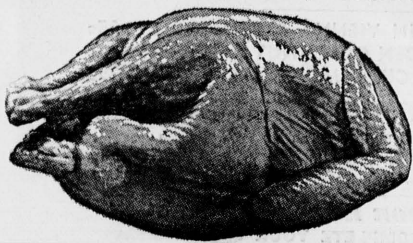

Three Delaware farmers won hard-earned crowns at the annual crops banquet in Capital Grange Hall in Dover on Tuesday night of Nov. 24, for topping the field in corn, soybean and alfalfa production.

Top corn yield in the contest sponsored by the Delaware Crop Improvement Association and the University of Delaware Agricultural Extension Service, was 129.59 bushels. It won the corn crown for Wayne E. Hickman, Frankford.

The soybean title went to Fred M. O'Neal, Seaford, who grew an average of 52.3 bushels per acre in the five-acre contest.

The first Delaware alfalfa king is George Simpson, Houston, who racked up 6.47 tons of alfalfa per acre. This is the first year of the alfalfa yield contest.

New Castle County winners in the alfalfa contest were Philip Pierson, Hockessin with 5.38 tons, followed by Fred Samendinger and J. Oliver Koellig, both with 5.13 tons and both from Newark.

George Fischer, Smyrna, the 1957 state corn king, was elected president of the Delaware Crop Improvement Association.

William Mitchell, Newark, was re-elected secretary, and Oliver Koellig, Newark, was re-elected treasurer.

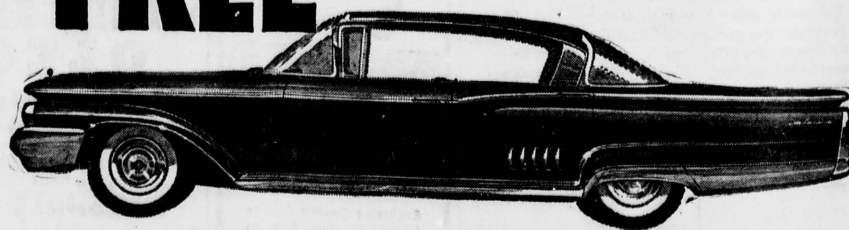

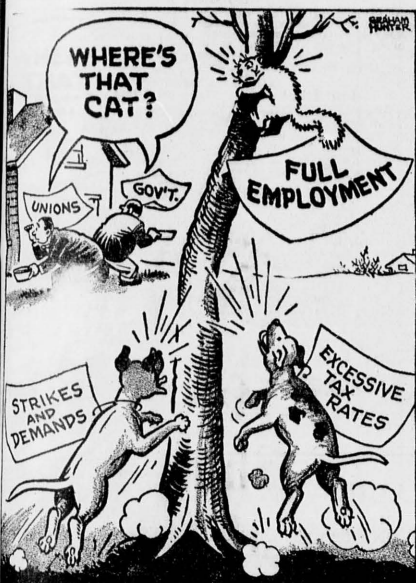

Robert Burns obviously wasn't thinking of American unions and the U. S. Government when he jotted his truism that the best laid scheme "of mice and men" goes awry. But the shoe fits. Ironically, the two forces that most loudly to full employment are the ones doing most to defeat their own purpose.

Not intentionally, of course. But whether a person intends to trip over his own feet doesn't ease his fall.

Through constantly rising wage demands, the unions are forcing the price of goods made by their members so high that they can't compete with foreign goods. American manufacturers must turn to automation to make their product cheaply, or quit making the product. Either way, employees are out of jobs.

The government gets in its lick through taxes that drain job-making capital, and through inflationary spending destroys savings.

There can be no jobs unless somebody saves enough money to buy the tools, plant and raw materials for employees to work.

Inflation means that more money must be saved to buy needed equipment. High taxes leave less money to be saved. Thus the saving and investing process that creates jobs is severely crippled.

If our legislative and union leaders intend for "full employment" to be more than a political slogan, they had better take another look at their plans.

## The Levy Court of New Castle Co.

The Levy Court is the basic governing body and most important single government agency in the county. It takes its name from the first form of county government—a group of magistrates appointed by the governor to levy taxes—hence, the name "Levy Court."

Even today, perhaps the most important function of the Levy Court is to set the county tax rate on real estate and to collect county taxes. Each of the three Delaware counties has a Levy Court.

## The Levy Court Commissioners

Members of the Levy Court for New Castle County are Joseph H. Dayton, president; Harry F. Lambert and G. Lester Cleaver. Each commissioner serves for a six year term and cannot succeed himself.

Elections are staggered and the county is divided into three Levy Court districts. One commissioner must live in each of these districts. After each election, the commissioners elect one of their number as president.

The president's annual salary is \$5,500, and each of the other two commissioners receive \$5,000.

The Hundreds

## Delaware Food Market Report

By Anne Holbertson  
U. of D. Agricultural Extension Service

Meats are steady to lower in price this week—good news since meats are the biggest slice of the food budget.

Pork is averaging about 10 cents a pound cheaper than a year ago at this time and prices have been dropping steadily for the past three weeks.

Fresh pork spareribs are down two cents a pound; fresh shoulders, three cents; rib end pork down two cents; and second-

grade bacon is down four cents a pound.

