The sun set in last night & the day has been rainy with wind North East but this Eve is bright moonlight - Father says the sun today has made it look more like Spring than any thing there has been before this & the birds have been quite noisy

Uncle rested some the last part of the night but feels only so so today still he has been able to to listen to much reading & he has also been shaved & changed his linen

No one at meeting today on account of the rain & both Sophie & Sarah are quite unwell - Emily is much better John is not here his time was out last night he now intends farming on his own hooks having bought a piece of land of Mr Johnson

No news from the Post Office today as no one was at meeting - since the wind came round & cleared it has blown very hard & appears to be growing quite cold -

Grogs peeped when I was up with Uncle last night but none to be heard this morn

Monday April 2nd 1855-

The past night has been clear but very windy & the day has been even more windy than the night & is very cold but seems lessening as the Eve closes in Uncle says he slept very little last night but has been much a-sick today but this Eve complains of feeling some pain in the region of the liver & fears an attack of gall stones

The weather is so severe no Carpenters or Masons come to work on the new house -

Father & William off at 9 a.m. this Morn for Society's Meeting after which came home meeting Brother returned at noon but Father did not get home till nearly night - Mrs P. H. William has been to the other farm with company after his return he hired an ink man to work he is to begin tomorrow

Emily as well today but Sister L. is quite sick - Mother has been sitting with Uncle today while I have been assisting Sarah washing after which Sarah went to Mrs Allen to get Mary to accompany herself & William to the concert this Eve - they started at 8 p.m. & America Blanton & Sarah Carpenter joined them they returned about 10 p.m.

John Hunt has spent this Eve with the family from the Post Office three Newspapers

The past night was quiet but cold & the thermometer seemed really Winterish but the sun shone & the birds have tried to sing - one Meadow lark sang yesterday - but they cannot be very many till the frogs peep again

Uncle rested so so last night & quite comfortable today though not much appetite William went to the village this Morn, after which Father started for the City - there are two Carpenters at the new house today Sarah put her clothes out quite early since which the wind has risen considerably -

Williams new man John Brown came this Morn & seems to do very well & this Eve Brother has hence John Kelley for half the time the coming summer

Father with Foster E - returned about 5 P. M. but brought only one letter from the Post Office - to me from

A pleasant still Morning & the day has been mild with no wind but this Evening a pleasant breeze from the South.

Uncle rested tolerably last night & today has been so so & listened to much reading still his appetite is not good

William & Father off to Providence this Morn after lumber &c for the house as all the carpenters are at work today as well as Mr Case - John Halleys also here making our family at this time number ten men & six women including Uncle William -

Sarah arrived this Morn & Mrs P. K. has gone with Sister E - to see Aunt Blanding -

William returned with the lumber about 5 o'clock this P. M. & I believe the eagle came too - Heard both robins & blue birds this Morn -

William has been to spend the Evening at Mr Blandings with Sisters S - A & E - they do not return till 10 o'clock - Aunt Blanding was quite smart but Mr Blanding is not very well -

Thursday April 6th 1855.

Another clear Morning & quite mild
& the birds have been singing beautifully
but this P.M. is cloudy. Looks like rain
the ground is getting quite soft

Uncle rested about as usual last night
today has been comfortable & his appetite is
some better.

All off to their work by 6 A.M. this morning
but William soon returned & fixed a place
for the Eagle which was not completed when
Brother Abram & his bride returned from their
New Hampshire trip. Ellen was sick & had
to take her bed with a chill but since 3 A.M.
she has been sitting with the family —

Mather & Sister attended meeting today they
slid to the prayer meeting & brought from
the Post Office two letters one for Sister S
from Dr. R. Ellis

From A. O. Blanding telling
he would be home today but like my last from
Gattnish he came in time to receive it himself
& got Mr. Couse's carriage to come from the depot in
Seekonk

This P.M. Mr. Hovey arrived with Brother
A. O. B. & his horse & carriage as the rain set in he
fire night & William carried Mr. Couse home
there was one vacant place to put Mr. Hovey
into - but for the rain Mr. Couse would have
finished the chimney at the new house

-chasing but did not do it could find no start-
-ing & is going to Taunton about it next week

Brother A. O. B. has built his Eagle which
Father has named Samy fine large pen & has let
him have a lot of water to wash in as it is sat.
he is a noble bird -

I have attempted writing to Flatbush today
but was too late for the Post Office & this P.M. I
put Uncle's room in order & bathe his feet
Sarah has been very busy with the baking &
Emily has prepared dinner with Father's as-
sistance & direction

I have been in the yard today looking at

William has a white calf this Morn a litter of fifteen pigs but only twelve of them lived

Tuesday April 10th 1855-

Another clear Morn & quite cool so there is considerable ice & no frogs peeping but the birds sing & one pair of bluebirds have already began to build a nest on the small Elm tree in the front yard

Uncle nested so so last night but this Morn his breakfast did not suit him & he has not seemed very smart yet able this P.M. to see both Maria & Mr. Weeden who with their children have been visiting at Mr. Pierce's Father seems no better today & can scarcely get around without his cane to assist him

Mather & Sister E. have gone to spend the day with Aunt Rachel Carpenter who appears to be failing & is in care of a Physician

All seem better of their colds today but Father, mine is nearly well

William had another calf come this Morn The flocks have been pecking corn but today still only two Carpenters at the other house

William & A. O. C. have been to the Post Office this Eve & obtained letters from friends to Mrs. Dr. Blanding & Sister E. also two newspapers

Wednesday April 11th 1855

Last night was cloudy & some rain & the Morning was the same with a little snow occasionally sprinkling down but this P. M. the wind is strong from the West & the clouds are fast disappearing

