He further points out that if the identity of the applicant was an issue, the State would be required to produce a witness from the State where the conviction occurred capable of identifying the applicant. The same procedure would have to be followed in order to prove, for example, that the applicant has a history of admissions to mental institutions or drug abuse.

At the present time, administrative hearings are routinely conducted free of the restrictions imposed by the Delaware Rules of Evidence. Probation hearings, parole revocation hearings, and bail hearings are all conducted in a less formal atmosphere

appropriate to the matters at issue. Moreover, this legislation would impose an evidentiary burden on the State without imposing the same burden on the applicant.

The effect that adoption of this legislation will have on an already overburdened court system cannot be ignored. The judges of the Superior Court are dealing with increasing trial demands and should not be required to devote their limited time and resources to lengthy permit hearings for those few citizens whose applications to carry a concealed deadly weapon are opposed by the State. Furthermore, if the State is unable to comply with the Delaware Rules of Evidence, an unqualified applicant might be permitted to obtain a license and I think that is a greater danger than the risk of denying a license to an otherwise qualified applicant.

Finally, I do not think denial of an application by the Superior Court should result in

an appeal to the Supreme Court.

On balance, and for all of the reasons I have stated in this letter, I am returning House Bill No. 188 without my signature.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE 136TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY

On June 27, 1991, I received House Bill No. 290 as amended by House Amendment No. 1, which is entitled:

"AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTERS 14 and 40 OF TITLE 14, DELAWARE CODE RELATING TO TERMINATION OF SERVICES OF PROFESSIONAL EMPLOYEES AND RELATING TO PUBLIC SCHOOL EMPLOYMENT RELATIONS.

This bill seeks to codify the reasons for which a public school administrator's contract may be terminated by his or her local school board employer. The bill also sets forth procedural requirements which must be followed in order to effectuate a termination. Because I believe this legislation could hamper the effective and efficient administration and supervision of our local school districts, I am returning House Bill No. 290 as amended by House Amendment No. 1 without my signature.

My underlying concern with this legislation is that it will undermine the authority of

the state's independently-elected school boards to manage their schools in a manner as they see fit to ensure accountability to the residents, parents and students of their districts. The school boards must have the authority and responsibility to hire, retain, terminate, reassign, and alter the employment contracts of administrators in order to provide the best management services available to discharge their duties. It is my conclusion that House Bill No. 290 would place unacceptable restrictions on the school boards and cause great uncertainty on their parts thereby undermining their authority and

limiting their ability to provide accountability for their districts. Under existing Delaware law, local school boards are statutorily authorized to administer and supervise their schools and to determine policy in regard thereto. In order to accomplish this mandate in an effective and meaningful way, the boards must have the flexibility and freedom to manage their districts free from unnecessary restrictions. Th boards must have the ability to make personnel decisions affecting school administrators, their front-line managers, based upon their determination as to what is in the best interests of their districts and the children who attend their schools. In my opinion, this legislation, if enacted, could effectively deprive local school boards of the reasonable control necessary to ensure competent management of their school systems. For example, by its terms this legislation would allow an administrator to appeal a decision by a local board when the administrator is offered a different contract even if it is for a position of equal salary. This could frustrate the transfer of administrators from one school to another or from one position of responsibility to another to the detriment of a district. Moreover, any time a material term in a contract is changed it could be argued that a different contract has been offered thereby resulting in a "termination" rendering the provisions of this bill applicable. While obviously unintended, this provision would have a significant, adverse impact on each board's ability to administer and supervise its schools. In addition, this legislation does not provide administrators with rights similar to those

of teachers as stated in the bill's Synopsis. Rather, the rights provided in House Bill No. 290 as amended are far more extensive than those afforded teachers. Specifically, the provisions of this bill would apply to all public school administrators irrespective of tenure. By way of contract, the procedural rights afforded to teachers who are subject to termination at the end of a school year are only applicable to those who have completed at least three years of service in the state, two years of which must have been in the employ of the terminating board. The tenure provision for teachers allows local school boards additional flexibility while still affording full protection to those employees who have performed their jobs satisfactorily throughout their probationary period. Under the bill before me, every administrator, even one hired as recently as a month, a week, of even a day earlier would be afforded the full protections set forth in this legislation. There is no apparent justification for permitting this type of "immediate tenure" for administrators.

With respect to the issue of notice of intention to terminate services, House Bill No. 290 as amended would require a local school board to provide notice to the administrator at least six months prior to the expiration of his or her contract. The notice must specify the reasons for the intended termination. Under the applicable statute pertaining to teachers, notice is required on or before the first day of May that the school board intends to terminate a teacher's services at the end of the school year. House Bill No. 290 also provides that the failure to terminate an administrator in accordance with the terms of the legislation (including the six month notice provision) shall result in the automatic renewal of the administrator's contract for a period of one year. The application of these provisions could have serious unintended consequences. For example, if an administrator is found guilty of some gross misconduct at some time less than six months prior to the expiration of his or her contract, while he or she could be suspended this bill's provisions could be interpreted to prevent the local school board be from taking any action to terminate the administrator's contract. Moreover, since timely notice was not provided, the contract would automatically be renewed for an additional year.

Another major distinction between this legislation and the law governing the termination of teachers is that under this bill an administrator notified of his or her intended termination may seek a hearing before the Public Employee Relations Board. This would represent a departure from the statutory duties and responsibilities with which the PERB was originally clothed. It would also place the PERB in a position of evaluating second-hand the subjective actions of local school boards in managing their districts. Finally, under this bill, the decision of the PERB is final and not subject to appeal.

In comparison, under the current law governing the termination of teachers, the employing school board must hold a hearing or designate a hearing officer to do so. If a hearing officer conducts the hearing, the officer is required to submit a report with a recommendation to the board which makes the ultimate determination regarding termination. The decision of the local school board is then subject to appeal to Superior Court.

Also, under House Bill No. 290 as amended, at any hearing before the Public Employee Relations Board, the local school board would be required to shoulder the burden of proving, by substantial evidence, that its decision to terminate an administrator was justified. No such burden exists with respect to termination proceedings involving teachers.

Finally, pursuant to this bill, an administrator who appeals his or her termination to the Public Employee Relations Board and receives a favorable decision from the Board would be entitled to a reasonable award of attorney's fees not to exceed \$1,500. There is no provision in the legislation for an award of attorney's fees in the event the local school board's decision is upheld. Likewise, there is no analogous provision regarding attorney's fees with respect to successful appeals of terminations by teachers.

Therefore, a review of the bill's provisions establishes that it goes well beyond the statutory scheme applicable to the termination of teachers' employment contracts and does so to the detriment of the effective management of our schools.

For the reasons stated herein, I am returning House Bill No. 290 as amended by House Amendment No. 1 to the House of Representatives without my signature.

SB 179 is the second leg of a constitutional amendment and does not require the Governor's signature.

To the Members of the Delaware State House of Representatives of the 136th General Assembly On July 1, 1991, I received House Bill No. 312 which is entitled:
"AN ACT TO AMEND TITLE 22, DELAMARE CODE RELATING TO RESIDENCY REQUIREMENTS FOR MUNICIPAL EMPLOYEES."

This legislation is the result of efforts by members of certain public employee unions to eliminate legislatively the residency requirement contained in the charter of the City of Wilmington. The charter provision found objectionable by the proponents of this bill required Milmington's employees to establish city residency within six months of employment. Failure to do so is grounds for dismissal. The charter provision was approved by the voters of the City of Wilmington at a referendum in 1976. It has since been endorsed and supported by successive mayors and city councils. Indeed, both the current mayor and city council are on record as being opposed to any change in the charter's residency requirement.

When the effort to eliminate the residency requirement by action of the General Assembly was unsuccessful, the bill now before me was passed as a compromise. This legislation required any municipality with a residency requirement to submit the issue to the voters at its next municipal election. Furthermore, it prohibits any municipality which does not now have a residency requirement from adopting one. Thus, while this legislation was designed specifically for the City of Wilmington, it actually has a broader scope in that it includes every municipality in the State.

Most of our municipalities require their elected officials to be residents. While many of those officials serve on a part-time basis and receive modest salaries, they are nevertheless employees of the municipality as well as municipal officials. It is therefore not clear if House Bill 312 would mandate the necessity of a referendum in each municipality whose charter required residency as a qualification of paid elective office. The legislation may not have intended such a result; however, a literal reading of subsection (a) suggests that possibility. At the very least, the legislation should be clarified to eliminate the burden it might otherwise place on municipalities other than Wilmington. Moreover, as presently drafted, House Bill 312 precludes all municipalities from imposing a residency requirement on their administrative officers as a condition of employment. In my view, such decisions are better left to the sound discretion of local officials and should not be the subject of a blanket prohibition. Nor should the State presume to impose restrictions on municipalities whose representatives have not had an opportunity to comment on their implications.

