of mind, sound of personality, and very sound of sense of humor. Of knees, he is not sound. Three operations have a way of doing that to an athlete. His scars look like the Mississippi River does from 35,000 feet. File him under Namath.

Germany was prettier after World War Two than Jim Patrick's right knee was after Operation Two. But see, he didn't lose the war.

Consolation is a word often tossed around. Mark Fidrych got consolation out of pitching four innings of painless baseball for the first time in two years. Jim Patrick got consolation out of seeing his name on the Blue-White Spring Game roster on May 5. Leaning on his cane in Section C of Delaware Stadium, he could be content that he worked hard and gave football another try. White - Number 23, Jim Patrick Defensive Back. Sophomore, 6-0, 193, Keystone Oaks/Pittsburgh, Pa.

"My junior year in high school," remembers Patrick of the fall of 1975, "we were strictly a passing team using a Pro-I offense. Our quarterback was All-Conference and Second Team All-State. He wound up leading the league in passing and I led in receiving as his split end and flanker. We passed over 30 times a game and I also Was All-Conference."

A 1-8 record befelled that team, something that will happen to any team, Tubby Raymond will preach, that lives by the pass. Keystone Oaks High School welcomed a new coach in 1976.

"He was your basic 'four yards and a cloud of smoke' ball player," says Patrick. "I was I-back in a two-tight-end running offense. I was carrying the ball 20-25 times per game, averaging over 100 yards, and returning punts and kick-offs."

"Everything was going good. I was getting offers from big schools like West Virginia and Arizona State. Then, it was our fourth game, the other team couldn't move the first time they had the ball. On the punt I got about three yards, got hit and tore ligaments and cartilage in my right knee."

Surgery ensued and the big schools that were courting him were scared away. Patrick almost settled on Edinboro State. Then, Delaware defensive co-ordinator Ed Maley stepped into the picture.

"I got called down to the office one day and he'd shown up. It was late February or early March, I guess. He talked about the school. I didn't even know where Delaware was. He said 'Newark' and I said how come they call it the University of Delaware if its in New Jersey.' So I decided to visit the campus."

Patrick found his way to the Diamond State. But on the first day of practice, his swollen, sore knee's cartilage tore again. He dropped out of Delaware, went back to Pittsburgh and began the comeback after a second operation. He returned to school in February.

"I spent at least two hours a day lifting," says Patrick of the time period between the second injury and the 1979 spring season. "The year I bulked up to 209 pounds and then dropped to 192 playing weight. February and March were my biggest months. I was running four miles five days a week, plus lifting."

The dream ended on a rainy Saturday, seven days before the Blue-White contest. In four weeks he has moved from the bottom of the list, to "second or third" on Tubby's depth chart. That's second or third at safety, a position he never played before. It ended when a pulling guard blocked him low, and Patrick's spikes stuck in the mud.

"I twisted all the way around on it," says Patrick of the third right knee injury. "Something popped. I couldn't walk on it when I stood up. Right there I figured that would be the last football practice I ever went through."

"It was a wild shot my knee would ever hold up in the first place. But I wanted to give it a shot. I didn't want to go through life saying 'could I have played again?'"

"Now I can sit up in the stands next fall and know I gave it my best shot. And I can be content with that."

The guy who has had two operations on the right knee and one on the left (the result of a car accident) leans back on his bed and smiles. His has a constant, glowing smile that is contagious. A warm spring breeze blows across the Student Center tennis courts into his third floor window in Cannon hall.

The roster he "ain't never gonna throw away," is tacked to his dresser. Jim Patrick's paper trophy happily flutters in the sweet-smelling breeze.

"I'm going home," he says after a long pause, "and maybe have another operation. I'll talk to my doctor and see what he thinks and... I might just give it another shot."

## Delaware Batters Prepare for NCAA Playoffs

When the Blue Hen baseball team takes the field for an away double header at Navy this Saturday to finish out their regular season, eight of their nine starters will have the distinction of having been named to the East Coast Conference All-Star team.

Doing the catching will be senior Herb Orensky, voted the ECC's most valuable player and a first team ECC member along with teammates Scott Waibel as a designated hitter, Jeff Smith at third base, and freshman superstar Jim Sherman in rightfield. Four more Hen players were named to the second team: Gary Gehmann, a senior center fielder and honored this week as Delaware's Senior Male Athlete of the Year; Scott Young, a sophomore righthander with the team's best ERA (2.55), Joe Shockley, a junior shortstop, and Brett Gardner, a sophomore leftfielder.