Uncle slept tolerably last night notwithstanding the severe pain in his face last Evening - Today he seems to have more appetite

B slightly this A. M. without medicine this P. M. Uncle has been sleeping some Father is no worse today so we hope he will soon be improving the other invalids are better

William started for Providence about 9d this Morn goes in place of Father he took a note for me to Mrs A. S. Vernon & Sister E sent a letter by him

Gilbert D Pease came this Morn & paid his interest Money due Uncle & renewed his note taking up the two \$10 & giving one \$10.00

Brother A. D. B. carried dinner to the other farm there are three carpenters at work today up there this P. M. Brother A. D. B. has gone ~~taking~~ ^{to see} wife to see Henry Berry on some business about land & as Father was too unwell to keep his engagement

William returned from the City at 5h P. M. brought letters to Uncle & self mine was from Mrs A. P. Murray

I contained the intelligence of the death of Cousin Alfred Murray at Mobile on the 21st ult.

Thursday April 12th 1855

Some rain fell during the past night & the A.M. was cloudy & cold with frequent gusts of rain & snow & some hail but this P.M. it has cleared but continues cold with a strong wind from the N.W.

Uncle had more neuralgia last Eve & the first part of the night than for sometime past but after I d. slept some & more this Morn & has been quite comfortable today but such a succession of sad news from Mr Murray's family affects his nerves I can see

Father is better today & this P.M. has gone as far as his Allens but he is far from well.

Mather is nearly sick today from a heavy cold but others are better of their colds

Abram & Ellen went to the Post Office this Morn but obtained only one newspaper for our family

Sarah has been to Banks & taken Mrs Murray's letter - William & John have been working on the old field today - but are now loading hay for market tomorrow

Ellen, Sippie & Sephe are all busy sewing Sarah has finished the ironing - Mather & Emily prepared dinner

A bright day but the P.h. there is

soon I have been into the yard this

I has been so so today I has seen company

Mother has a severe cold coming on, others

fore night quite clear again —

Uncle seems to rest better than he
has done — gets to sleep sooner nights and
has less neuralgia than early in the week
& his appetite seems a little better

After getting my Saturday work
done as far as Uncle was concerned I made
ready Sat M^r. started with Abram & Ellen
for Providence where he put up the horse
& we called for Sister E & left worse for her to
follow us out to Mr Vennors where we arrived
in time to meet a dinner party & stood &
dined feeling quite out of place at 4 o^r - we
left in the rain & came down to the arcade
in an Omnibus where E & E waited
while Brother & self went out a little & then
slunk for home having accomplished nothing
in the way of business we reached
home just before dark I with a headache
We found no letter at the Post Office for any
one & made no call upon Aunt Carpenter
Sephe has taken care of Uncle today —

yesterday William brought me a letter from

B without medicine today quite freely. Father is so much better today that he rode with Abram to the Society's Meeting where they learned Mr Governor had decided to stay with the \$750.00 dollars salary —

William went to the City this Morn after lumber & did not get home till middle of P.M. & then went up to the other farm with his load.

Sarah had a large wash today & I tried to assist her some but it was 4 P.M. before we were through — Father's cold is still severe but she prepared the meals with Emily's help.

At 4 P.M. she came here this afternoon and fixed the clock.

Wednesday April 17th 1855-

Another fine clear day warm & Spring like but this Eve the clouds are gathering, rain threatens the wind has been fresh from the South & it is quite dusty -

Uncle had a comfortable night's rest last night & today has been so so - he does not like to have me gone quite so often Septe has again had charge of him today as Sarah was busy evening which was very large

B again today without medicine

Father is so much better he rode to Providence today I went with him - started as soon as possible after doing Uncle's work and writing a deed for Father for James H. Perry we were off at 11 A.M. met Sister E about 10 - when we started to make purchases at about 4 P.M. were through but could not find Father till about 5 P.M. when we started out with fresh grain & lumber & I got home in time for supper with the men having missed a call from Dr. Benoni & his son Everett who is at home at vacation but leaves next Thursday for his school again & his sister goes with him No letters from the P. O. today -

Abram & Ellen went into the City before us this Morn but we could not find them they sat for their daguerreotypes & had fine likenesses taken they were home at 5 P.M. P.M.

Wednesday April 18th 1853
Morning fine

A real Spring day very warm & pleasant
A few tremendous showers have passed
around only a little sprinkle came here - the lightning was unusually vivid
Uncle slept comfortably last night & has been so so today had fresh herring for breakfast & enjoyed them as much as Father and Abram & Ellen did their breakfast

At 10 A.M. this morn Father with Abram & the baggage started for the depot at Providence & soon after Ellen & Sarah started with black tom - all got there safe but tom ran away with Sarah coming home, but no harm came Father came some time after Sarah

Frank Hanson & wife Schilla called this Morn to have A. O. B. cut the child's gums Christian Brown called upon the bride just as she was leaving & then made us a call & saw Uncle also - Mrs. Brown was so smart as to take a long ride yesterday with Mrs. Hanson & Mrs. Grosvenor

Henry Perry came this P.M. for his seed - and when supper & milking was over William took the calf & sisters E. & S. & carried them to town in Wm H. Bullock's to spend a few days - he did not get home till 9 P.M. when it was very dark - he gave the calf to Cousin

Matters cold is severe yet but Father's back continues to improve some -

B again this Morn without medicine

Father has not been to the City today he continues to improve - his back is weak.

William arose early & prepared for going into the City but the rain has kept him at home - has not even been to the other farm

Sarah went to the P. O. this P. M. notwithstanding standing the rain but found only News-papers I hope we may hear soon from A.C.

The men came from the other house this Eve with only one umbrella & some of them were quite wet but at bed time took plenty of pepper tea to dry & warm themselves