For the reasons stated herein, and primarily because House Bill 312 broadly applies to all Delaware municipalities, I am returning it without my signature. I note that I will

approve a bill clearly applicable only to the City of Wilmington.

To the Members of the Delaware State House of Representatives of the 136th General Assembly On July 9, 1991, I received House Bill No. 370 which is entitled: "AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 5, TITLE 11, RELATING TO LICENSES TO CARRY CONCEALED DEADLY

WEAPONS."

On June 20, 1991, I returned House Bill 188 without my signature. I declined to approve that legislation not only because it required the application of the Delaware Rules of Evidence to Superior Court hearings regarding petitions to carry concealed deadly weapons but also because it created a right of appeal to the Supreme Court in the event that the petition was denied.

The legislation before me now for consideration was passed in response to my disapproval of House Bill 188. Like its predecessor, it mandates legislative approval of fees, creates a right of appeal to the Supreme Court, and required the application of the Delaware Rules of Evidence to contested hearings. It differs from House Bill 188 in that an exception is established in subsection (i) which would lessen the evidentiary burden upon the State, although not eliminating it completely. The exception permits the introduction of documentary evidence by the State to prove, for example, that a petitioner has a criminal record in another jurisdiction, thereby shifting the burden of proof to the petitioner should the court elect to admit the documents. Although this exception represents a significant improvement over House Bill 188, it does not satisfy all of my objections.

I continue to believe that the hearings at issue here are fundamentally administrative in nature and should not be circumscribed by adherence to the Delaware Rules of Evidence. Nor have I changed my view that the State should not create a right of appeal to the Supreme Court for individuals whose petitions have been denied. The additional strain placed upon what I earlier described as "an already overburdened court system" by this legislation remains a legitimate concern.

Furthermore, both the Department of Justice and the Delaware State Police continue to object to any legislation which would make it easier for individuals to obtain permits to carry concealed deadly weapons. I have not changed my view that a greater risk would result from granting a license to an unqualified petitioner than from denying one based on the discretion of a Superior Court judge.

For all of the reasons cited herein, I am returning House Bill No. 370 without my signature.

On June 30, 1991, I received House Bill No. 103 as amended by House Amendment No. 1
which is entitled:

"AN ACT AWARDING SPECIAL PENSION BENEFITS TO FLORENCE KNIERIEM, TRANSFERRING MONIES INTO THE SPECIAL PENSION FUND CREATED BY VOLUME 61, CHAPTER 455, LAWS OF DELAWARE, AND DIRECTING THE BOARD OF PENSION TRUSTEES TO ADMINISTER PAYMENT OF THE PENSION PROVIDED BY THIS ACT AS IF THE AWARD WERE PURSUANT TO CHAPTER 55, TITLE 29, DELAWARE CODE."

This bill seeks to direct the Board of Pension Trustees to grant Florence Knieriem a survivor's pension, effective July 1, 1991, in the amount of \$193.18 per month. The bill further directs that \$25,301.04 be appropriated to fund this special pension benefit. Because I believe that the circumstances of this case do not rise to the level to justify granting such extraordinary relief, and because awarding such a pension under these facts could have far-reaching, adverse effects, I am returning House Bill No. 103 as amended by House Amendment No. 1 without my signature.

House Amendment No. 1 without my signature.

Mrs. Knieriem is the widow of Thomas R. Phillips who was employed as a teacher in the State of Delaware for fifteen years. Following his retirement, Mr. Phillips received a state pension until the time of his death in 1978. Subsequent to Mr. Phillips' death his widow remarried thereby becoming disqualified from receiving a survivor's pension under the law in effect at that time. The statute in question has subsequently been amended so as to permit spouses of deceased state employees to remarry without being disqualified from

receiving survivors' pensions.

While there is no question that under current law the spouse of a deceased state employee is permitted to remarry without the loss of any applicable survivor's pension, there is also no question that at the time of her remarriage Mrs. Knieriem lost her entitlement to a survivor's pension under then existing Delaware law. Mrs. Knieriem is one of approximately one hundred individuals who are similarly situated. There is no legitimate justification for singling out this particular case for relief. Moreover, to render all similarly situated persons eligible for special pensions would not only unjustifiably supercede applicable law, but would also represent unacceptable public policy, establish improper precedent and constitute an irresponsible use of the taxpayers' money.

As I have repeated indicated, I believe that special pension legislation is justified only under extraordinary circumstances where equity compels its exercise. Because such circumstances do not exist in this case, I am returning House Bill No. 103 as amended by House Amendment No. 1 without my signature.

The following communication was made a part of the record at the request of Representative Petrilli:

SUMMARY OF RACIAL BLOC VOTING ANALYSIS FOR WILMINGTON, DELAWARE

IMPORTANCE OF RACIAL VOTING ANALYSIS

In 1982, Congress amended Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act to make clear that certain practices and procedures that result in the denial or abridgement of the right to vote are forbidden even though the absence of proof of discriminatory intent protects them from constitutional challenge. The intent of Congress was to reduce the burden of proof necessary for minority plaintiffs to establish a violation of Section 2.

In 1986, the United States Supreme Court decided <u>Thornburg v. Gingles</u>, the first amended

Section 2 case to be heard by the Court. The majority opinion, written by justice William Brennan, established racially polarized voting as the fundamental inquiry to determine whether there is a voting rights violation. Under Brennan's analysis "the purpose of inquiring into the existence of racially polarized voting is twofold: to ascertain whether minority group members constitute a politically cohesive unit and to determine whether

whites vote sufficiently as a bloc usually to defeat the minority's preferred candidate."

In a plurality section of his opinion, Justice Brennan elaborated on the evidence necessary to establish racially polarized voting. The state of North Carolina had argued that racially polarized voting exists if voting patterns are in some way caused by race. Brennan rejected this argument and determined that the relevant inquiry is whether voting patterns merely "correlate with the race of the voter." In other words, "it is the difference between the choices made by blacks and whites - not the reason for that difference - that results in blacks having less opportunity than whites to elect their preferred representatives."

Although Brennan indicated that "under Section 2 analysis it is the status of the candidate as the chosen representative of a particular racial group, not the race of the candidate, that is important," his conclusion that legally significant racial bloc voting existed in four of the five challenged districts in North Carolina rested solely on an analysis of contests that included black candidates. To date, this has led the lower courts to reject voting analysis that has relied upon white versus white electoral contests. Because courts are reluctant to accept analyses of elections without a minority candidate, only elections with minority candidates was included in this analysis.

The Federal District Court for Delaware, like the Court in <u>Thornburg v. Gingles</u>, has indicated that "racially polarized voting is the essential element of a section 2 vote dilution claim." In <u>Jenkins v. Red Clay Consolidated School Board of Education</u>, No. 89-230 (D. Del. April 30, 1990), the court declared that "racially polarized voting, when proven, can establish the political cohesiveness of the minority group by showing that significant numbers of minority group members usually vote for the same candidate. In the same vein, such proof can also demonstrate legally significant white bloc voting by showing that the majority bloc vote will normally defeat the combined strength of minority support plus

white crossover votes."

Although many of the election contests in the U.S. are characterized by racially polarized voting, the existence of racially polarized voting will only result in impermissible minority vote dilution if it is legally significant, or in other words, if the minority-preferred candidate is usually defeated as a result of white bloc voting.

II. RESULTS OF RACIAL VOTING ANALYSIS

The results of our racial bloc voting analysis indicate that, although whites and blacks

The results of our racial bloc voting analysis indicate that, although whites and blacks usually vote for different candidates, the black-preferred candidates are not "usually defeated" in city-wide elections. This is particularly true of the more recent election contests examined (1988 and 1990). On the basis of this finding, we conclude that it is unlikely that legally significant racial bloc voting exists in Milmington.

This conclusion is based on an analysis of ten city-wide primary and general elections

This conclusion is based on an analysis of ten city—wide primary and general elections since 1984 which included a black candidate(s) competing against white candidates. Two complementary statistical techniques, both sanctioned by the Supreme Court in Thornburg v.gingles, were employed: bivariate ecological regression analysis and homogeneous precinct analysis. Estimates derived from both methods are included in the table below (with homogeneous precinct estimates reported in parentheses).

* = Winner(s) (Based on information provided by New Castle County Board of Elections) As an examination of this table shows, despite the presence of polarized voting, black candidates have won seats citywide in 70% of the ten elections examined between 1984 and 1990. For example, Gregory was elected to city council at-large in 1984 and 1988 and Hollins won Democratic primary county council district 4 in 1990.

In the most recent elections studied, 1988 and 1990, black candidates have been even more successful, winning 75% of the elections examined. This suggested that the potential

for legally significant bloc voting is decreasing with time.