Coach Bob Hannah had nothing but praise for his ballplayers. "The fact that all these guys gained some recognition from the other coaches in the league makes me very proud of them," he said. "These guys have achieved as much if not more than anybody in the history of Delaware baseball."

This same all-star studded team will be going to the NCAA regional tournament starting on either May 25th or 26th at a place to be determined on Monday.

Hannah expressed these feelings about the upcoming tournament: "I'm disappointed in

the fact that it will not be a truly Eastern team tournament, because there has been some talk of teams outside our region being invited to the tournament," he commented. "I'd have to say we are the underdogs going in, mainly because we just haven't played as many games as some of the other schools we'll be competing against. There will be some of the top teams in the country there, and again pitching will be the key to how well we do."

The Hens, 35-11 on the year, will have to win four games to take the tournament, but they've done it before; witness the ECC playoffs. Pitching has been "spotty," admitted Hannah, who said he will start Jim Trevena in the first game and plans on following him with everyone he has in his bullpen.

Whenever the pitching slackens off the heavy Hen bats should be able to step in and give the Hens the runs they need to win. This year's team has broken every Delaware offensive record on the books, including a phenomenal team batting average of .343.

Hannah characterized his team as one that has hit with consistency and with power this year. This statement is reflected in the stats which show that the Hens have 51 homeruns, 392 RBI's, and have scored 428 runs this season, all new records.

"We're a tournament-tested team," Hannah added. "We've won some big games for this university and we deserve to be representing the ECC."

## Brandimarte Selected as Hen Grid Captain

For Jim Brandimarte, it came maybe not as a shock but at least a surprise when he was selected early this week as the Blue Hen football team's captain for the 1979 season.

A safety who didn't have a true starting position nailed down until midway through last fall, Brandimarte finished with a superb performance in the final part of the regular season and throughout the three post-season playoff clashes. It was only his first year on the Hen varsity after

the Altoona, Pa. native had transferred from the University of Arizona.

"I'm honored, definitely," commented Brandimarte, "and I'm pleased personally. I wasn't really shocked at the announcement, but I was a bit surprised. There are a lot of good guys who could have been picked."

And Brandimarte pointed out that he will not face the great amount of pressure that may have been forced upon past captains because of the good amount of leadership-quality players.

"There are a lot of seniors on this fall's team, and that will help me out a great deal," he continued. "Guys like Mike Donnalley, Herb Beck, Scott Brunner, to name a few. Even a lot of the underclassmen have leadership potential."

Being selected captain is for Brandimarte the zenith of his one-year career here which began in virtual oblivion. After transferring from Arizona, the 5-10, 187 pounder was forced to red-shirt a year due to the NCAA rule concerning transfers. When fall

camp opened last August, Brandimarte found himself in the thick of the defensive back battle along with three or four other outstanding Hens. His picture wasn't even in the 1978 Blue Hen football media guide.

"I was a bit unhappy at what was going on at the beginning of the year," he continued. "The coaches were shifting so many guys in and out of that defensive backfield. But it finally worked out for me."

And he was in on the Hen playoff defense which shut out supposed offensive power Winston-Salem and a week later had another excellent showing in Delaware's 10-9 loss to Eastern Illinois in the Division II championship game in Texas.

Brandimarte had originally been recruited out of Altoona Area High School by the Arizona Wildcats, though he had been leaning toward Delaware from the start.

"I was interested in Delaware, but the guy who recruited me from Arizona had coached me earlier in prep school," he explained. "Then they flew me out there. I was in Wilkes-Barre at the time and it was about 22 degrees. When we arrived in Arizona it was around 75 or 80. I just fell in love with the place. I'd never been out west before, and it seemed like a great place to be."

His freshman season Arizona ended up 13th in the country, but the year later coach Jim Young and his entire crew of assistants packed up for Purdue.

"Transferring was definitely the right decision for me," added Brandimarte, who picked up two Wildcat grid letters. "I had liked Delaware from the beginning. It's really worked out for me."

And having him as captain should work out fine for the Blue Hens this fall.
