Shropshire Warns Of Economic Loss With Hog Cholera

With Hog Cholera

Hog cholera has caused serious economic losses in Delaware according to John H. Shrooshire, extension livestock specialist at the Iniversity of Delaware. He said 530 cases of hog cholera were reported, this summer and fall, and since all cases were not reported, this summer and fall, and since all cases were not reported, this is a conservative figure.

To prevent spreading, healthy hogs should be vaccinated. Research with the disease has shown that vaccination of all pigs when they are two to four months old controls cholera. The serum also has some curative value if used in very early stages of the disease. In late stages, however, very little can be done, Shropshire said.

The Delaware Swine Producers Association has approached the State Board of Agriculture to investigate the possibility of a complete swine disease program. This subject, together with a proposed program will be discussed at a meeting of swine producers at the University of Delaware Agricultural Substation in Georgetown, at 7:30 p.m., Dec. 3.

Hog cholera is highly infectious and contagious. Once the animals have it, the disease is usually acute and death occurs within seven to 10 days. Characteristics are loss of appetite, fever and weakness.

Unsanitary conditions, visitors, and vermir can cause the infection to spread from farm to farm. This was shown by the Delaware morbidity reports for August and September.

If you are in doubt, call the reterinarian, Professor Shronshire divises. It takes three weeks to confirm the presence of hog cholera, and any time lost in diagnosing the disease can be costly.







Eight one-year research contracts totaling \$115.591 have been granted to University of Delaware professors for work under sponsorship of government agencies and private industrial organizations.

Professors supervising the projects are Dr. Paul Bolgiano, Jr., Dr. Donald de Sylva, Dr. Winston Gotschalk, Dr. David Lamb, Dr. William Mosher, Dr. Robert Pigford, Dr. Carl Shuster, Jr., and Professor Milton Young.

Dr. Bolgiano, assistant professor of electrical engineering, is pursuing research on the mathematical and theoretical relations of the quantum theory as it pertains to the detection of electromagnetic radiation in the radio frequency spectrum. His work involves an investigation of the ultimate limitations on the detection of low energy signals.

Dr. Lamb's project in chemical engineering, involves development of a general criterion by which the stability of catalytic reactors may be predicted.

Dr. Mosher, chairman and professor of chemistry, has received U.S. Army Chemical Warfare support for the study "Synthesis of Organic Compounds," to find better reaction conditions.

A second investigation in chemical engineering is being undertaken by Dr. Pigford, department chairman, under the sponsorship of the Thiokol Corporation of Elston. This study of high speed flow of reacting gases will focus particular attention upon the supersonic conditions in which chemical reactions probably have their greatest effect.

Dr. Shuster has received the support of three organizations for his project, "Studies of the Disease-Causing Organisms and Pathology of the Eastern American Oyster." Financial support for this work has been provided by the U. S. Fish and Wildliff Service and the Bureau of Commercial Fisheries.