This analysis includes all of the citywide contests in which a black competed against white candidates. An attempt was also made to examine the 1982 race for State House district 1 in which Orlando George (the white incumbent) ran against a black Republican. However, because of the low number of precincts and the closeness of the contest, no reliable estimates of voting behavior by race were obtainable for this contest.

III. CONCLUSION

The ability of the black community in Wilmington to elect representatives of their choice has improved over the past ten years. And if the growth rate in the black community continues to increase at its present rate, the ability of black voters to elect candidates of their choice will continue to improve over the course of this decade.

According to the 1990 census, the black population grew at twice the rate of the white population in Delaware in the 1980s. Blacks now comprise 52% of the population in

Wilmington and this percentage is likely to increase over the course of the decade.

The city-wide election we have analyzed indicate that the black-preferred candidate is likely to win in Wilmington, Since the population in Wilmington is approximately 52% black, a state legislative district in the Wilmington area with a comparable black population percentage will probably also elect black-preferred candidates and thus is not likely to suffer from legally significant racial bloc voting.

Representative Petrilli introduced and brought HA 1 to HB 398 before the House for

Requirements of the Voting Rights Act

As you know i earlier presented testimony to you [sic] committee about the general requirements of the Voting Rights Act and made some limited comments about the legislative plan which had just been unveiled for public viewing and comment. I will refrain from making any further comments about the limited access of the public to the redistricting process and will focus these remarks on the issues of the Voting Rights Act as it relates to the proposed plan and guestions raised by counsel to the Committee.

The most important assertion that the NAACP can make is that the current status of the law interpreting the Voting Rights Act makes it clear that where it is possible to draw majority black districts this must be done. We have presented you with maps which create four viable minority districts and an influence district in the Wilmington area as well as one minority district in the Dover area. (*)

In the wake of the 1982 Amendments to the Voting Rights Act and the court decisions interpreting the Act, it is indisputable that any action that results in the dilution of the black community's voting strength is a violation of the Act. (**) Therefore, the analysis of proposed legislative plans will focus on a numerical comparison between the number and quality of minority districts that can potentially be drawn in a jurisdictions [sic] and the number and quality of such districts actually contained in the plan. absence of discriminatory motives on the part of those drawing the plans will not be relevant in determining whether the plan will pass muster if challenged in court.

We have reviewed the plans proposed by the Committee and compared them with those created by the NAACP Redistricting Committee. It is our opinion that the adoption of the districts you have proposed would be a violation of the Voting Rights Act as this would result in dilution of the minority community's voting strength both with regard to Dover and Wilmington. In Dover, you simply fail to establish a district where it is possible to

do so.(***)

In Wilmington, District 1 fails to have a minority VAP and is [sic] therefore does not pass the threshold definition of a minority district within the meaning of the Voting Rights Act.(****) Your proposal only created two minority districts, Districts 2 and 3, with adequate minority population and one of these has substantially more minority citizens than is necessary to create an adequate district.(*****) Although it approached sufficiency, District 5 of your proposal is also somewhat lower in percentage of minority population that what we consider adequate for a minority electable district in a [sic] urban center such as Wilmington. In short, only one of the districts you have presented for the Wilmington area is sufficient. The Wilmington area districts presented by the NAACP represent four viable districts that comport with the requirements of the Voting Rights Act and are also more in compliance with the one person, one vote doctrine.

The NAACP plan establishes a benchmark or minimum threshold of African American and other minority group voting strength that should emerge from the redistricting process. Any alternative plans should generally match these districts in numbers and real minority

empowerment even if the district lines are not exactly the same.

The U.S. Supreme Court recently affirmed an Arkansas case arising from the 1981 legislative reapportionment. <u>Jeffers v. Clinton</u>, 730 F. Supp. 196 (E.D. Ark. 1989) (three-judge court), <u>aff'd mem.</u>, ____ U.S. ____, 111 S.Ct. 662, 59 U.S.L.W. 3460 (1991). (three-judge court), <u>aff'd mem.</u>, <u>U.S.</u> In the <u>Jeffers</u> case, the lower court stated:

Given the usual voting patterns of urban minority groups, the NAACP and other voting rights groups do not usually combine any groups other than blacks and Hispanics. your figures are misleadingly high and would not withstand legal analysis.

(*****) - Both districts 2 and 5 contain too many people and result in the additional dilution of the minority community's voting strength. For example, the Committee's District 1 has 16,975 people. for a deviation of 4.47%. It is therefore doubly packed. Not only does it have two many minority citizens because it has an 80% minority population, but in addition this is 80% of an unnecessarily large number of people. Your district 2 has 2,048 more black citizens in it than does our district 2 which is almost ideal size with aldeviation of 0.28%. These 2,000 blacks would make up over 12% of another ideally Since the Committee is arguing (erroneously) that the minority population sized district. composition of District 1 (52.1%. 47.6% VAP) is adequate, there can be no justification for the double packing of District 2. You can't have it both ways. We think districts composed of approximately 70-72% combined black and Hispanic population are appropriate for the Milmington area. Similarly, district 5 is oversized having 16,980 people for a deviation of 4.5%. If it was simply trimmed to ideal district size by the removal of white population, its minority composition would increase from almost 2 percentage points.

If lines are drawn that limit the number of majority-black single member districts, and reasonably compact and contiguous majority-black districts could have been drawn, and if racial cohesiveness in voting is so great that, as a practical matter, black voters' preferences for black candidates are frustrated... the outlines of Section 2 theory are made out. 730 F. Supp. at 205.

Given the history of racially polarized voting in Delaware, and in Wilmington and Dover particularly, the failure to establish a minority district when one can be drawn is a violation of the Voting Rights Act. In the <u>Gingles</u>, case, the Supreme Court stated the threshold test for establishing a Voting Rights Act violation is met when the plaintiff shows the ability to draw a legislative district that is over 50% black and the existence of racially polarized voting.(********) Therefore, if the adopted districting plan fails to establish the maximum number of effective minority districts, the Voting Rights Act has been breached.(*******)

In light of the current state of the law and the benchmark set by the NAACP plan, the parellels with the Arkansas factual situation found in Jeffers would make success in

litigation against the current proposal a likelihood.

The Committee's plan seems to take great pains to protect incumbents. The Voting Rights Act does not contain any waiver that allows for protection of incumbents. No deviation from the maximum empowerment of minority communities should be tolerated because incumbents

are having safe districts created for them.

The Committee seems to think that there is no polarized voting in Delaware and that they are free from the requirements of the Voting Rights Act. Nothing could be further from reality. Analyses from the NAACP's litigation in Dover and the pending Red Clay School District case reveal rather extreme polarized voting patterns on the part of the white

In the Wilmington area, you have pointed to the successful candidacies of some black candidates. First, it should be pointed out that the Voting Rights Act as interpreted by <u>Gingles</u> and its progeny does not require that all minority candidates have always been defeated. To the contrary, the "usual pattern" is the key and unusual circumstances such as an unopposed minority candidate, a strong incumbent, backing of the white power

(******) = Obviously, the proposed district must be contiguous and reasonably compact. Heightened standards of compactness cannot be applied to minority districts and the

requirements of the Voting Rights Act take precedence.

(*******) — The lower court in <u>leffers</u> had before plaintiffs' analysis showing the maximum number of majority black districts that could be created in Arkansas. The court

stated:

He know, and have found in this opinion, how many such districts can be created, and we also know that their lines can be drawn so as to make them reasonably compact and contiguous. There is, therefore, a sort of presumption that any plan adopted should contain that number of majority-black districts.

730 F. Supp. at 217. This analysis was recognized recently when, in advising the Virginia state legislature, the Virginia Division of Legislative Services stated that the current state of the law required that "the maximum number of black majority districts must be

created."

(********) = Because the Dover case was settled, our experts' analyses were not compiled into formal reports that is available for presentation to the Committee. Both precinct analyses and exit polls revealed heavily polarized voting. The absences of elected minority officials and candidates in Dover should speak clearly enough on this issue. The studies of the Plaintiff's experts in the Red Clay School District case are in the Court records at the U.S. District Court, <u>Jenkins v. Red Clay Consolidated School District</u>, Civ. No. 89-230(LON). In addition, I personally have been told by a white State Senator/Legislator (who will remain anonymous) that some of the redistricting personnel already have these reports and may have done their own studies which showed polarized

voting.

