\$6,500,000 CDF Modernization Program Nears Completion In Final, Third Year

A total of 13,686 employees in 43 plants had 150 accidents off-the-job in the first half of the year.

In the same period only 92 plant accidents occurred among 28,310 employees in 97 plants.

Dr. William Mosher, chairman of the chemistry department at the University of Delaware, and recently returned from Europe behind the Iron Curtain, made this statement recently at a meeting of the American Association of University Women.

Dr. George Windell, assistant professor of history, who spent the summer in Germany, feels that "the Germans are absolutely convinced that we will chicken out."

Both men said that the only policy possible on Berlin is the American "we cannot retreat." Mosher and Windell talked on a panel which included Dr. Kimbrey Robert, chairman of modern languages at the university, who spoke of his summer in La Garde Frienet as director of an experimental program for language study in Newark's twin city, with eight Delaware students.

Roberts stated there seems to be less worry about communism when you have real live communists in your town.






Four-Year-Old Boy Joseph Kemether Dies In Hospital



New manufacturing equipment installed at Newark includes specially designed laminating presses, believed to be the only ones ever built.

New high air velocity, high speed treaters with a total capacity four times that of the former operation, feed the battery of presses. Continental-Diamond pioneered in developing and producing high temperature plastics, many of which are being used in the current military effort. CDP materials are used in almost every major missile and rocket program including the Tirox weather satellite.

Of equal importance is the company's contribution to the field of printed circuits. CDP is a leading supplier of copper-clad laminates for use in military and commercial circuitry. It is estimated that 85 per cent of production is used as electrical insulation. Mechanical and electro-mechanical applications make up the balance.

Changes in the organization setup and personnel have also been made to keep pace with the new manufacturing facilities. All marketing activities are under the direction of Vice-President Arthur J. Briggs. These include field sales; advertising and public relations; market research; product planning; sales administration, and customer service.

Technical services to customers; grade development; specifications; purchasing and related functions are headed by Ernest O. Hausmann, vice-president and technical director.

Other company officers are Worth Tracy, vice-president of industrial relations; Controller Richard Nelson, and Treasurer Paul Jaquette.

The present CDP corporation was formed in 1929, the result of a merger between the Diamond State Fibre Company and the Continental Fibre Company. In 1955 it was purchased by the Budd Company of Philadelphia.