Beef, lamb and veal are all steady in price this week; however, weekend specials bring the prices way down on many cuts.

Check the meat counter for good buys on veal roast, beef steaks, rib roast of beef, leg-of-lamb and other lamb cuts.

Sweet potatoes are coming from all producing areas now and the quality is high. Prices are reasonable, so enjoy this vegetable in many ways—sweet potato biscuits, pancakes, pies, candied sweet potatoes, mashed, baked, fried, etc. Be sure to select the plump, chunky ones—they are better buys.

Other thrifty choices at the vegetable counter are dry onions, turnips, beets, squash and some snaps. Lettuce, green peppers and loose tomatoes are all a bit higher this week. California and Mexico are beginning to ship loose tomatoes, some are "vine-ripened" and really look beautiful. The prices are high though for these beauties—around 45 cents a pound. Less choice tomatoes are much lower in price.

Green cabbage is in short supply and prices rose another penny. With the cranberry crisis a thing of the past, fresh cranberries are plentiful again and must have the stamp of government approval. They are priced around 29 cents a pound.

Avocados, oranges, grapefruit and bananas remain good to excellent buys this week.

Pears and apples have edged up in price but not enough to pass them by.

Nuts—there are plenty this year and this is the season to enjoy them.



## Perkins Predicts Increased Enrollment With 6,000 Undergraduates In 15 Years

Within the next 15 years 6,000 undergraduates will be enrolled at the University of Delaware, President John A. Perkins predicts in his annual report for 1959-60.

This enrollment explosion from the present 2,500 level will require an additional 150 full-time faculty members, a 35 per cent increase in gross instructional floor space and an expenditure of about 20 million dollars, exclusive of land and furnishings, Dr. Perkins estimates.

"The University of Delaware, through its long-range planning study, has a reasonably accurate and complete forecast of students, faculty and buildings," Dr. Perkins writes. "Estimates based on the number of children already born and in school indicate that our campus undergraduate enrollment will increase from the current 2,500 to roughly 6,000 students 15 years hence. Slightly smaller proportionate increases are expected in our graduate school and extension division.

In 1972 about 13,000 young people and adults will be under instruction on a full or part-time basis. Even with these greater numbers, the University of Delaware will be small by university standards.

Because larger enrollments will increase the university's efficiency, the faculty will not have to be increased in direct proportion to the

size of the student body, Dr. Perkins states.

"Nevertheless," he observes, "the resident teaching staff must grow by about 90 per cent or 150 full-time persons. These additions will give needed strength to our graduate and extension programs, too.

"A smaller than 50 per cent increase in our part-time extension staff is expected. Part of the undergraduate teaching should be done by graduate students as an aspect of additional doctoral curricula."

To accommodate more students and faculty, the university's gross instructional floor space will have to be increased by 35 per cent, Dr. Perkins believes. It is significant, however, he reports, that gross instructional space per student credit hour will decrease by 50 per cent and by 1972 more efficient use will be made of all available instructional space.

"In the aggregate about \$20 million (exclusive of land and furnishings) will be required to erect the buildings that must be built between now and 1972," Dr. Perkins declares. "The university will borrow some of this money; gifts are hoped for; substantial state appropriations will inevitably be required. There is a time-table for the completion of these needed structures which, if adhered to, will accommodate the students and, in view of apparently ever-rising construction costs, will result in maximum economy."

"The Delaware Legislature in granting the university's capital outlay request for 1959-60 has enabled it to keep to that timetable. Funds for a much needed mathematics-physics building must be forthcoming in the second year of this biennium, as requested, if the university is to remain on schedule."

Greatly expanded population in the First State, increased birth rates and larger numbers of students desiring higher education are not the only reasons for the growth of the University of Delaware, Dr. Perkins says.

### Behind-the-Scenes Research Studies Conducted At U.D.

Contracts For \$115,591  
Granted U. D. Scientists  
For Local Research Work

Behind-the-scenes activities by University of Delaware research scientists may lead to important discoveries within the next several years.

Eight one-year research contracts totaling \$115,591 have been granted to University of Delaware professors for work under sponsorship of government agencies and private industrial organizations.

Professors supervising the projects are Dr. Paul Bolgiano, Jr., Dr. Donald de Sylva, Dr. Winston Gottschalk, Dr. David Lamb, Dr. William Mosher, Dr. Robert Pigford, Dr. Carl Shuster, Jr., and Professor Milton Young.

Dr. Bolgiano, assistant professor of electrical engineering, is pursuing research on the mathematical and theoretical relations of the quantum theory as it pertains to the detection of electromagnetic radiation in the radio frequency spectrum. His work involves an investigation of the ultimate limitations on the detection of low energy signals.

The study relating to radio reception, is being sponsored by the Ballistic Research Laboratories of the Aberdeen Proving Ground.

The project undertaken by Dr. de Sylva, assistant research professor of biological sciences, is sponsored by the National Science Foundation and relates to the long-term goals of the university's marine research program.

Dr. Shuster has received the support of three organizations for his project, "Studies of the Disease-Causing Organisms and Pathology of the Eastern American Oyster." Financial support for this work has been provided by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Bureau of Commercial Fisheries.