This is unquestionably the case in Wilmington and Dover. Delaware has no black State Senators or Legislators who are not elected by heavily black districts. Success of black

In addition the Committee members should be aware that simply drawing districts with a majority African American, and or hispanic populations does not end the question of whether the dictates of the Voting Rights Act have been met. The law required that, where the minority population is available, districts be drawn in a manner that gives the minority community a fair and equitable chance to elect its candidate of choice. Therefore, districts must have an effective minority voting majority. This means that minority electable district must often have black population fat in excess of 50%. A specific analysis should be conducted to determined [sic] what is the threshold level needed for a particular district. In urban centers such as Wilmington with a history of low

legislative district where demographic and population factors make it possible to create a minority district greater than 50% in population, but which does not rise to minority population level usually expected for the probable election of the minority community's candidate of choice. In these circumstances the redistricting authority is not freed from its obligation to create the minority district. As noted above a <u>Gingles</u> violation is made out when a minority district can be drawn and the requisite voting patterns are found. commission must do the best that it can given the demographics of the area under

The district proposed by the NAACP for the Dover area is clearly not the most compact of districts. However, compactness per se is not a criterion mentioned in the Voting Rights Act. The <u>Gingles</u> case and its progeny only require that districts be reasonably compact. Dover district and fill it in as another legislative district was created. Thus, the

adoption of this district would not create many other districts with irregular shapes.

In summary, our proposed plan presents the State of Delaware with an opportunity to make the promises of the Voting Rights Act a reality. Adoption of a legislative plan that does not meet the benchmark set by this plan will be a dilution of the voting rights of the black and other minority citizens of Delaware.

(**********) = For example, the recent County Council race in the district which is primarily from Hilmington is not proof of the absence of legally significant polarized voting. First, our amalysis of that district shows that 1990 Census data gives it a 61.8% combined black and Hispanic population, far from the 50/50 mix your staff has asserted. Its combined black-hispanic VAP is 56%.0. More importantly, there was only late poorly organized opposition from the white candidate. Senator Sharp moved that the Lt. Governor, as President of the Senate, preside over the Joint Session. There was no objection.
Senator Sharp moved that the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House

act as secretaries to the Joint Session. There was no objection.

Senator Sharp moved that the Lt. Governor appoint a committee of four to escort the Governor to the Chamber. There was no objection and the Lt. Governor appointed Senator Robert T. Connor (spokesperson) and Senator Hermam M. Holloway, Sr.; Representatives Edward J. Bennett & Roger Roy to escort the Governor.

The President then called a standing recess until the arrival of the Governor.

The President welcomed the Governor to the Joint Session and the Governor addressed the assembly as follows:

Thank you, Lieutenant Governor Wolf, Mr. President Pro Tempore, Mr. Speaker, members of the 136th General Assembly, other elected officials, the Judiciary, the Cabinet, honored guests, and the people of Delaware. Traditionally Delaware's Governor delivers two speeches each January but at this year's

first leadership lunch I said I wanted to combine the State of the State and budget addresses to maximize use of everyone's time. Senator Cordrey spoke for everyone here today when he pulled me aside and told me that was the best decision I had ever made as governor. We'll hopefully today we can present a few other candidates for best decision runner-ups.

Seven years ago, I stood outside this building on a cold January day, and for the first time addressed the citizens of Delaware as their Governor. If I had declared in that address that in just 2,571 days -

- the greatest public health threat to Delawareans and the world would be AIDS;

- that the Soviet Union and Communism would collapse without one missile launched between the U.S. and what used to be the USSR;

- that every Delawarean would be paying hundreds of dollars to help bail out Savings and Loans in California and Texas:

that a skyrocketing number of babies would be born addicted to crack and cocaine;
 or, that the DuPont Company would dramatically reduce its Delaware work force;

the voters would have demanded a recount.

Yet, the guiding principles I outlined seven years ago in my first speech delivered in

good times, still apply today in uncertain conditions.

"For as long as one child is in danger or neglected, as long as one senior citizen is denied benefits of modern medical technology, as long as one community must endure the threat posed by hazardous wastes and as long as one family is denied the opportunity to enjoy the benefits of a growing economy, then the challenge to make this State the best place to live in remains before us."

Times, ladies and gentlemen, have certainly changed, but Delaware's difference is that our commitment and optimism remain despite the adversity surrounding us. As Ralph Waldo Emerson once wrote: "This time, like all times, is a very good one, if we but know what to

do with it."

Like the lighthouse at Cape Henlopen that in the past guided thousands of sailors through rising and falling tides, so has Delaware government steered its people through dramatic changes and transitions -- anchored by our commitment to fiscal integrity and our unique quality of life.

We have done more than just balance columns of numbers and figures. We have balanced

our resources with the needs of our people.

We have done more than cut personal income taxes three times. We have removed more than 40,000 low-income people from the tax rolls completely.

Our high bond rating stands intact while the ratings of our sister states are in

We have substantially reduced budget expenditures over the last three years; yet, despite these reductions, have minimized their effects on direct state services.

What we have accomplished is far more than bean counting -- what we have done is made

every single tax dollar count toward today's needs and tomorrow's dreams.

But as we work on both the Fiscal Year '92 and '93 budgets, one set of stark figures jumps off the pages — state revenue growth has decreased significantly in the last two years, and is continuing to retreat as the national recession lingers.

While some may argue that this is the time to take the easy course and enact a general

It is the wrong answer -- in the wrong place -- at the wrong time.

Today, when every working family in Delaware must make hard decisions and cut discretionary spending to make ends meet, this government must do no less.

Every tough decision we made last year is helping us with this year's budget. For example, facing tough times last year we implemented a successful Early Retirement Option, which will save approximately \$15 million in the coming fiscal year. Many of you had doubts. You were rightly concerned that if those positions reappeared in this budget,

there would be no real savings. That has not happened.

Long-term employees received an excellent financial opportunity. New spirit and talent was infused into our schools. Once again we demonstrated that we can make good things

happen in bad times.

In this budget you will find the same type of tough choices. This budget is not balanced with smoke and mirrors. Next January, I will leave my successor, whoever he or she may be, with a solid and sustainable budget. Further, should economic conditions continue to deteriorate during the course of your budget deliberations, I will recommend appropriate actions.

I am presenting a \$1.223 billion budget today, which has just 1.7 percent adjusted

growth over last year.

Although we all understand revenues are down, and cuts have been made, we must also recognize that we had no choice but to increase certain sections of this budget because of significant federal mandates and state formulas over which we have little control. Fortunately, these increases are in areas that also represent important needs such as Medicaid services, public education, and adult and youth correction programs.

In addition, this budget includes funds for a modest State employee salary increase, a

plan to reallocate education money to make school funding more flexible and an administrative cost savings program.

The Bond Bill will also feel revenue pressures.

First, the amount of funds available for non-transportation capital expenditures is

\$63.2 million -- about 30 percent less than the amount available last year.

And second, the total need for education-related projects has sharply risen --

requiring nearly 55 percent of these funds.

Also included in this bill are the necessary funds to complete the New Castle County Detention Center, Adult Correction projects and begin the Ferris School restructuring. just four years we will have substantially expanded our correction facilities expending over \$55 million on adult corrections, and almost 15 million on juvenile facilities.

This expansion of our secure facilities has been driven by the increase in serious

crime primarily related to drugs and drug abuse. But, beyond just building jail cells, the operating budget continues our efforts to find alternatives to incarceration both at the juvenile and adults levels. These alternative programs, combined with our overhaul of the parole and work release systems, better prepare prisoners to return to be productive members of society.

During the past fiscal year, adverse economic conditions also affected Transportation Trust Fund revenues. The capital budget for transportation is down 17.2 percent from last year. To complete the shift of transportation costs begun last year, I am proposing the Division of Motor Fuel Tax and all remaining Department of Transportation General Fund costs be moved to the Trust Fund.

If we are to meet the needs for a new transportation system for the year 2000 and

beyond, we must fund projects that will not come on line for years.

Consider that just 10 years ago people traveling in or through Delaware drove 4.4 billion miles annually. Today that number has jumped to more than 6.4 billion miles, and by the year 2010 that number will be almost 9 billion miles.

We will continue to move ahead with essential transportation projects such as the Route

1 Relief Route project, including the new six-lane bridge over the C&D Canal. The Grant-in-Aid set-aside of \$19.0 million includes \$1.1 million for the critical

statewide paramedic program, although the overall increase is just \$100,000.

The struggle to build these budgets has not been easy and won't get easier before June 30. The task of the Joint Finance and Bond Bill Committee chairpersons — Senator Cook, Representative Corrozi, Senator Martin and Representative Roy -- as well as the rest of the members, will not be easy. Many advocacy groups will legitimately demand more. But we must keep in mind the complete picture. To satisfy the needs of one segment of society at the price of the whole is wrong.

Establishing a fair system of compensation for State employees has been one of the top priorities throughout my Administration, not only because I feel they deserve it, but

because they have truly earned it.

By making significant cuts in administrative and overhead spending, this budget allows us to set aside approximately \$12 million that will fund a pay increase of 2.0 percent for non-educational employees, excluding cabinet members, elected officials and judges.

As you know, teachers received steps and local supplements last year, but like State

employees, they received no general increase.

The \$12 million set aside this year for salary increases will provide sufficient funds to continue steps plus an additional 1.0 percent. And, assuming similar local raises for teachers in the coming year as in this current year, the average teacher increase will be at least 2.0 percent.

There has been much talk lately of states "re-inventing" government, and perhaps in states with tremendous problems that is the right solution. In Delaware, we basically have a good product. You don't need to re-invent it, you only need to improve it and enhance it. After all, look what happened when someone tried to re-invent Coca-Cola.

In this budget there are a number of cuts and consolidations made through the MAX program — a program that Senator Venables and Representative Petrilli helped make possible. This effort will maximize the quality and efficiency of State Government services by restructuring, improving services and developing cost savings over \$5 million in Fiscal Year 93.

This program, combined with other efforts, will eliminate approximately 225 positions, of which approximately 100 are currently filled. Through attrition and reallocation of positions in various departments, we will offer these people continued employment.

What Delaware needs to do, unlike crisis-ridden states, is take the good government we have and make it better. Our's is a good government for many reasons, but particularly because of the hard work of our outstanding Cabinet members and the extraordinary commitment and dedication of the General Assembly members.

I would like to take a moment to recognize one of my former cabinet members, Mike Harkins. But what can I say about a man who is truly larger than life and who has so greatly helped improve others lives with his work in this administration. I can say, however, that I deeply appreciate his commitment.

I would also like to recognize my new Secretary of State, Michael Ratchford, who has stood by my side even when it was not a very fun place to be. Although I note he was not

there during the bomb scare today.

The cabinet's achievements and the legislators' achievements in economic development, environmental protection, education, health care and many other important areas, are a result of their cooperation and belief in helping the people of Delaware. Their achievements represent opportunities for all our people, and for that you have my appreciation.

Perhaps the most important opportunity we must create today is job opportunities for every Delawarean able to work.

While job growth and economic development have become buzz words recently, they have

been principles to which we have always been strongly committed.

During the decade of the 80s, we took significant steps to change and strengthen our

historic employment base.

The initial banking legislation and the subsequent actions taken by this Legislature and this Administration have broadened our employment base. Those direct jobs and the spin-off services they created, have given Delaware the 12th highest job growth rate in the Nation. Since 1985 alone, we have created 63,000 new jobs which represent 18 percent of our total workforce.

While we understand that corporate America must restructure to remain competitive in the world market, the employment loss this entails on a short-term basis is devastating to the economy and to the employees affected. Depending merely on historic employers for job growth will not work. Delaware, in both the public and private sectors, must do no less than continue to be the First State in adapting to those changes by providing new business and personal employment opportunities.

The cooperation among the public, private and educational sectors in Delaware to help our economy is second to none. It has led to significant social improvements, to unprecedented growth in the poultry industry, to unrivaled opportunity for the financial industry, to a world-class High Technology Park being created in partnership with the University of Delaware and the State; and to a heightened realization of the absolute advantage of being a Delaware corporation.

We cannot fully insulate our citizens or our state revenues from a national recession. But, the answer to the question that many of you have asked: why are we better off than many of our surrounding states is rooted in those decisions we made together and a decade—long plan that pursued every new job opportunity.

This state government believes that every new job counts. Every new job in Delaware counts because these jobs are just not numbers, they are real people — your neighbors and friends. They represent car payments, tuitions, and mortgages.

friends. They represent car payments, tuitions, and mortgages.

And that is just one more reason I am particularly pleased to be able to share some new job announcements with you today — announcements I see as opportunities and hopes for the future.

- Salga Products, a plastic molding company located in New Castle County, is hiring 50 new employees, in part because of an incentive program the State offered them.
- Citibank has now finalized and confirmed its plans to establish its national insurance headquarters in the Dover area. Nearly 100 employees will be hired by the end of this year, and another 150 jobs will be created in the next 18 months.
- And, Townsends is expanding its Millsboro facility. The project should be complete by this summer, and is expected to create 200 new jobs in our

important poultry industry.

I have no doubt many more jobs will be created this year — some as a direct result of the economic development package now before the General Assembly, which is targeted to help small businesses, the core of our job growth success and those hardest hit by shrinking financial resources.

We will also redouble our efforts to expand the base of our financial industry not only in banking but in other financial products and services — industries that at least in Delaware have continued to grow substantially even in these tough times.

We must turn our energies anew to convince world-class corporations like Hewlett Packard that Delaware's advantages as a legal resident are equally beneficial for

operations and headquarters.

We will continue to target high tech industries through the Delaware Technology Park that are natural partners to be located in the first class environment of our University and we will work closely with companies such as Swearingen — the airplane manufacturer which is bringing new jobs to Kent County.

None of these solutions alone is the answer. There is no quick fix to the current economic problems. The combination of fiscal restraint, sound public policy, outstanding public/private cooperation, our special quality of life and these initiatives, will lead us through this difficult period. Rather than wringing our hands over our present adversity, it is time to join hands and reinforce our economic development efforts.

it is time to join hands and reinforce our economic development efforts.

What truly makes Delaware different is not programs or tax cuts, it is the unique

quality of life. One short story illustrates this point.

Last week, on the spur of the moment, Senator Cook and Development Office Director John Casey brought a consultant from Nebraska into my office who was eagerly looking for an east coast location for one of his clients. He had been to other states in the area already, and was taken aback by the problems he saw —— so much so, that when he came to Delaware, he was shocked to see how different our quality of life was, and noted:

* How friendly our people are;

* How accessible and cooperative our public officials are;

How easy it is to travel around the State; and,

* How clean our environment is.

Indeed, while economics and jobs play a significant role in our quality of life -- our environment is also an essential element. Because of the General Assembly's willingness to balance the needs of our environment with the needs for a thriving economy, we have a quality environment.

We began seven years ago by making environmental protection a priority, and through

regulations and clean-up programs, improved our land, water and air.

With this foundation in place, we shifted our attention to environmental preservation and we launched the extremely successful land acquisition and Greenways programs, which many here in the Legislature helped to fund, to guarantee that important natural areas are preserved. And, with more than 20 percent of Delawareans participating in the RECYCLE DELAWARE program, we are protecting the natural resources and land that otherwise would be wasted —— buried in landfill mounds that someday would have become trash mountains.

Our commitment to environmental quality and protection, as well as economic development, will continue lighting our path to prosperity, but prosperity for today's young people will only be possible if we have programs in place to help them achieve it.

In seven years, I've learned that there are no quick fixes in education. You don't solve educational problems with slogans or rhetoric. Educational solutions require good plans and tenacity.

We began by focusing on what we put into education by making our average teacher salary 13th highest in the nation; by making operating and capital funding between rich and poor districts more equitable; by restructuring 21 of our schools through Re:Learning; and by

creating alternative programs for dropouts.

To not only be the best, but to be better, will require change like letting teachers design some of their own curriculum and developing the first-ever National Principals' Leadership Academy. We have already made one great change in bringing Pat Forgione — a nationally known educator — here as our new State Superintendent, and will look for him to lead us toward other changes.

I believe strongly that commitment to the principles of DELAWARE 2000 and AMERICA 2000 are essential to our success. We must not only care about how we teach and what we are

paying our teachers -- we also must care what our children learn!

We stand at a crossroads today — looking back we see modest returns on our investments — looking ahead we see endless opportunities to break down barriers and move ahead. Our children have the ability to learn what they need to be successful; they have the desire, and we have our commitment to them. Now we must fulfill that commitment.

I am proposing in this budget the third year of full funding for equalization, and responding to the Districts' top request for more <u>flexible</u> funding by increasing the Academic Excellence Block Grant by \$2.3 million. This will allow districts to use all of their grant money for hiring new teachers, or if they prefer, using half of the funds for new teachers and the other half for programs or services of their choice.

new teachers and the other half for programs or services of their choice.

But to fund these programs within severe financial restraints, it is necessary to shift some funding within education. To that end — I am recommending a change in the way vocational students are counted. This revision will result in a substantial savings, a portion of which will be reallocated to fund mandated new growth and other education programs.

In addition, I am making reductions in other administrative and overhead costs to provide greater flexibility and to redirect these to the classrooms, <u>but</u> I am recommending an increase in overall education funding.

If you are like me, and sometimes feel yourself losing sight of what education really means to our kids because of the hundreds of reports, studies, opinions, and theories inundating us each day by education experts, than perhaps we ought to spend a moment hearing from two "true" experts.

A November issue of the <u>Sussex Countian</u> printed opinions from school children about what education meant to them. In each of their words is a lesson for every one of us.

Frankford Elementary fifth grader Gabrielle Purnell said, "Education is something very important because if you don't have education, you can't have many things in life. It is very important for you." Mark Phillips, a fifth grader at Georgetown Elementary explained, "Education will help me get a good job in the future. It can help me make something of myself."

Ladies and gentlemen, Gabrielle and Mark are here today and I would ask them to stand so that each and every one of us can pledge to them that we will have an education system that not only <u>can</u> help them, but <u>does</u> help them and every other Delaware child make something of themselves and make their dreams come true. Thank you Gabrielle and Mark.

Unfortunately, though, the American Dream is being threatened by a new American nightmare -- 36 million people are receiving inadequate health care. In Delaware, 72,000 of these people, one-third of whom are children -- are getting little care beyond emergency room visits -- the most expensive and ineffective way to deliver health care. In addition, these services come too late. It is to those children in need, and to all children, that we must turn our full attention today.

We cannot end our commitment just by giving children a good education or the promise of good job opportunities. We must give them good health care. "If you have your health, you have everything," is more than a saying — it is part of the American Dream.

Over the last seven years we have improved access to health care through the outstanding work of the Health Care Cost Management Commission, the Indigent Health Care Task Force, the current Delaware Health Care Commission, and through programs such as SMART START, Diamond Deliveries and Medicaid expansions. In addition, we have helped make people's lifestyles healthier through efforts by the Council on Lifestyle and Fitness and will continue trying to do so as we push hard this session for anti-smoking legislation.

But now in a time when the demands on our children are greater than ever, we are taking what I consider to be the most significant steps possible toward helping them have happy

and healthy lives.

Today we are launching a plan that will give all poor Delaware children up to age 18

the type of health care your children receive today.

If they have a high fever in the middle of the night, there will be a doctor to contact for help. If they need a regular check-up, they will have a doctor to see. If they require emergency or hospital care, they will receive that also.

And in all these cases, the health care services will be offered as close to their homes as possible -- and much closer than is available now in our underserved areas.

In addition to helping our poor children, we will also help children who are insured, or whose parents can afford to pay for some portion of the care, by making sure they have doctors and care when and where they need it.

In part, the plan for poor children will be managed through Medicaid expansions, but in

putting this together we quickly realized that would not be enough.

In contemplating how to best address both the problem of access and affordability for our children's medical care, I could think of no better partner than the Nemours Foundation with its historic commitment to Delaware and to children. As a result of discussions with the Foundation, it has committed to building and operating children's health care centers in all three counties.

The trustees expect to open centers later this year and have all centers open by the end of 1993. I have asked the Department of Health and Social Services and the Delaware Health Care Commission to work closely with them in support of this extraordinary effort, so that in just two years Delaware will have a network of children's health care clinics statewide, built and operated by the Nemours Foundation, and offering the high quality of care the Alfred I. duPont Institute is known for worldwide.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Nemours Foundation for its generosity and willingness to be our partners in this fight for our children's futures.

In combination with our priority of giving health care to children, I am also proposing an action plan today that includes new State initiatives, stronger public/private partnerships, and actions to encourage wide participation in the overall effort to provide health care to others in need.

To accomplish these objectives, we will undertake four initiatives.

One, reallocate current funds within the Delaware Institute for Medical Education and Research, known as DIMER, for recruiting physicians to Delaware in specialities such as family medicine, and in locations with doctor shortages. In addition, students receiving DIMER scholarships who do not return to practice in Delaware will have to pay back their scholarship money. Two, implement a pilot project through the Health Care Commission and Department of Health and Social Services to develop a system for meeting the needs of poor or uninsured adults who are now forced through our expensive emergency room doors to receive care that could have been prevented, or been less expensive, through early intervention.

- Three, adopt insurance reform measures that will be presented to the General Assembly in March by the Commission. These measures will assist employers who would like to provide health care benefits for their employees but cannot
- because of practices by the insurance industry.

 And, four, re-establish hospitalization coverage to general assistance recipients -- truly our most needy adults.

The programs I have just described, including medical care for our children, are based on prevention and early intervention, and in the long run save money. But the initiation of these programs will require funds. And so to that end, I am also recommending a plan for generating resources to be used for the sole purpose of funding health care services and programs.

I am proposing adoption of a 1.0 percent provider based assessment on all Delaware hospitals and health care facilities on their net proceeds, and a surcharge on physicians' licensing fees.

This is NOT your typical tax. The funds it raises will actually generate additional

<u>revenues</u> from the Federal Government in matching funds.

All this additional money will directly support the new health care efforts I have outlined today. The use of these dedicated funds for health care services and programs only, will be guaranteed by creating the Delaware Health Care Trust Fund, which will include the proceeds from the provider-based assessment and physician surcharge, the cigarette tax increase implemented in Fiscal Year 91, and other non-state revenue sources the Commission may develop.

Everything I have proposed has been directly aimed at making health care available to those who need it most. But this is only one area of emphasis if we are to end the health

care crisis.

I have a simple message for anyone involved in health care, whether it is pharmaceutical manufacturers, insurance companies, medical equipment providers, nursing home providers, doctors, or hospital administrators -- health care costs are out of control, and your efforts have had little positive impact on controlling these costs.

Government has been left no choice but to help bring medical costs under control including lowering prescription drug prices, reforming medical malpractice and preventing duplicative and unnecessary procedures -- and it would serve those involved with those issues to make improvements on their own so that government does not have to create any new regulatory systems.

Delaware is taking an important step today towards cost containment by launching plans that will help reduce the amount of uncompensated care health care professionals and facilities provide, and the amount of costly emergency procedures that could have been stopped by preventive care.

Likewise, the pilot project by the Delaware Health Care Commission to provide early treatment to the poor, and its insurance reforms to be presented to the General Assembly in

March, will further help contain costs.

Another step I am calling for is to have the Health Care Commission thoroughly review our current Certificate of Need program and make recommendations for dramatically improving it. The program's intent is correct -- to eliminate unnecessary purchases of expensive equipment and unneeded increases in health care facility capacities. Yet I am concerned that it is not making the impact we need to keep costs down.

A true partnership between my Administration, the General Assembly, the Delaware Health Care Commission, the Department of Health and Social Services, the Nemours Foundation, and most importantly, health care providers, employers and children's advocates, is necessary

to achieve appropriate care for all our children.

We can meet the objective of providing health care opportunities for all our children, and others in great need, but the State cannot, and should not, accomplish this alone. I would like to take a moment now and thank Steve Golding, the chairman of the Health Care Commission, and its members for all their assistance with this plan. Thank you.

Affordable and accessible health care should not be society's "Impossible Dream." This

is an achievable part of the American Dream.

Commitment to making change -- change for the better within a framework of prudent fiscal policies -- is the core of Delaware's success.

Every financial decision we have made -- every law we have passed -- every program we

have created, and every person we have helped, reflects this commitment.

Every dollar we have invested -- every tax we have shifted or reduced -- every right we have expanded and every wrong we have corrected, has been a commitment to change for the better.

As we prepare to move ahead in 1992 with health care reform and commit ourselves to

battle with the budget, let me leave you with some reflection on what that commitment means.

There is no one in this Chamber who does not know of my enthusiasm for sports. While my skills may lack some talent, they are always used with intensity and competitiveness. Of all the sporting events I have witnessed, perhaps none stands out more in my mind with such intensity as the last few minutes of that 1980 Olympic hockey game in Lake Placid when an underdog and scrappy United States team stood on the brink of beating the number one ranked team in the world.

The chant of "USA, USA -- " thundered through that arena -- drawn to the passionate height that only the dream of Olympic Gold inspires.

In 1989, a world-class training center for figure skaters opened at the University of Delaware under the leadership of Olympic medalist Ron Ludington who is here with us today. Ron's leadership and vision have made countless dreams come true in Delaware, and so I would like us to recognize him for his extraordinary achievements. Ron, would you please

Two of Ron's students, Calla Urbanski and Rocky Marval, recently won the United States National Pairs Figure Skating Championship -- realizing a dream against tremendous financial, competitive, and physical odds.

In 48 hours they leave for Albertville, France, on a quest for the gold — a quest that is for more than just a medal. It is a quest that is a lesson in true commitment.

They have taught us that commitment -- skating endless hours each day, and working to pay the bills, in Calla's case waitressing in a Wilmington restaurant, and in Rocky's running a trucking operation -- and they've shown it can sustain you even in the most challenging times.

Since mone of us I presume will have the opportunity to be in France and give Calla and Rocky a standing ovation after their Olympic performances in person, I would like to ask Calla and Rocky to come forward today so we can stand and recognize them and their commitment. Would you please come forward. These two fine Olympians.

Calla and Rocky:

We wish you luck.

We salute your dedication and commitment.

And we offer you our prayers for success.

But most importantly, we thank you. We thank you for taking to France your pride in Delaware -- which will flash from your blades for a few fleeting moments as the world sees your personal commitment to excellence. Thank you very much for all you've done.

For seven years, I've had the unique privilege of standing before you and presenting my plans and ideas for our people. Together, we have molded those ideas and forged a commitment to all Delawareans.

That is public service.

And as we face the difficult task of 1992 -- I am strengthened by the knowledge that we

will meet these difficult challenges with the same commitment as Calla and Rocky.

Two hundred and four years ago, when our predecessors gathered across The Green in Mrs. Battle's Tavern to act on the United States Constitution — they had never heard of AIDS— or savings & loans — or missiles — or the Soviet Union — or crack or cocaine — or even the DuPont Company — but they did know that the document they were ratifying was a commitment to the people of Delaware.

That commitment remains as strong and as enduring in this Chamber today as it did then. And it is that commitment that inspired Jefferson so correctly to pen Delaware --a jewel among the states.

Thank you very much and God bless you.

To the Members of the Delaware State House of Representatives of the 136th General Assembly On January 24, 1992, I received House Bill No. 340 which is entitled:
"AN ACT TO AMEND TITLE 17 OF THE DELAWARE CODE RELATING TO HIGHWAYS."

This legislation was introduced by Representative Campanelli in an effort to ensure that the State's streets and highways are restored promptly and adequately by the Department of Transportation after governmental utility work damages the road surfaces. To his credit, Representative Campanelli has addressed an issue in need of attention; however, the legislation before me fails in large degree to accomplish its intended purpose. While House Bill No. 340 provides that a public utility of a municipality or other governmental subdivision of the State must notify the Department of Transportation when it initiates any construction activities affecting the public highways, the bill also permits these governmental utilities to perform repairs to the highways of their own accord.

Moreover, this legislation only addresses utility construction or relocation work required as a result of a highway project. It does not address the far more common instances of utility construction or reconstruction which are completely unrelated to such highway projects. For these reasons, with the concurrence of Representative Campanelli, I an returning House Bill No. 340 without my signature. At the same time, however, I intend to work with the sponsor in order to create a legislative or regulatory solution to ensure the notification of DelDot when governmental utilities engage in construction activities affecting the State's public streets or highways so as to allow for their prompt repair.

Thank you for forwarding me a copy of House Resolution 97 expressing the support of the General Assembly for increasing poultry exports to the former republics of the Soviet Union.

As you know, President Bush has asked the Department of Agriculture to make available

approximately \$1.2 billion in credit guarantees to the former republics of the Soviet Union, under the Department of Agriculture's GSM-102 credit guarantee program. Under this program, another \$200 million will be available in March and an additional \$250 million in April. Under the GSM-102 program, all commodities are available for purchase and the buyer is permitted to select any commodities.

A number of Delawareans have contacted me to express their concerns about providing the people of the former Soviet Union with products which they appear to have shortages of, such as poultry items. In the past, the Soviets traditionally purchased relatively minor amounts of poultry products from the United States, prefering to purchase feed grains for poultry production in the USSR. Currently, this import practice has not changed — the major portion of these new credits have been used to purchase wheat and feed grains. Roughly \$18 million of these credits have been used to purchase 16,000 metric tons of poultry.

You may be interested to know that I have written to Department of Agriculture Secretary Madigan to express my support and the support of Delaware's General Assembly for the promotion of poultry exports to the former republics of the USSR. Enclosed is a copy of my letter. I would like to request that you share my correspondence with the members of the General Assembly.

Again, thank you for contacting me. When I receive a response from Secretary Madigan, I will forward the letter to you.

I would like to bring to your attention a matter of great importance to me — the promotion of poultry exports to the former republics of the Soviet Union.

As I understand that you just recently travelled to the former republics of the Soviet Union, I will not underscore the severity of the food shortage in that region. I believe that the United States can play a crucial role in assisting this region to feed its' people and I am very supportive of President Bush's current aid package. I applaud your efforts

to date to implement that program. However, I feel that our policy should reflect support for our domestic producers, including the poultry industry. Our policy should seek to increase our exports and establish long-term markets in this region so that our commodities can compete against Europe's heavily subsidized agricultural products. I understand that to date, only \$18 million in credits under the GSM-102 program has been used to purchase poultry items for

this region. As Delaware's representative, a state which is the eighth largest poultry producer in the U.S. employing over 8,000 people, I am requesting your assistance in promoting poultry exports to the former republics of the Soviet Union. I hope you will consider including a provision requiring the purchase of poultry products in any future credit guarantee or commodity assistance program to the former republics of the Soviet Union.

To the Members of the Delaware State House of Representatives of the 136th General Assembly On March 26, 1992, I received House Bill No. 253 which is entitled:

"AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 7, TITLE 24, RELATING TO CHIROPRACTIC PHYSICIAN COMPENSATION AND CONTRACTS ISSUED BY HEALTH SERVICE CORPORATIONS AND HEALTH MAINTENANCE ORGANIZATIONS."

This legislation seeks to expand mandated reimbursement for eligible services rendered by chiropractors to include health service corporations and health maintenance organizations. Presently, mandated reimbursement is required only of health insurance companies. For the reasons set forth herein, I am returning House Bill No. 253 without my signature.

Initially, I recognize the important contributions made by the chiropractic profession in the provision of quality health care, particularly with respect to the treatment of back pain. The benefits derived from chiropractic services are a matter of record supported by countless studies and independent research. My disapproval of this legislation should not therefore, be interpreted as reflecting adversely on this valuable health care service.

therefore, be interpreted as reflecting adversely on this valuable health care service.

From a purely legal perspective, I am concerned that implementation of this bill could result in the impairment of existing contractual relationships in violation of Article I, \$10 of the United States Constitution. Specifically, the provisions of House Bill No. 253, as written, would become effective immediately upon enactment into law. Thus, any provisions in existing health service corporation and health maintenance organization contracts which exclude chiropractice services from eligibility for reimbursement would be nullified and superseded by this legislation. I believe there is a significant possibility that application of the provisions of this bill to existing contracts would impermissibly impair the contractual relationships of private parties. My concerns with House Bill No. 253, however, extend beyond this legal issue.

253, however, extend beyond this legal issue.

As I have indicated on several prior occasions, I am philosophically opposed to governmental mandates as they relate to the provisions of health care and health care benefits. I believe that the proper role of government is to identify and offer necessary incentives to health care providers and to encourage them to be more creative in their provision of services. I worry that mandating access to specific providers will have various unintended consequences such as those described herein.

Proponents of House Bill No. 253 argue that it merely expands already mandated reimbursement for chiropractic services to cover health service organizations and health maintenance organizations, and that this is merely a question of fairness. While this fairness argument has some superficial appeal, the answer is not necessarily to expand the mandate. Rather, serious consideration should be given to whether mandated reimbursement should be eliminated entirely in order to allow for a market solution to the access and reimbursement issues as opposed to a legislative one.

In opposing this legislation, I am also cognizant of the virtual explosion in costs of medical services being experienced not only in Delaware but nationwide. I am concerned that House Bill No. 253 could have the unintended effect of raising the costs of health insurance for some of those individuals least able to afford it. In particular, small employers and individuals are often unable to afford the costs necessary to self-insure their health plans. As a result, they are also unable to avoid the mandated reimbursement requirement as larger, self-insured companies can. Therefore, it is small companies and individuals who would bear the brunt of any increased premiums resulting from enactment of this bill.

While costs per office visit for chiropractic services are generally lower than those for services rendered by medical doctors, the frequency of visits, duration of treatment and possible duplication of services could more than offset any savings that might otherwise be realized. Numerous studies have been conducted relating to the cost effectiveness of chiropractic services. The results, however, have been inconclusive and, in some cases, contradictory. Likewise, while proponents of this legislation argue that ultimately it will reduce the costs of health care coverage, opponents have stated that enactment of House Bill No. 253 will result in an additional one-half to one percent increase in annual premiums for many small employers and individuals. In light of the uncertainty surrounding its potential effect, I am unwilling to sign House Bill No. 253 into law.

Another significant and related consideration in my decision to return this legislation without my signature concerns efforts being undertaken by the Delaware Health Care Commission. The Commission has expressed the position that no additional mandated benefits should be enacted until a formal review procedure has been adopted by the General Assembly. Under this procedure, the Commission would consider the social and financial impacts and the medical efficacy of mandated benefits proposals prior to legislative action. I strongly endorse this prudent approach. In the event the Delaware Health Care

Commission conducts such a review of House Bill No. 253 and concludes that enactment of its provisions would have the effect of containing health care costs, I would be willing to reconsider my position at that time.

For the reasons stated herein, I am returning House Bill No. 253 without my signature.

Mr. Speaker Spence appointed Representative Hebner as Acting Speaker.

Representative Spence introduced and brought <u>HR 103</u>, jointly sponsored by Representative Petrilli on Behalf of All Representatives, before the House for consideration.

<u>HR 103</u> - Honoring Delawarean Dave Tiberi as the True Winner in the February 8, 1992

Championship Fight for the World Middleweight Title.

WHEREAS, the world of boxing is one which hails an underdog, especially if the challenger has trained so hard for the one chance to prove he is the undisputed leader of the Middleweight class; and

WHEREAS, for Pike Creek resident and native New Castle son, Dave Tiberi, the chance at the Middleweight title of the world came on February 8, 1992, when he climbed into the ring against undefeated champion James Toney, and delivered blows for twelve rounds to the tired, unprepared Toney, who never expected such a challenge from Dave Tiberi, who made himself a household name during that televised fight in Atlantic City, for viewers watching the fight were appalled to learn of the split decision and final verdict that allowed James Toney to retain the Middleweight title; and

WHEREAS, two of the three judges scored for James Toney, while another voted for Dave Tiberi, causing an uproar among boxing enthusiasts such as Trump Taj Mahal casino owner Donald Trump, who called the decision "an embarrassment to Atlantic City" and vowed to ban boxing matches in his three hotel casinos "until such a decision is rectified"; and

WHEREAS, Dave Tiberi had trained hard in Philadelphia for this fight and was deserving of winning the championship that Sugar Ray Leonard, Thomas "Hitman" Hearns, and "Marvelous" Marvin Hagler were awarded in past fights, as was apparent to those who watched the fight on television and knew that James Toney was not prepared for the fight and had struggled to bring his weight in at the maximum level of 160 pounds, or those who joined with other members of the Tiberi family in Atlantic City to watch the title snatched away from the winner and be handed to a man who was not deserving of either the Middleweight Title or of the large amount of cash which goes with the title; and

WHEREAS, so appalled was Delaware that her favorite son was robbed of the title that Governor Mike Castle sent a letter to the President of the International Boxing Federation and New Jersey Governor Jim Florio blasting the decision, Speaker Spence asked Delaware's Attorney General to contact New Jersey's Attorney General and investigate this decision and Senator Bill Roth has called for a United States Senate inquiry, moves prompting James Toney to say that "Delaware's nothing but rednecks and hillbillies"; and

WHEREAS, after the fight was over, Dave Tiberi showed his mettle and said simply, "today, I proved that I am the best middleweight in the world," a sentiment shared by countless numbers of people, and showcased the unsportsmanlike manner of James Toney, who was roundly booed before the crowd of 3,000 and appeared angry after the decision, then refused to attend the post fight press conference, giving the viewing public another chance to see the real champion of the February 8, 1992 Middle Heavyweight championship fight.

NOW, THEREFORE:

BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the House of Representatives of the 136th General Assembly of the State of Delaware that we hereby honor Dave Tiberi, the true champion of the February 8, 1992 Middleweight title fight against undefeated champion James Toney in Atlantic City and wish this Delawarean be given another shot at the title, this time for a quaranteed larger purse deserving of the talent of Pike Creek resident Dave Tiberi.

8E IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a suitably prepared copy of this Resolution be presented to

Dave Tiberi.

On April 21, 1992, I signed into law Senate Bill No. 280 which is

entitled:

"AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 80, TITLE 15 OF THE DELAWARE CODE RELATING

TO CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS."

This legislation authorizes political subdivisions of the state to enact ordinances providing for public financing of their elections. It is important to point out that this is merely enabling legislation which permits the counties and municipalities to enact their own ordinances should they choose to provide for public financing. Therefore, it will be necessary for those political subdivisions which elect to enact such legislation to carefully and thoroughly evaluate their needs and to develop ordinances which will equitably and effectively address those needs

equitably and effectively address those needs.

I support this legislation because I believe that public financing of local elections can lead to a more competitive system where challengers as well as incumbents have access to adequate resources with which to run effective campaigns. The impact which a system of public financing can have on elections to local office is particularly significant where large individual contributions can be disproportionate to the total amount of campaign contributions received by a candidate. In such elections, public financing can diminish the influence of special interest money, encourage the participation of small contributors and reduce the need for candidates to spend significant amounts of time soliciting money from large contributors.

Finally, it is my hope that any local ordinance which is enacted by a political subdivision as a result of SB 280 would not attempt to pay for the costs of public financing through a tax "add-on", i.e., by asking taxpayers to contribute funds in addition to their existing tax obligations. Studies by Common Cause and other nonpartisan interest groups have established that tax add-ons are unsuccessful as a public financing mechanism in that they result in minimal taxpayer participation and insufficient funding. Rather, any political subdivision seeking to enact a public financing ordinance should ensure that it already has a reliable funding source available or, alternatively, should consider voluntary contributions such as tax check-offs in order to implement the ordinance's provisions so as not to add an additional burden on its taxpayers.

In conclusion, it is my hope that the legislation I have signed today can serve as a vehicle for establishing a more open, equitable and competitive local election process.

For the purpose of requesting appropriate action by the congress to propose an amendment to the U.S. constitution prohibiting the physical desecration of the flag of the United States.

Whereas, although the right of free expression is part of the foundation of the United States constitution, very carefully drawn limits on expression in specific instances have long been recognized as legitimate means of maintaining public safety and decency, as well as orderliness and productive value of public debate; and

Whereas, certain actions, although arguably related to one person's free expression, nevertheless raise issues concerning public decency, public peace, and the rights of expression and sacred values of others; and

Whereas, there are symbols of our national soul such as the Washington monument, the United States capitol building, and memorials to our greatest leaders, which are the property of every American and are therefore worthy of protection from desecration and dishonor; and

Whereas, the American flag to this day is a most honorable and worthy banner of a nation which is thankful for its strengths and committed to curing its faults, and remains the destination of millions of immigrants attracted by the universal power of the American ideal; and

Whereas, the law as interpreted by the United States supreme court no longer accords to the stars and strips that reverence, respect and dignity befitting the banner of that most noble experiment of a nation-state; and

Whereas, it is only fitting that people everywhere should lend their voices to a forceful call for restoration to the stars and stripes of a proper station under law and decency; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the assembly, the senate concurring. That the legislature of the state of Wisconsin proposes to the congress of the United States that procedures be instituted in the congress to add a new article to the constitution of the United States, and that the state of Wisconsin requests the congress to prepare and submit to the several states an amendment to the constitution of the United States, prohibiting the physical desecration of the flag of the United States; and, be it further

Memorializing Congress to review the provisions of the Social Security Act known as the Social Security Offset and Windfall.

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Ohio (the Senate

Concurring):

WHEREAS, The members of the 119th General Assembly of Ohio wish to memorialize the Congress of the United States to review the provisions of the Social Security Act commonly known as the Social Security Offset and Windfall, which substantially reduce the anticipated retirement benefits of Ohio public employees, for the purpose of repealing or amending those provisions to provide relief for such public employees and parity with benefits enjoyed by nonpublic employees who are able to receive private pensions without comparable reduction in Social Security benefits; and

WHEREAS, Public employees in the State of Ohio participate in state or local public

retirement systems as to such public employment; and

WHEREAS, Numerous Ohio public employees and/or their spouses also are or have been employed in nonpublic sector jobs for which they and their employer have contributed to the Social Security System; and

WHEREAS, Upon retirement after many years of dedicated public service, Ohio public employees have been promised and are entitled to receive a public pension based on their

service and contributions to the state retirement system; and

WHEREAS, Ohio public employees who have also been employed in nonpublic sector jobs or have spouses who have been so employed and have contributed to the Social Security System upon retirement expect to receive Social Security benefits commensurate with their Social Security-covered service and comparable to those received by all others who contributed to

the Social Security System; and WHEREAS, As a result of the Social Security windfall provision, Section 215(a)(7) of the Social Security Act and the offset provision, Subsections (b)(4), (c)(2), (e)(7), (f)(2), and (g)(4) of Section 202 of the Social Security Act, the Social Security benefits for which contributions were made by the employee or the employee's spouse, respectively, are substantially reduced or eliminated, severely impacting the financial condition of the public retiree; and

WHEREAS, The General Assembly firmly believes that Ohio public employees should not be penalized for their years of dedicated public service and should receive Social Security benefits which are commensurate with their or their spouses' years of Social Security-covered service and contributions and are comparable to those received by all

other employees; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, That we, the members of the 119th General Assembly of the State of Ohio, in adopting this Resolution, hereby apply to the Congress of the United States to review the windfall and offset provisions of the Social Security Act for the sole purpose of repealing or amending such provisions to provide relief to public system retirees and to provide Social Security benefits to such public system retirees which are commensurate with their or their spouses' years of Social Security covered service and contributions and are comparable to those received by other retirees; and be it further
